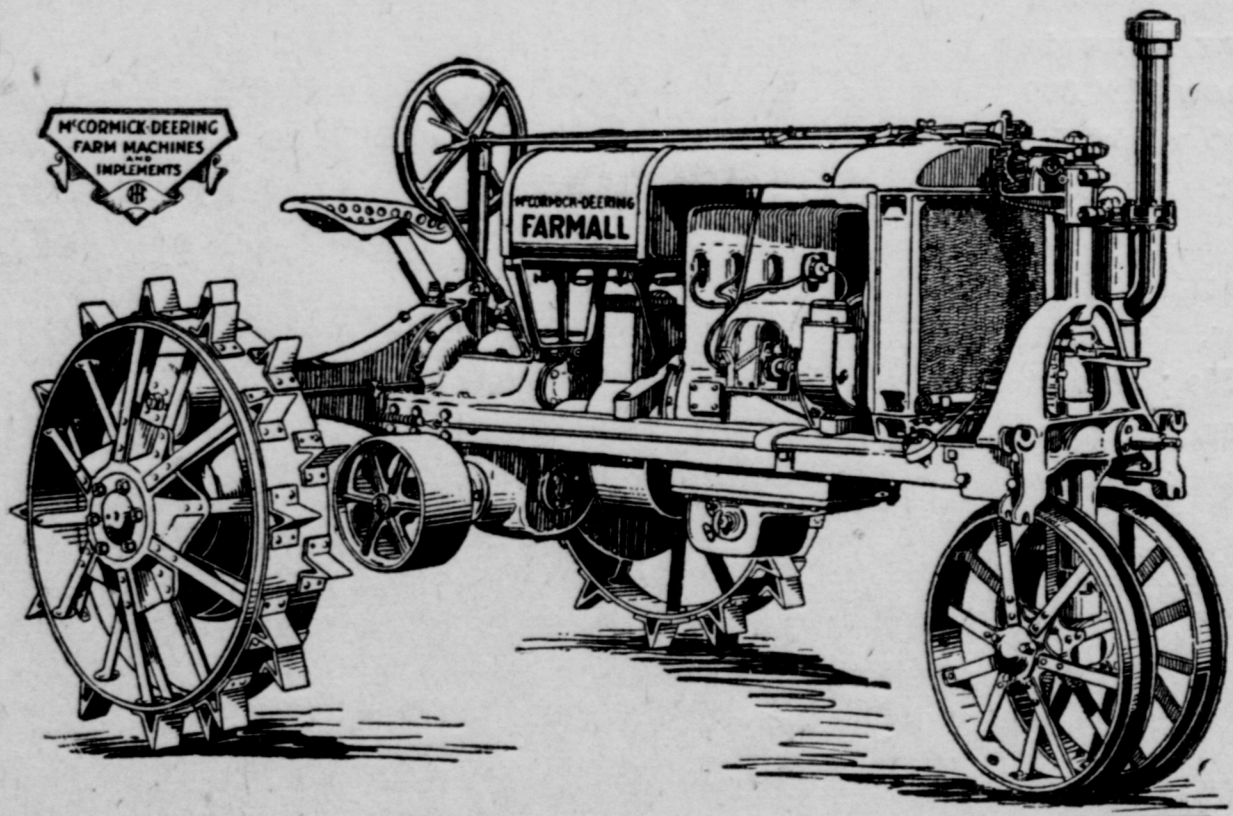

SEED POTATOES

FOR PLANTING

Good seed is the first requirement for a satisfactory crop, and seed is not good unless it is disease-free.

It is extremely difficult to grow and store potatoes in such manner that they are entirely free from diseases and mechanical injuries when removed from storage in the spring; but, by careful grading the majority of these undesirable tubers can be discarded before planting.

If, however, Dominion Government Certified Seed is used, the best possible results will be obtained because in order to pass the rigid inspection for this grade the seed must be true to type, free from cuts and bruises and contain a minimum of serious diseases.

