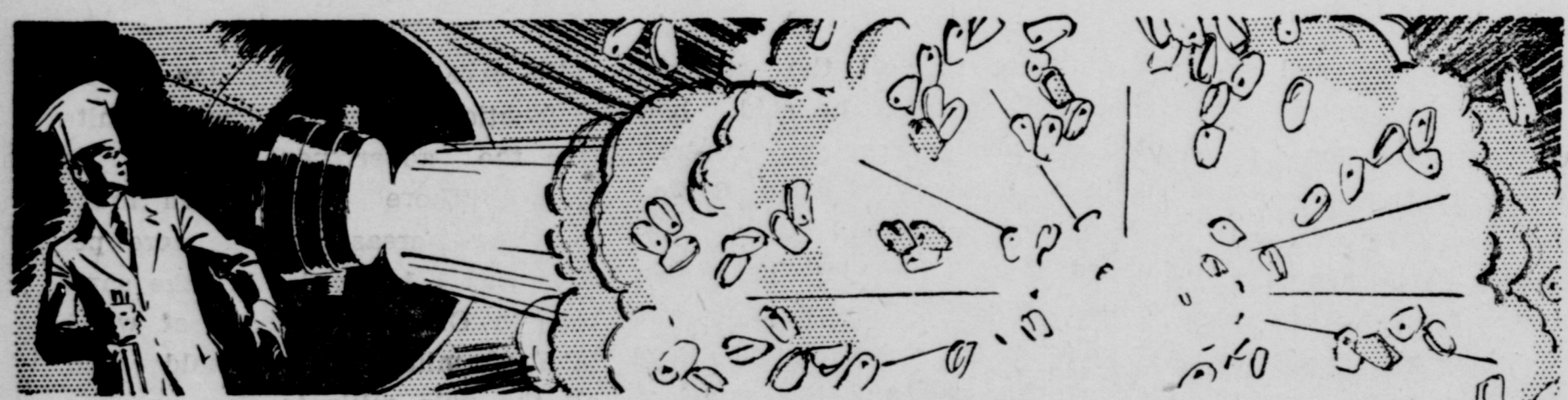

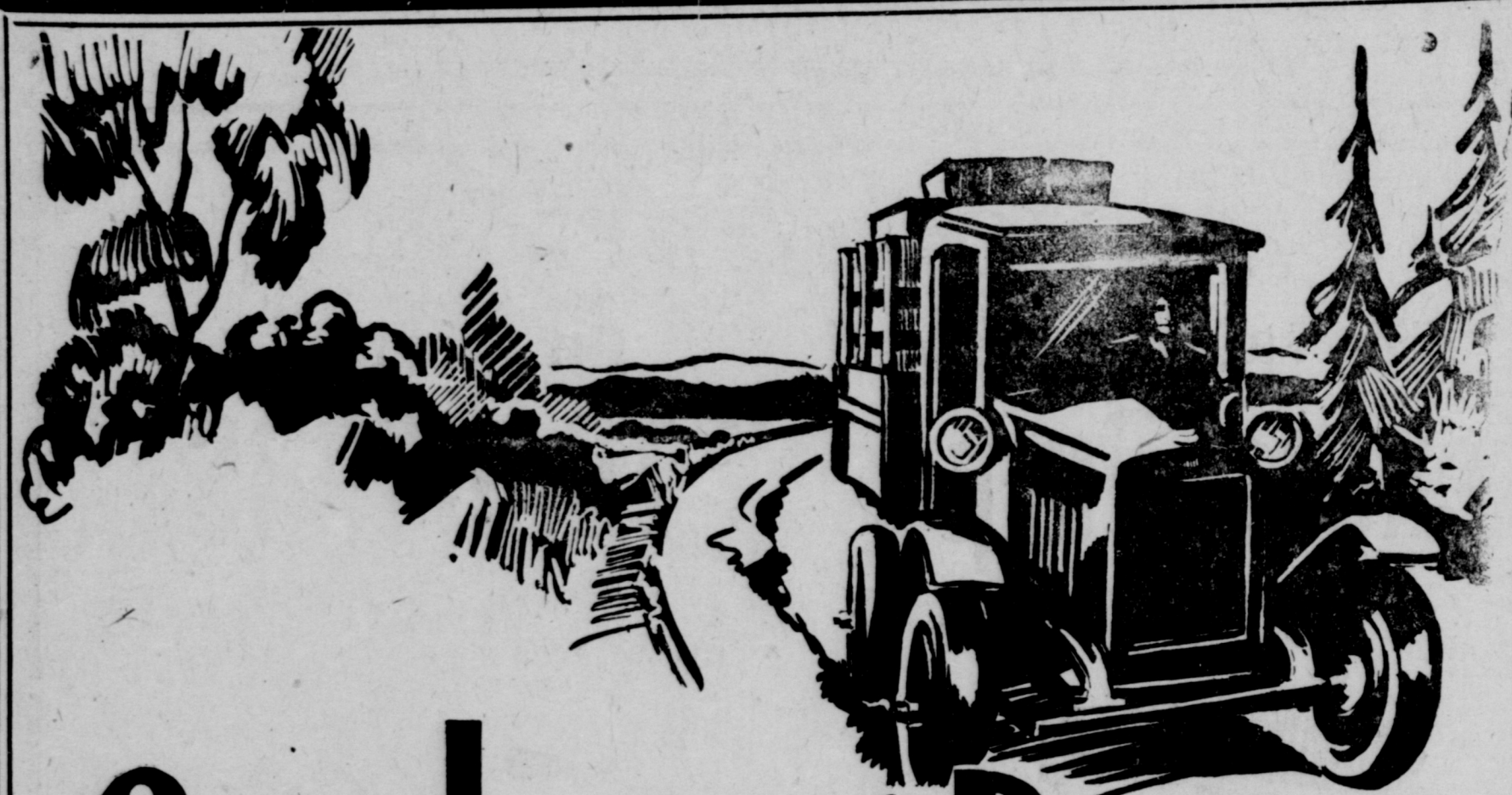

One hour to Destroy Weeks and Weeks to Repair

The damage which can be done to a road in one hour at this season
of the year by a heavily loaded motor truck or a high-powered pas-
senger car travelling at a fast rate of speed may take weeks of work
to repair.

All kinds of roads suffer under heavy weights during the spring pe-
riod when the frost is coming out of the ground. Foundations are
weakened and road surfaces break. Wheels sink into gravel roads
which now are soft and porous.

To prevent needless damage to New Brunswick's Highways motor
traffic has been restricted during the danger period this Spring, but
these restrictions have now been lifted for the entire Province ex-
cept the most northern counties and for all vehicles except trucks
with gross weight of 5,000 pounds or more.

The cost of repair and maintenance of New Brunswick's roads now
amounts to almost a million dollars a year. Owners and drivers of
automobiles will consult their own personal interest by keeping their
loads and speed well within the legal limit at all times.

If you do not speed you save the surface; and, if you save the sur-
face you save the road. If in wet weather you do not load your truck
heavily or drive your car at a rapid rate of speed the road will not
break down. By taking such precautions you lower the cost of
maintenance; but by neglecting them, you increase the cost of which
you must pay your own proportion.

Visiting Angler Gets Record Fish

AMERICAN LANDS 28 POUNDS
SALMON; MANY BIG TROUT
TAKEN

Fredericton, N. B., May 5.—A
