NOMINATION PROCEEDINGS ARE SET FOR JULY 21

Candidates Are in Field in 8 Ridings

CAMPAIGN EXPECTED TO LIVE UP LOCALLY WITHIN NEXT FEW DAYS

With election day less than three weeks away preparations for the choosing of a Dominion Parliament are going forward merrily. Nomination Day in New Brunswick will be on July 21, one week before polling date. Most of the constituencies throughout Canada will conduct their nomination proceedings on the same day, although July 14 has been appointed for this purpose in some districts.

Victoria-Carleton on work on behalf of the candidates, A. R. Foster, M. P., for the Liberals, and B. Frank Smith, for the Conservatives, has so far been largely restricted to committee and organization activities, but both sides are planning for meetings in the near future, and the campaign is expected to enter upon its more spectacular aspects within the next few days.

So far both parties in New Brunswick have their tickets in the field in eight constituencies, and the Liberals in Saint John-Albert are nominating their candidates today. Those already nominated are:

Only 1 Fire For June in Woodstock

WATER NOT TURNED ON ONCE TOWN MANAGER REPORTS TO COUNCIL

Woodstock was practically free from fires during June, according to the town manager's report submitted by G. M. McPhail to the council at their meeting on Monday evening. There was only one alarm during the month and this one did not necessitate the water being turned on. There were twelve cases of drunkenness, one of using obscene language, three of creating disturbances and three protectionists were sheltered at the police station.

Drivers Must Stop Or Pay, Says Chief

Drivers who neglect to stop at signs before turning out of side streets in future will be reported and fined Chief of Police Kelly has announced. Chief Kelly states that a by-law has been passed making it compulsory to stop at the signs and that all offenders will be prosecuted.

A by-law was passed compelling motorists to halt their cars at stop signals before turning out of side streets. The matter of treating the square at the lower end of Main street with a tar preparation was discussed. Mayor Campbell said that he had noticed this preparation was much used in other towns. \$21,000 is Sum Paid in On Monday

TOTAL AMOUNT TO DATE IS \$51,000, ABOUT SAME AS IN 1929.

The discount period for the first payment of town taxes here expired Monday, the town manager's office being kept open until 9 p. m. to accommodate the ratepayers. All records for a single day's payments were broken Monday. About \$19,000 was brought into the office and the mails brought in another \$2,000, making the total takings for the day about \$21,000, or \$6,000 more than was ever paid in before in one day.

This brings the total paid in on an assessment of \$85,000 to about \$51,000, which is approximately the same as this date last year, as the rush was a little later in starting. \$2,631 was paid in in May, \$11,895 in June, and the balance this month.

Only half the amount assessed each taxpayer was due Monday and in some cases only this amount was paid, but the majority preferred to pay the entire bill at once.

READY FOR WORK

IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY MEETS AND CONTINUES PLANS FOR TOWN CLEAN-UP.

An immediate start on the work of cleaning up the vacant lot on Connell street which has been used for dumping discarded automobiles was ordered at the meeting of the Civic Improvement Association held in the town council chamber on Tuesday evening. It was announced that the town council would assist in the work with a team and men.

J. D. Winslow, the president, reported that the matter of incorporation under the Act Respecting Local Improvement Associations was being attended to. Col. Dibble announced that he was having some work done on the river bank.
