RESIDENTS AWAIT VALLEY RAILWAY EXTENSION DECISION

EXTENSION OF LINE IMMEDIATELY MUST BE STRONGLY URGED

People Anxious to Know What Part of Unemployment Relief Funds to be Spent Here; Answers Bring Evasive Reply; Crossings Should be Eliminated

Residents of the Saint John River Valley are still anxiously awaiting an announcement as to what proportion of the \$20,000,000 appropriated by Parliament for the alleviation of unemployment is to be spent in this vicinity. Representatives from other provinces have been to Ottawa to present their claims, but so far no announcement has been made as to any such action from New Brunswick. This is a thing that should be getting the closest attention not only of the provincial government but also of town and county councils and boards of trade. The consensus of opinion seems to be that the section is the extension of the Valley Railway from Centreville to Grand Falls to link up the C. N. R. systems and form a short route to Saint John.

Another needed improvement to the public works system is being suggested. That is the elimination of the dangerous railway crossings between Woodstock and Edmundston. Along this stretch of the trans-Canada highway the road crosses the railway more than forty times, and a considerable number of these crossings are really dangerous. Strictly speaking of course this is a problem that belongs to the province, but at such a time as this there should be no difficulty in arriving at a working agreement between the Dominion and Provincial governments, if both are really sincere in their desire to relieve unemployment and at the same time do work that will provide a fair return in dollars' worth for the money expended.

VALLEY EXTENSION
As far as the Valley Railway extension is concerned this is a project that should be undertaken at once. There is an agitation on foot for the reconditioning of the Trans-continental route, to bring traffic through McEwen and Fredericton. It is hardly likely of that the C. N. (Continued on page eight)

The sites at Canaan River, Lepreau and the Chiputnetcook Lakes have already been inspected, and the Mount Carleton site will be looked over next.

C. L. I. IS HOLDING BIG AUTUMN FAIR

CARLETON CO. REGIMENT WILL EQUIP BAND IN CRIMSON UNIFORMS

The Carleton Light Infantry will hold a fall fair in the Woodstock Armouries on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 16, 17 and 18 it has been announced, for the purpose of equipping their band in uniforms of scarlet. The committees in charge have arranged for all the usual popular games and booths and in addition there will be several entertaining innovations. There will be a door prize of five barrels of potatoes the first night and big door prizes for the other nights.

The band will play concerts both inside and outdoors each evening. There will be a refreshment booth Thursday and Friday and on Saturday starting at 5 o'clock the ladies auxiliary of the B. E. S. L. will serve supper. Admission to the hall will be ten cents.

Woodstock Board of Trade Urges Immediate Extension of Line From Centreville to Grand Falls

Resolution is Passed at Well Attended Meeting and Copies Directed Sent Thornton and Baxter; Motion Passes Without Dissenting Voice

A resolution urging the immediate extension of the Valley Railway from Grand Falls to Edmundston was passed at a well-attended meeting of the Woodstock Board of Trade held in the town council chamber yesterday afternoon. The resolution passed without a dissenting voice after an interesting discussion. G. B. True, president of the board was in the chair.

During the meeting it was reported that persons in close touch with railway affairs were prophesying keen competition between the C. N. R. and C. P. R. It was said that the C. P. R. were planning to use a car ferry between Saint John and Digby and to run their trains through to Halifax direct over the Dominion Atlantic division. It was also stated that the completion of the Valley railway was only a matter of time and that the C. N. R. would then run into Saint John using the proposed bridge over the harbor there.

In answer to a query B. A. Johnston said that potatoes shipped by C. N. R. from Carleton-Victoria would have to go by Fredericton at present, which meant that they would take about two days to get to Edmundston. If the road were extended it would take only a few hours.

The possibility of securing cheaper electricity rates was discussed and stood over until a further meeting.

Copies of the resolution passed were directed sent to Sir Henry Thornton and Premier Baxter.

POTATO MARKET DULL

The potato market was dull all this week with demand light from all sources. Most of the shipments from here were for West Saint John for transshipment to Cuba. The price all week was \$1 a barrel.

OFFICIALS REPORTING PROGRESS

Several Inquiries for Bulbs for Fall Planting Are Received

The proposed movement to beautify Woodstock by growing tulips on the lawns of residences on a larger scale is gathering momentum. If plans of officials of the Civic Improvement Association work out the scheme will take on a form much larger than was originally intended. The idea is to interest other towns along the Upper Saint John river valley in tulip growing in the hope that not only Woodstock but all places along the main highway will benefit, and that visitors passing through this section of country may see a sight that they will long remember.