bright Atlantic silver salmon weigh-
ing 28 lbs. hooked on Cain's River
on April 28, by David Hayes, Vice
President of General Electric Com-
pany, Bridgeport, Conn., is regard-
ed as the record spring run salmon
ever taken by early anglers in New
Brunswick.

Mr. Hayes was on his first fish-
ing trip to New Brunswick, accom-
panying John Taylor Arms, of
Greenfield Hill, Fairfield, Conn.,
who spends two weeks each spring
with W. Harry Allen's guides on
Cain's River. They were 13 days
making the trip down Cain's River
from Banatol to Howard's the
confluence of Cain's River and the
Sou-west Miramichi, and they
caught and landed 342 salmon, all
of which they returned to the wa-
ters with the exception of two
which they used in the party's lar-
der on the trip and eight apiece
which they took home with them
last evening.

One of the eight fish Mr. Hayes
took with him was the record sal-
mon weighing 28 lbs. and said to
be the largest spring run salmon
ever taken from Cain's River. It was
45 inches long, deep and stocky;
it didn't have the sign of a tooth
left in its head and guides and
others said it was probably 20 years
old. Mr. Hayes was naturally ex-
tremely proud of his record fish;
it was one of 134 salmon he caught
while Mr. Arms, a more experienc-
ed angler, caught 208. "I never
saw such good fishing as there is
on Cain's River this spring," said
Mr. Arms, who has been coming
annually to New Brunswick for six
or more years and is usually the
first fisherman on Cain's River
each spring. He said salmon
seemed more numerous than ever
and they were full of fight, thus
providing great sport for anglers.

