Mr. and Mrs. Jasper Crane of East Hodgson, were guests of friends in town last Sunday.

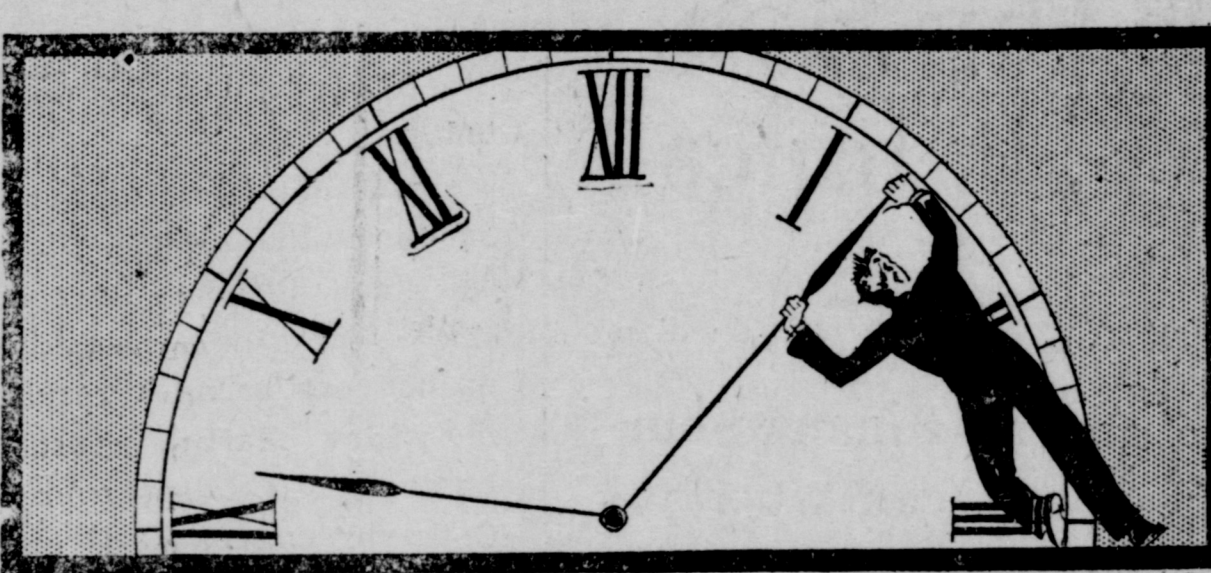
SHIPPERS TO MEET