So far fair progress has been made locally. Several inquiries have come in as to prices for which tulips may be obtained in bulk. The quotations so far received from wholesalers are around \$3.50 a thousand, but it is believed that if a large enough number of householders make application for bulbs that a much lower figure may be obtained. The scheme is far too good a one to be allowed to fall through. The results would be of all proportion to the work and money expended. While several weeks remain in which planting can be done it is important that applications be made as early as possible to A. Gordon Bailey, secretary of the Civic Improvement Association.

Other cities are looking with interest at the idea and awaiting its results. The Saint John Telegraph-Journal recently commented on plan editorially, commending it, wishing it success and expressing the hope that other places might follow suit. The scheme is unquestionably a good one and the citizens are indebted to those who suggested it and to the Improvement Association officials who are co-operating to make it a success.

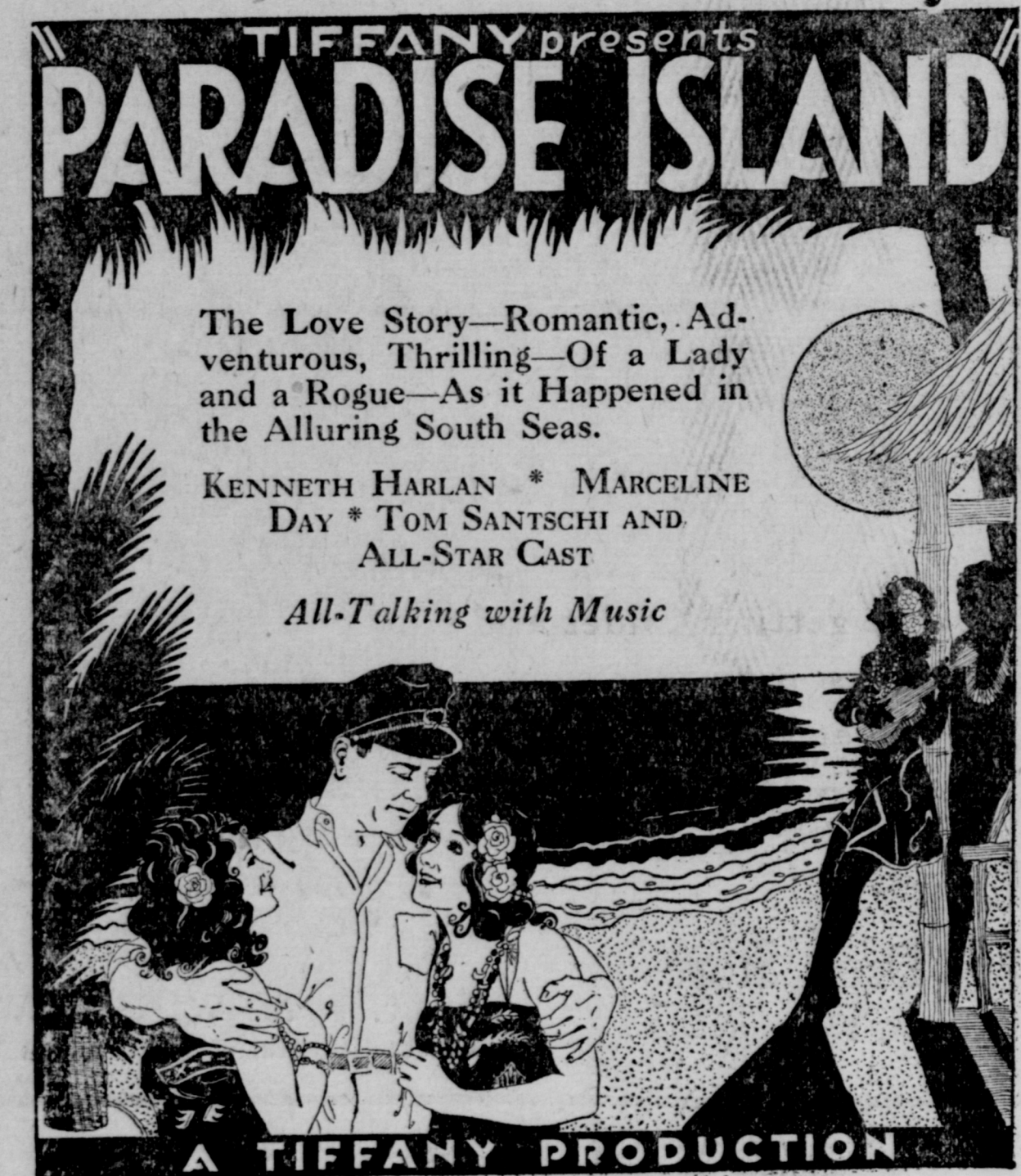
