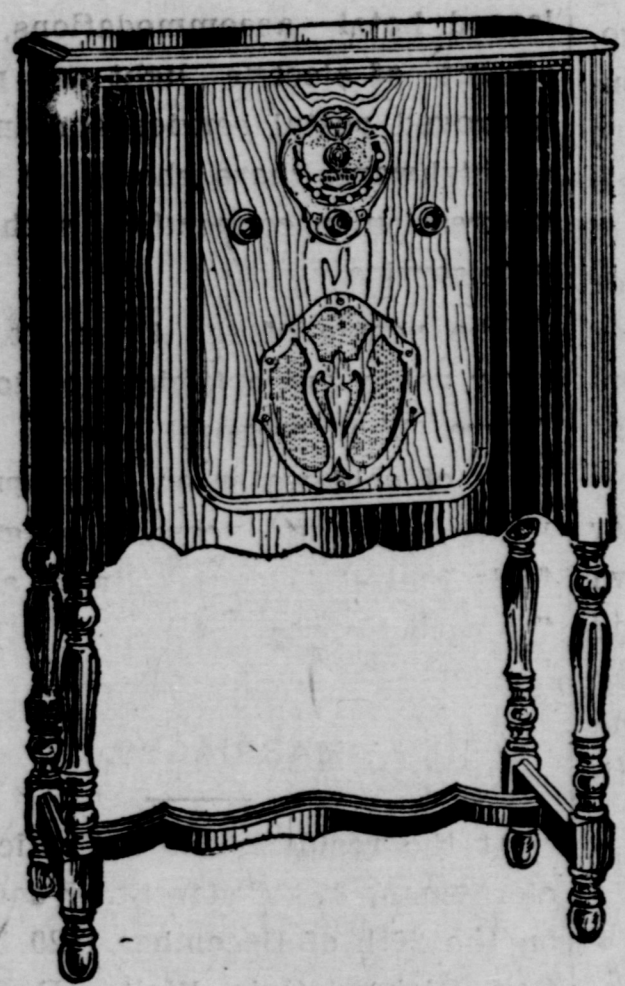

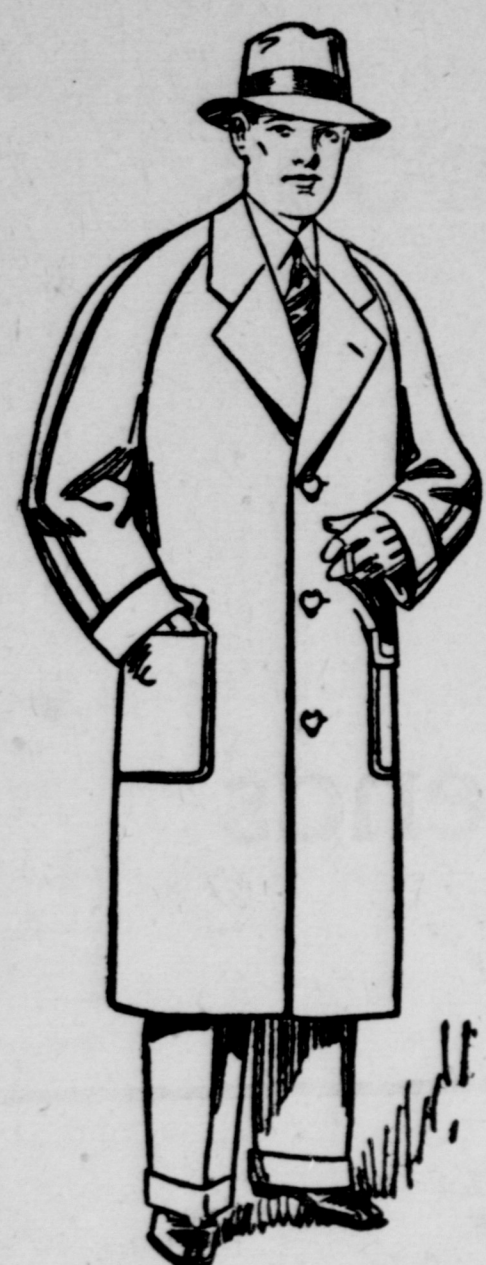

URUGUAY FIRST TO ATTACK PROBLEM UNDER PROVISIONS OF OLD AGE PENSION LAW.

Worry over what is to become of able-bodied men and women who have to seek new employment after they have reached the age of 45 is not confined to Canada.

Uruguay is the first country to attack the problem directly. Under the general provisions of its old age pension law the government has just issued a decree which requires that all government and public utility pay rolls must carry enough people more than 45 years old to equal 10 per cent of the total number of persons on such pay rolls.

While it may be questioned that this decree will really accomplish anything, it is significant as a recognition by the government of Uruguay that an old-age question is coming which cannot be entirely met by a pension system specific taxes which are set aside in the pension law to meet the requirements of that law as it stands.

The doubt as to the practical efficiency of the law is based upon statistics available for Canada rather than those of Uruguay; but, assuming that the age distribution among occupied people over 15 years of age is substantially the same in both countries, it becomes apparent that the government decree referred to does not go far enough.

