Demand For Farm Labor Increasing

TRI-PARTITE IMMIGRATION AGREEMENT REPORTED TO BE GETTING GOOD RESULTS

Demand for
Fredericton, N. B. May 2—The demand on the Provincial Department of Immigration for farm laborers and domestic help is greater this season than the supply, according to an interview given the Saint John Telegraph-Journal by Hon. J. A. Murray, Superintendent of Immigration and Industry, who regards the situation as indicating improved conditions in the rural districts of the Province.

The Superintendent is quoted as having stressed the point that farmers desiring help should send in their applications to the department earlier in the season than they have been doing in order to have a sufficient number of farm laborers and domestics brought out to this country. There has been a particularly large demand this season for married couples to

5 Men Drowned Last Sunday at Baker Brook

FRASER COMPANY EMPLOYEES
LOSE LIVES WHEN
BOAT UPSETS

Edmundston, May 4—Their boat capsizing when it struck against piling holding boom logs in the Saint John river at Baker Brook, Madawaska county, 18 miles north of Edmundston, five of 10 men, all employees of the sawmill at Baker Brook of the Fraser Companies, Ltd., were drowned at 6 p. m. Sunday. Three of the five sank and were not seen again. The other two were carried down river.

The men drowned were James Clair; his son Albert; his brother, Thomas; Benoit Daigle and Samuel Bouchard. All of the 10 men in the boat were residents of Baker Brook.

Three men on the shore, seeing the boat upset, made haste to reach the spot in a gasoline boat. Their craft also upset in the swift waters and churning logs. Other men on the shore swung a flat-bottomed boat out into the current, reached the spot in quick time and dragged the eight men aboard.

The lives of two of the 10 men in the first boat were saved by the quick action and strength of Pierre Bouchard, one of the 10 occupants, who laid over the piling, grasped two, Norman Baker and Maxime Bouchard, as they were being swept along by the current and held them, one on either side of the piling, until help arrived.

The 10 employees were returning to Baker Brook from an island. They were given orders to go around the end of the boom and not try to go between its two sections. They failed to follow the directions.

work on farms.

In connection with families being brought out to New Brunswick under the five year agreement between the Provincial, Federal and British Governments, Mr. Murray said that with the close of the present season New Brunswick would have 300 families settled under this agreement. Of the 100 families to be brought out this spring 83 have been reported on as having arrived, in course of transit, or ready to leave Great Britain.

Hon. Mr. Murray said that there would be an inter-provincial conference held at Ottawa in June, when a discussion between the provinces and the Dominion will take place with reference to the attitude of the Dominion Government toward the provinces regarding immigration. Any new immigration policy of the Dominion Government will not affect the present 500 British family agreement, which has yet two years to run, he said.

He declared that immigration of the right type of settlers to New Brunswick, those ready to work the farms of the Province, would without question mean much in the future development of New Brunswick.

The Department, he asserted, is devoting its energies to bringing in only British and Scandinavian families of the best type and are sticking to the policy of quality rather than quantity, which has resulted in all of those brought out to date being placed on farms. Not one he added, is looking for work today, and the unemployment situation of the province has not been unfavorably affected by the bringing in of this class of settlers, who are proving themselves to be excellent types of agriculturalists.

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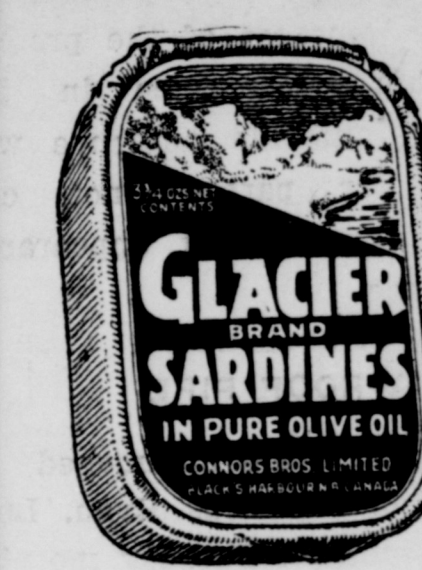
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
