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MR. JONES DISPOSES OF PROPAGANDA STORY AT DEBEC

Society to Beautify Woodstock is Formed And Elects Officers

A Society for the beautifying of Woodstock was formed at an organization meeting held in the town council chamber on Friday evening. R. W. Maxwell, presided and introduced to the meeting C. H. Smith, of the Bangor Canadian Club. Mr. Smith explained that the opinion of that body was that Woodstock, as one of the principal gateways to the Maritimes from the United States ought to be made as attractive as possible.

It ought to be a source of pride to all Canadians, including those resident in the United States, Mr. Smith said, to be able to say: "This is a Canadian town," and point to streets which are beautiful. With this Bangor were prepared to make a large number of people, living in to see just what financial support

Several of these people, Mr. Smith said, had already been approached and has expressed themselves as strongly in favor and willing to contribute. It was the opinion of the Bangor Club that the response would be general.

Mr. Smith's remarks were followed by a general discussion, after which the chairman named the following nominating committee: Mrs. E. W. Mair, Mrs. F. B. Carvell, J. D. Winslow, Mrs. F. O. Creighton, Gordon Bailey. Following their report the following officers were elected: president, J. Douglas Winslow; vice president, Mrs. George Gibson; secretary-treasurer, Gordon Bailey; executive committee, John Lee, chairman, Mrs. James Foster, Mrs. Charles Comben, Mrs. F. B. Carvell, Mrs. C. V. Clark.

Ways and means of cleaning up the town and beautifying it were discussed and several places mentioned which could be improved. It was decided that the executive would meet and hold a preliminary survey of the town in the near future.

CHARLES FOSTER IS ALSO FINED FOR SETTING BRUSH FIRES

Charles Foster, of Lansdowne, was sent up for trial by Magistrate Stewart on Wednesday afternoon at Hartland, on a charge of stealing a horse shoe from a neighbor, James Campbell. He was also fined \$10 for setting brush fires without a permit. Evidence was given by the complainant, Daniel Hamilton and Frank Rideout. M. L. Hayward appeared for the prosecution and R. Wilmot Sealey for the defense.

Provincial police going to Foster's home on Monday to arrest him on the theft charge found him setting brush fires on a knoll a short distance from a forest land. As there was a strong wind blowing they put out the fire, took Foster into custody and laid an additional charge against him.

MRS. WRIGHT GIVES FINE ADDRESSES IN CARLETON COUNTY

DOMINION W. C. T. U. HEAD HEARD IN SCATHING DENUNCIATION OF GOVT. CONTROL.

Mrs. Gordon Wright, of London, Ont., Dominion secretary of the W. C. T. U., began a speaking tour of Carleton county this week. Mrs. Wright arrived here on Saturday and on Sunday addressed a large meeting at Meductic. On Sunday evening she spoke again in the Reformed Baptist Church, Woodstock, and she has since given addresses in Hartland, Bristol, Glassville and other places.

Mrs. Wright had been advertised to speak at the Capitol theatre but it was found necessary to make a last minute switch to the church. In spite of this and of stormy weather the large auditorium was filled to overflowing, and the audience, composed of some of the most representative men and women of the town and district, followed the speaker with close attention and evident sympathy during the course of her address.

Mrs. Wright told her hearers that all Canada was watching New Brunswick at the present time and that prohibitionists all over the country were prayerfully awaiting the result of the election on June 19. She dealt with the argument that prohibition was not an issue in the election and pointed out that the Opposition had promised a plebiscite. That was the thing, Mrs. Wright said, for which temperance people were working in Ontario, and was what the premier of Ontario had said would never be granted while he held his office.

Mrs. Wright told of the methods that had been used to secure a majority.

St. John Minister Deals With Moral Issue in Election

DR. H. E. THOMAS CRITICIZES GOVERNMENT FOR BETRAYING ITS PLEDGES TO PUBLIC.

Saint John, N. B., June 1.—In Carleton Street Church here on Sunday evening the minister, Dr. H. E. Thomas dealt with the moral issue in the present political life of the Province, and making brief reference to the temperance question. He claimed that the course of any one who was in sympathy with the present law was quite clear and it was to support the government which gave it; but this ought to be done with eyes which were wide open. To support a Government candidate anywhere was to give support to a law which had forced the liquor into the automobile and the

Opposition Chieftain States He Will Serve As Premier if Chosen

New Chieftain is Heard in Ringing Messages at Debec and Woodstock With His Running Mates, Messrs Smith and Brown

GETS GREAT RECEPTION IN HIS HOME TOWN.

Government Policies Are Strongly Assailed Warns Members of Liquor Commission To Resist Before Election; Government Accused of Wasteful Extravagance

"I wish to state in the most positive terms that if we are successful I will be premier of this province and I will remain in that position until the pledges which the Opposition party have made are carried out." Such was the statement made at Debec on Monday night by Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., Opposition leader, in addressing a large and enthusiastic meeting in the Foresters' Hall. Thereby he disposed of propaganda being used against him and his party that he was leading the Opposition merely for election purposes. The meeting was also addressed by Mr. Jones' running mates in Carleton county, Fred W. Smith and Fred K. Brown.

The Candidates were heard again at Woodstock in the Capitol Theatre on Thursday evening and Mr. Jones, making his first public address in his home town since convention day a month ago received a rousing reception. Mayor G. C. Campbell presided and introduced the speakers.

Mr. Jones exhibited a caricature of himself in a Saint John newspaper. "I am becoming famous," he said "They are drawing pictures of me. And I expect to become still more famous, for I am going to be premier of this province."

Mr. Jones went on that the cartoon showed a mighty vessel, doubtless constructed from the New Brunswick forests which the government had given the International Company. He himself was shown in a small rowboat, probably built from what was left. He was supposed to be taking passengers, who were the voters off the ship. Evidently he had been successful for only one man was left in sight, and it would be agreed that that man's face an exceptionally stupid one. Nevertheless he had hopes of getting even that one.

It would be noted that there were no lifeboats on the vessel and the captain and crew were missing. Doubtless the Yankee captain, Graustein, and the premier and his colleagues had taken to the boats and decamped. The crew were also out of sight. Probably they were below decks looking for anything the premier and his friends had left.

Mr. Jones criticized the government for the way they had run up the public debt. This had been increased by \$7,000,000 or by \$13,000,000 when it was considered that

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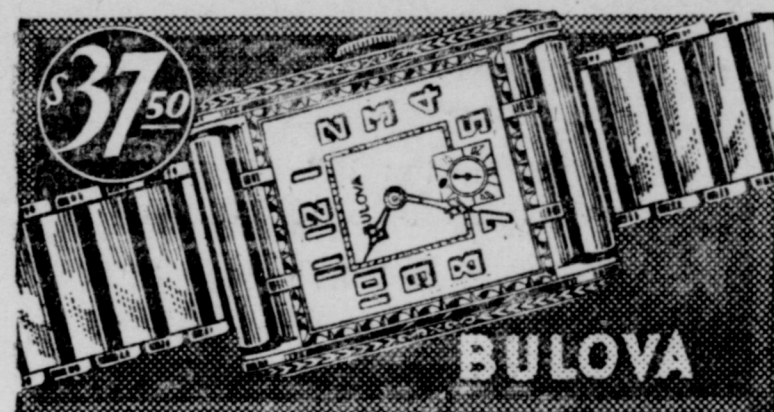