Of the persons over 15 years of age who are gainfully occupied in Canada 28.3 per cent are over 45 years of age. In fact 4.1 per cent are 65 years and over. The decrease, therefore, that not less than 10 per cent and public utility corporations must be 45 years and over will not absorb those over that age.

The real significance of the decree of the republic is not in any practical effect that it may have, but in the fact that there should be any governmental action in this direction at all.

ONE DISH CAN MAKE A COOK FAMOUS

There is so much entertaining to be done in the holiday and the winter season. Each member of the family wants a party of some kind, mother tries to pay back her invitations by having a few tables of bridge at a time and when she is out father often has a "stag". At times like this there is always the hurry at the last minute for attractive and appetizing food to be served.

A lunch cake, which is very quickly made and is a great favorite with those who often have to "hurry up" a last minute lunch is convenient to keep on hand.

The recipe is: 5 eggs, 1 cup of white sugar, 1 lb. seeded raisins, 1/2 pound orange and citron peel, 1/2 lb. butter, 1 small bottle marachino cherries. Cream butter and sugar, add the eggs, one at a time, and beat five minutes after each egg. Add fruit. Bake well in moderate oven.

CANADA IS LARGEST RADIO CUSTOMER

Electrical apparatus from the United States, particularly radio equipment and electric refrigerators, shows continued gains in foreign markets, particularly in Canada, and October shipments reached the highest peak since 1921, according to a statement recently issued by the Department of Commerce.

Foreign shipments of electrical apparatus from the United States for the month of October, 1929, amounted to \$14,919,994, a gain of \$4,608,374 compared with the same month last year, according to preliminary figures just issued by the electrical division.

The value of exports of such equipment for the 10 month's period ending October 31, 1929, reached \$123,583,531 against \$89,622,297 for the corresponding period last year. Throughout the year radio apparatus and electric refrigerators have steadily continued to find increasing foreign markets and these two commodities have accounted for the largest individual gains. There was an increase of 100% in the export of radio apparatus as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

Canada was the largest purchaser of receiving sets with Mexico next. Canada was also the most important purchaser of radio receiving components and the value of such purchases amounted to \$615,285.

Exports of refrigerators to Canada during this period amounted to \$115,629.

TOTAL CROP HARVESTED IS 23 PER CENT LESS THAN LAST YEAR.

The potato crop for the United States totals 357,451,000 bushels compared with 465,350,000 the revised estimate for 1928 and 382,756,000 bushels the average production of the five years 1923-1927. This estimate is 23% less than last year's harvest and nearly 7% below the five year average. The smaller production this year is the result of both a reduction in acreage was reduced 12% from that of 1928 and yield per acre is 13% lower than in 1928. The total value of 1929 potato crop, based on December 1 prices, is 87% greater than the 1928 crop. An analysis of the entire potato situation will be made in connection with the January 1 stocks report to be issued about the middle of January.

A review of the distribution of the 1929 potato crop is of interest at this time. The crop this year for the United States, totalling 357,451,000 bushels, is for comparative purposes similar to the 1926 crop, totalling 354,328,000 bushels. The potato crop in the southern states Va., N. C. S. C., Ga., Fla., Tenn., Ala., Miss., La., Texas, Okla., Ark. N. Mex., Ariz.) was about 21% below that of 1928 but 17% above average and about ten million bushels greater than in 1926.

The crop in important states of deficient production (Del., Md., W. Va., Ohio, Ind., Ill., Ky., Iowa, Mo., N. H. Vt., Mass., R. I., Conn.) total 68,323,000 bushels which is about 23% less than harvested last year and 4% below the five year average. The crop in these states is nearly 14 million bushels greater than in 1926. Production in these states is located close to centers of consumption.

The 1929 potato crop is particularly light in all of the important late surplus states except Maine. The crop for these states (Maine, N. Y., N. J., Penn., Mich., Wisc., Minn., N. D.) totals 176 million bushels, or about 25% less than harvested last year and nearly 14% below the five year average. In spite of the Maine potato crop exceeding the 1926 total by about 11 million bushels, production for this group of states is 14 million bushels less than in 1926.

Production in the western minor surplus states (S. D., Neb., Kan., Mont., Wyo., Colo., Idaho, Wash., Ore., Calif., Utah, Nev.) is about 20% less than harvested last year and nearly 4% below average. The 1929 crop exceeds that of 1926 by three million bushels.

Potato production in the New England States at 56,512,000 is the highest total on record for New England. This total compares with 55,355,000 bushels expected a month ago. 48,532,000 bushels harvested last year and 47,253,000 bushels the five year average production. In Maine the potato crop totals 47,644,000, or 2.5 million bushels greater than the record crop of 1924. The acreage planted in 1929, however, was 20% greater than in 1924. This production compares with 39,820,000 bushels the revised estimate for 1928 and 36,944,600 bushels the average production of the five years 1923-1927. Production in the other New England States is only slightly above that of a year ago and about one million bushels above average.—Fort Fairfield Review.