When selecting your seed potatoes for planting, discard all undersized tubers, they are apt to be the progeny of either mosaic or leafroll plants which always produce small unmarketable potatoes. Avoid the use of excessively elongated or pointed tubers, because this type is characteristic of a disease called spindle tuber, which is transmissible through the seed, and greatly reduces the yield of the crop. Remove all tubers that show any signs of rot, either wet or dry, because a number of organisms which exist in rotted potatoes, when placed in the soil give rise to such destructive disease as late blight, black leg rhizoctonia and scab.

When cutting seed before planting never use tubers showing internal brown netting or discoloured areas, because these sets may produce diseased plants in the field.

If the best results are desired from the succeeding crop, plant only potatoes that are smooth, good type, uniform in size and free from

bruises, rots or disease symptoms of any kind. If procurable always use Dominion Government Certified Seed.

SHIPMENTS INCREASE

Statistics compiled by the Dominion Fisheries Branch show that shipments of Maritime fish to Central and Western Canada have increased annually during the last three years. In 1927 shipments totalled 38,440,481 pounds. In 1928 they increased by nearly 1,200,000 pounds, and in 1929 they reached a total of 43,677,854 pounds. A large business is also done with the United States, the figures for 1929 being 16,545,655 pounds. These fish moved by railway freight and express.

IS FASTEST TRAIN

The Canadian National Railways are putting into operation this month a six hour train between Montreal and Toronto. This train, the International Limited, covering the 234 miles in 360 minutes, will be the fastest train in the world for that distance. The train will cover the entire distance from Montreal to Chicago in eighteen hours.

The total cut of lumber on the crown lands of New Brunswick during the current season, is estimated at the equivalent of 212,000,000 feet.

With a prepared acreage greater by 31 per cent. than that of 1929, a better moisture situation and other indications presaging general good conditions for the year, the Canadian West is now busy seeding, according to the latest report of the agricultural department of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Nearly \$28,000,000 was voted by the Ontario Legislature recently for hydro-electric development work to be undertaken this year in the province for the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, a provincial government organization. Over \$18,000,000 is to be spent on the extension of the Niagara hydro system, upon which many millions have already been spent to provide cheap electric power over a wide area of rural and urban territory.

"There is a very large amount of capital in England ready for investment and it is felt in that country that it should go to Canada," said Major L. A. Jones, economic editor of the London Morning Post, who landed recently at Saint John from S.S. Duchess of Atholl, on a trip to Canada for the purpose of fostering better economic relations between the Dominion and the Motherland.

Four new game refuges adding 500 square miles to the existent 640 square miles of game sanctuaries in New Brunswick are to be established in that province for the purpose of preservation of the game supply, according to information given out by Hon. Charles D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines.

Fish caught by commercial fishermen in Canadian waters last year had a value of about \$55,000,000. Over 100 countries bought fish and fish products from the Dominion in 1929, valued at \$38,000,000. More than 80,000 persons find employment in Canada in the fishing industry.

The wild rose is now the floral emblem of the province of Alberta. The provincial parliament has enacted the legislation making this flower which grows so profusely all over Alberta, the provincial symbol. Choice of the emblem was put up to the school children of Alberta and the wild rose captured most votes, with the tiger lily next in favor.

Homestead entries taken out through the Dominion Land Office at Edmonton during the month of March last broke all records for that month with a total of 277 homesteads and 19 soldier grants which compares with 230 homesteads in March, 1928, the previous record March.

Contrary to the general impression, Canadian investments in the United States are greater, per capita, than American investments in the Dominion. An official statement just issued shows that the average Canadian has \$100 invested in the United States and the average American about \$29 invested in Canada.

Something more than appearance will be necessary for grain to win a prize at the World's Grain Exhibition and Conference to be held at Regina, July 25 to August 6, 1932. All entries getting into the prize money at this Exhibition will be expected, be in demand for seed. It is because of the importance of the effect of the distribution of this prize seed to farmers in Canada and throughout the world that the Awards Committee has decided that the usual judging standards will be supplemented by a growing test, which in reality is the test supreme.

