New Motor Fire Engine Will be Delivered on August 10

Council Decides to Buy 500 Gallon Bickle Truck At Meeting Friday Night

New Machine Will be Built at Woodstock, Ont., Exhibited at Fire Chief's Convention and Then Brought Here to be Tested; Type Approved by Underwriters

Woodstock's new motor fire engine will be ready for delivery to the town on Aug. 10, it has been announced. The new engine will be constructed at once at the Bickle factory at Woodstock, Ont. It will be finished in time to be exhibited at the Dominion fire chiefs' convention at Quebec on Aug. 3, 4, and 5, after which it will be brought to Woodstock and tested before being accepted.

Purchase of the truck was authorized at a meeting of the town council on Friday evening. Councillor Johnston reported for the fire committee that they were in favor of buying this engine, and moved that it be purchased. The motion was seconded by Coun. Dibblee and carried. The price of the truck is \$6300. It is known as a 500 gallon pumper, but has a guaranteed capacity of 700 gallons a minute, and is of a type approved by the New Brunswick Board of Fire Underwriters. It has 1500 feet of hose, a chemical tank, 200 feet of small hose, and is equipped with ladders.

The finance committee reported favorably on a request from E. B. Fisher for exemption from taxes for a ten year period on a new woolen mill he proposes to erect to replace the one recently destroyed by fire. It was decided to grant exemption so far as the Act governing taxation would allow.

The street committee reported that the ditch opposite the Kerrigan & Everett service station had been cleaned and was now carrying the water off properly.

Fred Grant complained of the condition of a dump near his home and Councillors Nodden and Ridley with the town manager were appointed a committee to investigate the matter.

It was decided to put a new floor in the fire hall and to enlarge the cellar to permit more fuel storage.

WORK IS FINISHED

NEW RESERVOIR AT HARTLAND IS COMPLETED

Hartland, June 9.—The new reservoir, being built here as part of the unemployment plan, has been completed. It is constructed of reinforced concrete and is 60 feet in diameter, 10 feet deep with a capacity of 45,000 imperial gallons. The base or foundation has walls 22 inches thick tapering to 14 inches at the top. The reservoir is of circular formation with a wall running through the centre.

Situated on a knoll 35 feet higher than the old reservoir site, it gives the town added water pressure and fire protection. More than 2,000 feet of six-inch cast iron water mains have been laid connecting the new reservoir with the old system, also cutting out two "dead ends."

RETAIL PRICES OF MAGAZINES TO SHOW HUGE INCREASE AFTER FIRST OF JULY

Retail sales of magazines will practically cease to exist when the new tariff on periodicals goes into effect, according to circular letters sent out from wholesale news dealers to their customers. The wholesalers point out that Canadian magazines are not sufficient in number and quality to come anywhere near satisfying the public demand, and forecast that if the tariff announced is put in force that it will be impossible to make sales. Prices after July 1 will be radically increased, they state. 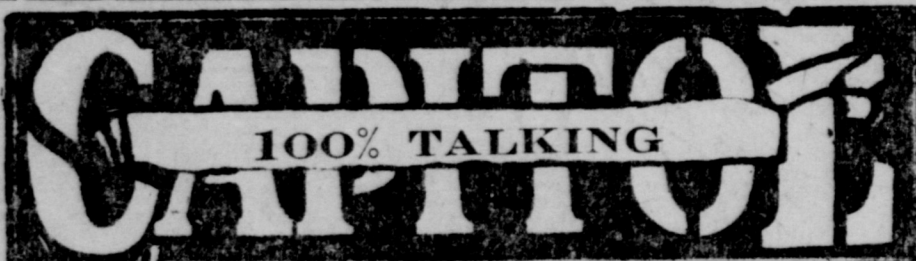

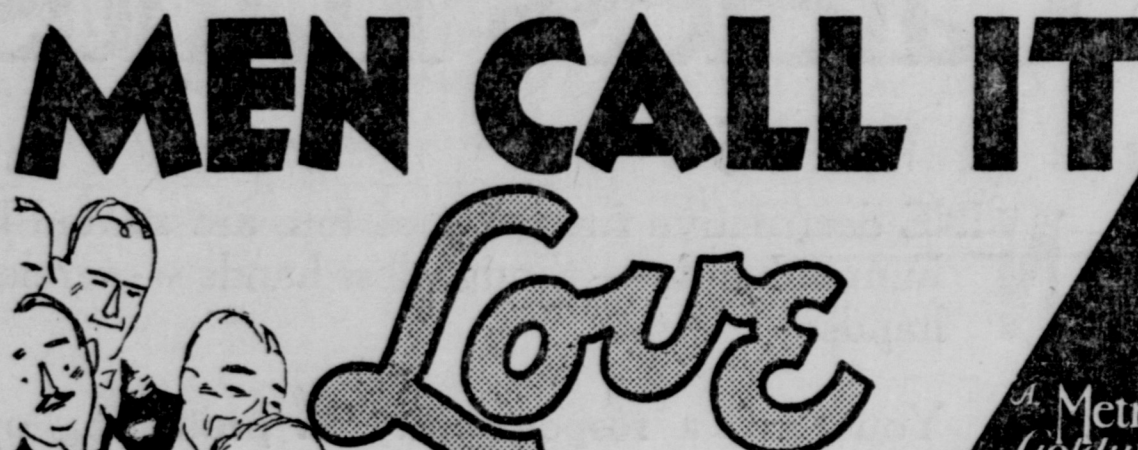