PHANTOM "ESTATES" STILL FLEECE THE PUBLIC

A warning to Canadians and Americans invited to speculate in "estate" claims in "the Bank of England" or "in chancery" has been issued.

These claims, the warning states, are in all cases non-existent. Despite this fact some 200 to 300 letters are received every year inquiring about these "fantastic fortunes or estates".

The warning is issued on the basis of a report sent to the American Consul General in London, Albert Halstead. The announcement follows:—

The Department of State has been informed that the vast fortunes or unclaimed estates believed to be "in chancery" or in "the Bank of England" awaiting disposition to heirs, are, in fact, non-existent. Among such may be mentioned the so-called "Sir Francis Drake Estate", the "Blake Millions", the "Jennings Estate", the "Townley Estate" the "Redges Estate" and other fantastic fortunes or estates in England, to which numerous credulous persons in United States and Canada are reported to have made contributions in money to various organizations or agents, either in this country or in England, in the hope of sharing in the distribution thereof. Before contributing to such schemes definite information should be obtained by those who believed themselves to be heirs.

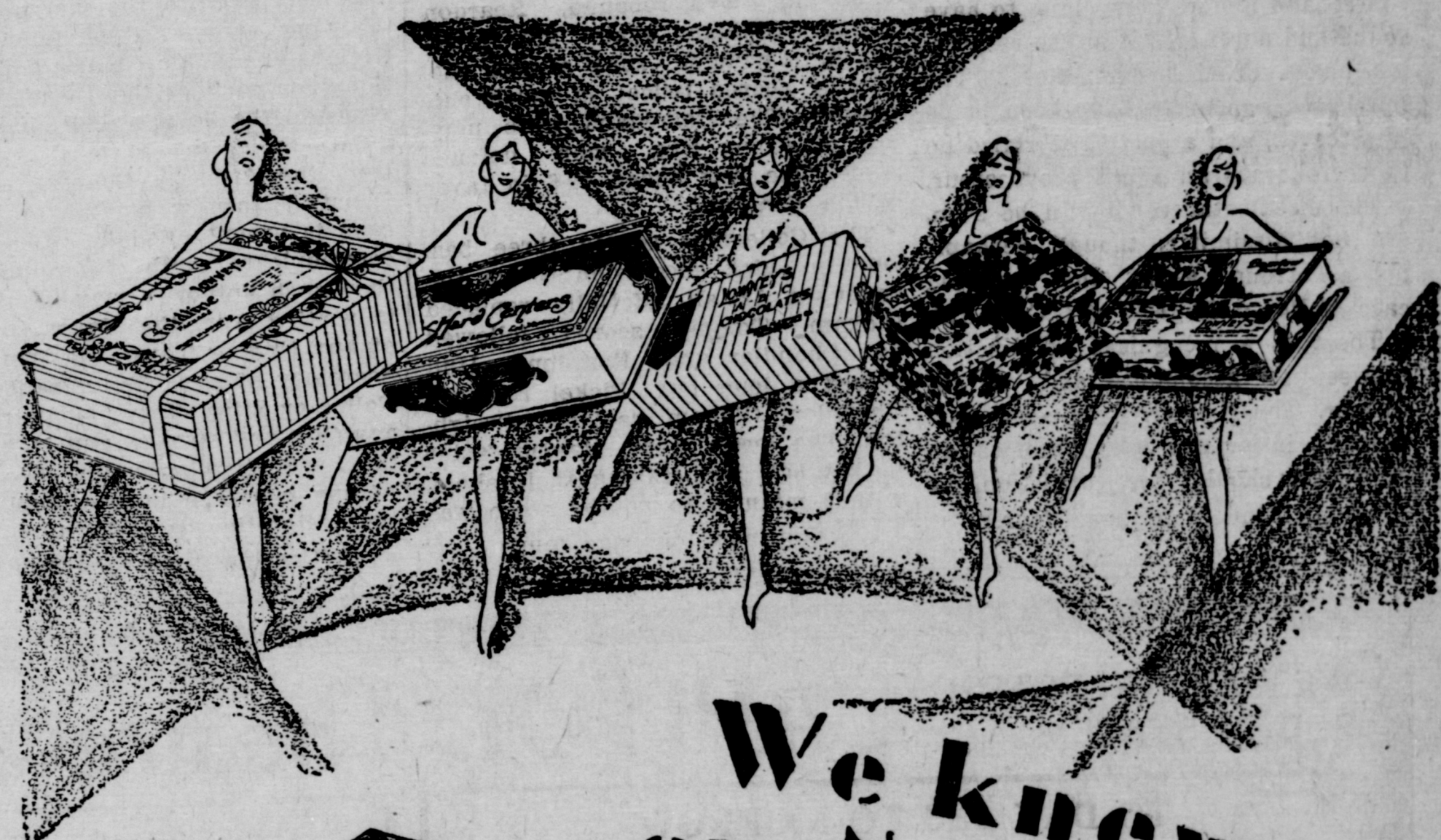
