PLAIN TALK

Considerable comment has been aroused by an address made by Mrs. H. P. Newcomb, of Halifax, president of the Nova Scotia W. C. T. U., at the recent annual convention of that organization. In the course of her address Mrs. Newcomb said: "I confess that it is my solemn belief that the blame for the great growth of the liquor traffic in Canada in the last ten years lies at the door of the Protestant Church of our land. The time has come," she went on, "when the man and woman who kneel in the pew and the man who stands at the pulpit must speak out and say without fear and without favor that this thing that is morally wrong can never be politically right. When that day comes the knell of the liquor traffic is rung."

Mrs. Newcomb is to be commended on her sincerity and her courage, and the W. C. T. U. of Nova Scotia is to be congratulated on their leader. Much may be done where such organizations have leadership of this calibre, supported by members whose sincerity is sufficient for them to uphold the cause they have sponsored.

The amount of good accomplished by such people will naturally be much greater than can be attained by bodies similarly organized but lacking their courageous leadership, and with the same singleness of purpose not apparent among the rank and file. Where parties are acting in office who have been found wanting at critical times, actual harm rather than good is apt to be done, as their followers as a body apt to be misjudged. Such bodies must be able to function with steadfastness and sincerity if they are to be able to accomplish anything.

Unfortunately there can be little or no doubt that Mrs. Newcomb is correct in her statement to a large degree. The position of the Christian church today is being threatened by domination of the liquor traffic under government control. Unconsciously no doubt in most instances, but none the less surely, many of those occupying high places in church and Sunday School life are being brought—it might almost be said forced—either to support the traffic or to withdraw their opposition to it.

The results are inevitable. Either this tendency must come to an end or the church will no longer continue to be, as it has been in the past, the predominating influence for good in private and public life.

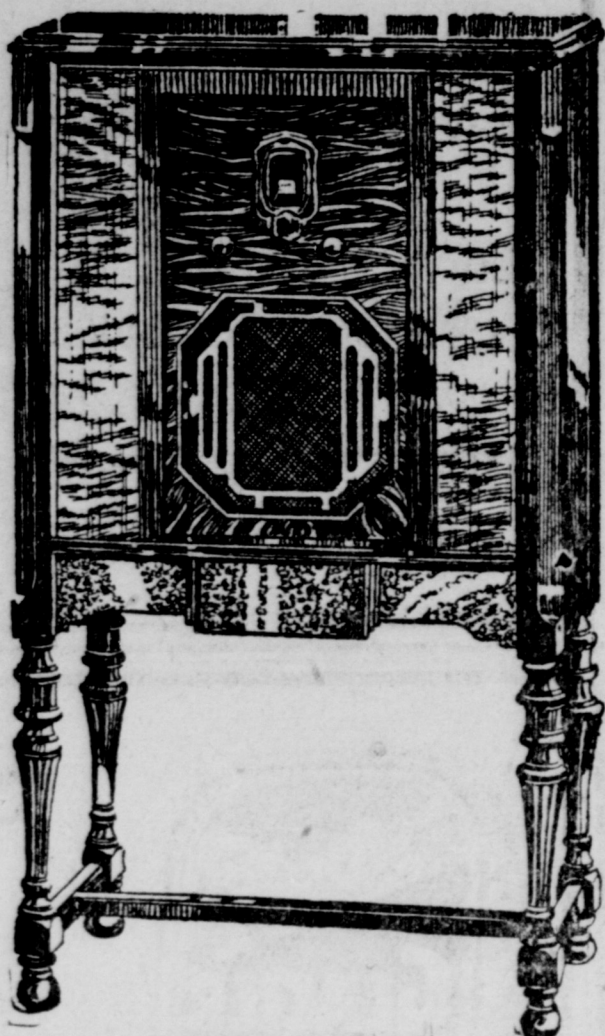
