## AGRICULTURAL MEETING

A meeting was held in the town hall on Tuesday evening at the call of the president of the Agricultural Society to draw up rules for the competition to be held this summer the object of the competition being to supplement the summer and fall pastures by growing a suitable soiling crop. It was agreed that the area to be sown should consist of one acre of a mixture of oats, peas and vetches and that the proportion of each grain be left to the judgment of the competitor. The acre may be planted in two or three different sowings with intervals between sowings in order to provide a continuous crop of green feed. There will be ten prizes and entry forms may be obtained from R. W. Maxwell, secretary.
