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REVISED TARIFF IS BLOW TO CARLETON CO. FARMERS

DUTIES GO UP ON FARM MACHINERY

Will Increase Cost of Production Without Any Adequate Return

The revised tariff has not been received with favor in Carleton County by adherents of any political party. There is a general feeling here that the new rates will have an immediate effect of increasing the cost of production to the farmer without giving him any adequate return. It is felt that the new tariff can hardly be of much assistance in reducing unemployment. The question is being asked if a high tariff means employment why are conditions in the United States so bad at the present time.

The feeling is growing that already Premier Bennett has shown his hand and disclosed that he intends to govern this country for the benefit of the monied classes, of which he himself is one, together with many of his followers in the House of Commons, and that his administration will not have the best interests of the masses of citizenry at heart.

It is feared that with fertilizer, farm machinery and implements costing much more than under the old tariff that many New Brunswick farmers will give up their places here and follow those who have gone to Maine to make a living.

The present and former duties on a few articles used in crop production are shown to demonstrate the added burden to the farmer.

Cultivators, harrows, seed drills, horse-hoes, etc., Old duty 7 per cent, new 25 per cent. Ploughs, rollers, etc., old 10 per cent, new 25 per cent. Mowing machines, harvesters, threshing machines, etc., old, 6 per cent, new 25 per cent.

Planting of Tulips on Big Scale Is Suggested as Way Of Beautifying Woodstock

An excellent suggestion for beautifying Woodstock has been advanced by a citizen and discussed with approval by the Civic Improvement Association. That is that the citizens should grow tulips in front of their houses. This is a thing that could easily be done by almost every householder in Woodstock, and one that would make this town in the spring months a thing of beauty. The effect of street-long beds of tulips can easily be imagined, and the sight would be one that

would be worth visitors coming a long way to see. The result produced would be out of all proportion to the cost as the price of good tulip bulbs is about \$4 a hundred retail, and would be considerably less if some system of bulk purchasing could be arranged. Such a system will probably be worked out if enough citizens are interested. All who are interested in the plan are asked to communicate with A. FARMERS HOLD OFF FOR RISE

Are Storing Their Stock in Expectation of Improvement

Potato prices took a drop during the last week, falling from a peak of \$1.35 to \$1.50 on Friday to \$1 a barrel, which figure has prevailed for the last few days. Demand from Upper Canada has been poor since the first of the week. There have been some shipments made to West Saint John for Cuba, but the demand from this source has not been great, offerings were much more than sufficient to fill all orders. The C. P. R. handled five carloads in the Woodstock area yesterday as compared with nine the day before and six on Tuesday.

Hauling early in the week was general but fell off owing to lack of demand and was almost at a standstill yesterday. Farmers, in some cases acting on the advice of the dealers, are now storing stock. It is expected that better prices will prevail later on, although there is no sign of an immediate pick-up.

Civic Improvement Association Reports Much Good Work Accomplished in Its First Year

The Civic Improvement Association met in the town hall this evening and heard reports of committees and transacted routine business. The treasurer reported some debts outstanding in connection with cleaning up the Connell street property, and that while some of the property owners in the area affected had contributed to the cost others did not seem disposed to do so. There was a discussion on the possibility of householders planting tulips on all streets, which it was pointed out could be done to as

good advantage in Woodstock as anywhere, owing to the large number of homes having lawns and gardens in front. Interested citizens were asked to communicate with the secretary, A. Gordon Bailey.

Fire Department Gets Second Call to Burned Building

An outbreak in the ruins of the Kerrigan & Everett building, destroyed by fire on Saturday, gave the fire department a half hour battle Tuesday night. Members of the department were summoned by telephone by neighbors who noticed smoke coming from a partition. Several of them responded and cutting away the partition found a stubborn blaze in the sawdust which the space between the walls was stuffed. Finding it impossible to put out the fire themselves they turned in an alarm. The rest of the department responded and with one stream were able to end the trouble in about fifteen minutes.

DAMAGE IS \$35,000 IN BIG BLAZE

Kerrigan & Everett are Principal Sufferers in Saturday Morning Fire

Two firemen suffered injuries and several others had narrow escapes from falling walls and roofs when fire swept the old "flatiron" building situated at the corner of Broadway and Lower Main streets on Saturday morning. Three large buildings and a barn were burned and damage estimated at \$35,000 was done.

W. B. Manzer and A. D. McCloskey had miraculous escapes from death when they were trapped on the third floor by a falling roof. Both suffered cuts and bruises but returned to duty after receiving treatment. It was Woodstock's most serious fire in several years and only the excellent work of the fire department prevented a large section of the town being wiped out. It was the first time they had found it necessary to turn the water on in more than four months.

Kerrigan & Everett are the principal sufferers. The fire originated in a service station owned by them, spread to their large adjoining building, the bottom floor of which contained an automobile and farm machinery business, and the upper two floors being used as a tenement. The fire jumped to the hide and junk store of Phillip Isaacson which was badly gutted. Kerrigan & Everett have some insurance, but not nearly enough to cover their loss.

Most of the effects of the tenants were saved with the exception of the furniture of William Bull, on the top floor, which was a total loss. Four cars were destroyed in the service station, three of them old ones, but one a new one belonging to John Harrington. Other occupants of the Kerrigan & Everett building whose homes were destroyed were Fred Harrington, Robert Carr, Jesse Stairs and C. R. Stairs.

George Britton's shoe repair shop was also destroyed.

The fire broke out about 8 o'clock and almost immediately an oldrum

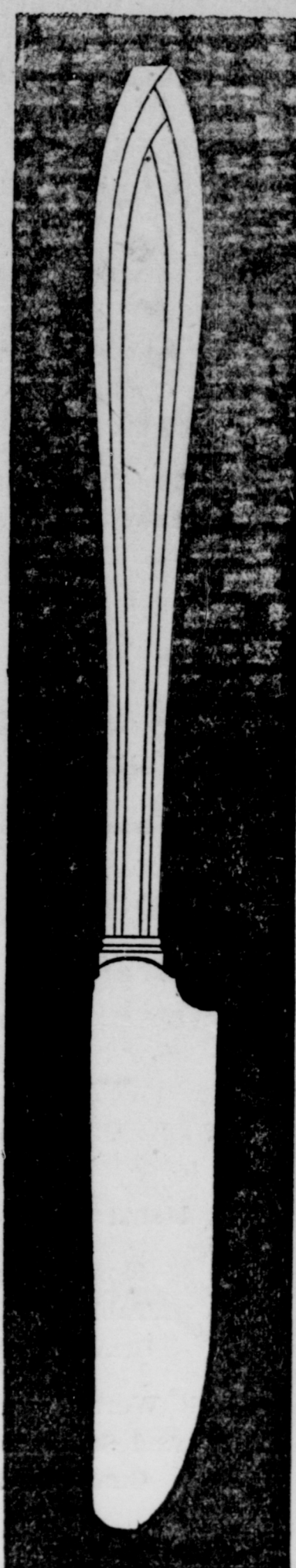