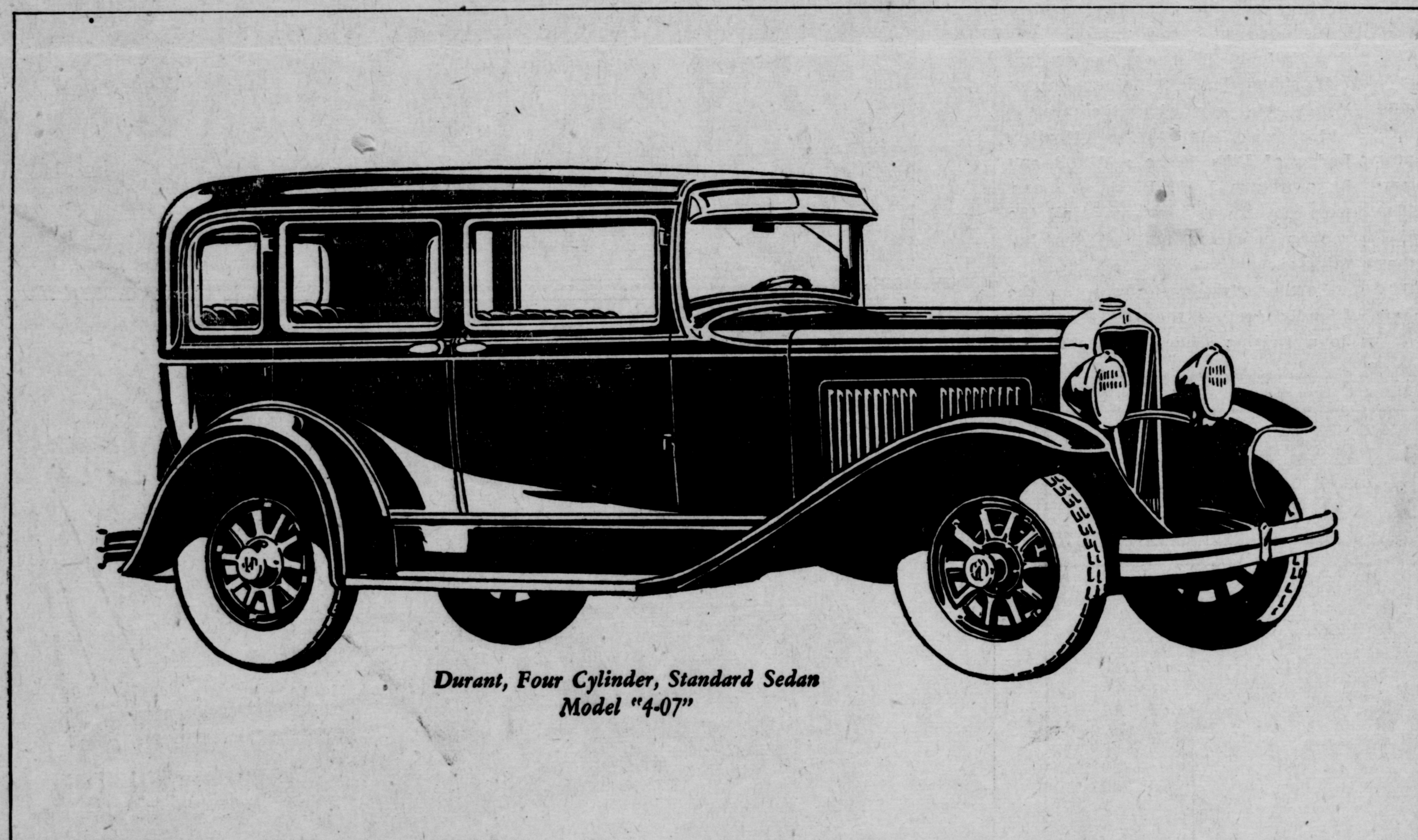