Reports from the Sou-West Mira-
michi indicate more salmon are be-
ing caught than in any previous
spring in recent years, at least.
Large numbers of trout weighing
2 lbs. and more are also reported
as being taken daily by the visit-
ing anglers.

Department Gives Out Bulletin

ROADS IN NORTH ARE STILL
CLOSED TO MOTOR
TRAFFIC

Fredericton, N. B., May 3.—The
Highway Division of the Depart-
ment of Public Works issued a
special bulletin today dealing with
conditions of New Brunswick High-
ways Nos. 2 and 11 in Madawaska
and Restigouche Counties where
the ban on all motor vehicle traffic
except light cars and the speed
limit of 20 miles per hour is still
in effect as the frost is only now
coming out of the ground.

Warmer weather and rains are
expected by the Chief Highway En-
gineer to make conditions much
worse than they are at the present
time as covered in the following re-
port from District Highway Engi-
neer L. F. Roy, whose headquarters
are at Campbellton:
Route No. 2.—Quebec boundary—
Grand Falls.

Road fair; frost boils in many
places, but not badly broken. Su-
pervisors at work covering these
with 3" gravel. No dragging to
date.

Route No. 11, Matapedia—Belle-
dune.

Matapedia—Tide Head.—Fair;
snow and ice in places.

Tide Head.—Dalhousie—Good.

Tide Head—McLeod; McLeod—Dal-
housie—Good.

Tide Head—McLeod; McLeod—Dal-
housie Jct.—Frost boils in places
now being gravelled.

Dalhousie Jct.—Dalhousie—First
half has frost boils in places, now
being gravelled. Last half good, all
dry.

In Dalhousie Town very bad on
account of water and sewer pipes
being installed.

Dalhousie—Charlo—Fair; few
spots wet and ice.

Charlo—New Mills—Fair.

At New Mills—one mile bad, ice
and water.

New Mills—Bellefleur—Fair with
few spots covered with ice.

All restrictions, except for trucks
with gross weight over 5,000 lbs.,
have been lifted for all the main
trunk roads of the Province of New
Brunswick except those listed a-
bove and Route No. 11—A, the
shortcut through the woods from
Bathurst to Newcastle.

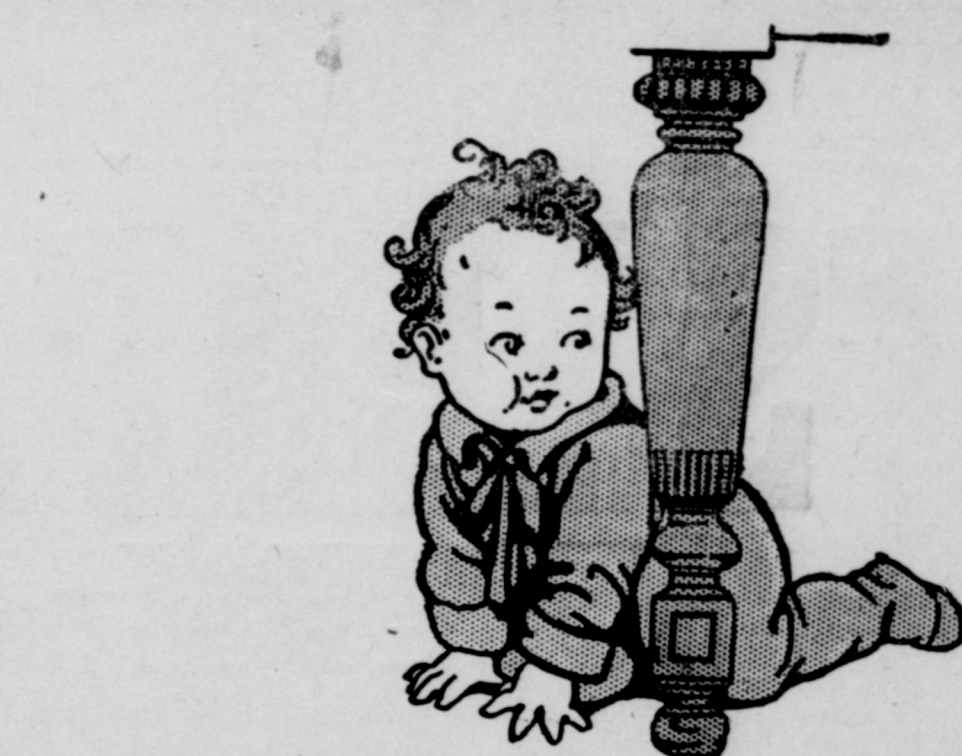
