GRADING SHOULD BE IMPROVED

O. C. Hicks Makes Recommendations at Fredericton Convention

SUGGESTS USE OF BAGS FOR BULK SHIPMENTS

Says Bags Should be Marked With Trade Name of Grower

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 27.—Much better grading of New Brunswick potatoes, the general adoption of bagging as the means of handling and the adoption of a trade name, O. C. Hicks, Fredericton, Superintendent of the Soils and Crops Division of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture, Tuesday afternoon, when delivering an address before the New Brunswick Farmers' & Dairymen's Association upon the means of improving the marketing of the potato-crop of New Brunswick.

The speaker declined to grant any superiority in product to Prince Edward Island but admitted that more careful handling gave the "Prince Edward" a better price on almost

Potato Market Continues Dull, and Price Drops Again

The potato market continued dull here all week with wire inquiry light and demand poor from all consuming centres. Prices at the first of the week were 70 cents a barrel for green Mountains but yielded to a weak market on Thursday and dropped to 65 cents. A few Irish Cobbler were being bought yesterday at 50 cents. Hauling was fairly brisk as farmers seemed anxious to unload. The weather most of the week was too cold for hauling from a distance but farmers near town were bringing in small loads well muffled up, more stock being offered than was required by the dealers to fill their orders. Track movement was a little better during the week than has been usual this season.

COUNTY COUNCIL IS ENDED AFTER FOUR DAY SESSION

MOTION PASSED ON REGISTRAR'S BILL; BUDGET IS \$2000 SMALLER

The semi-annual meeting of the Carleton County Council came to an end here last Friday morning after a four day session. Discussion of a bill from Donald Munro, registrar of deeds, for consolidating the records, and the report of the sheep claims committee occupied most of the session.

The meeting opened at nine o'clock to enable the session to conclude in time to let the up-river members catch the noon train for their homes. The Munro bill, which was set over from the meeting last June and has been the cause of considerable debate, was the first matter disposed of. Coun. Tracey reported for the committee to consider the bill, in the absence of Coun. H. J. Flemming, who had left for Jasper after the report was prepared. The committee recommended that the bill be settled at \$700 with the understanding that the consolidation work would be kept up to the end of 1932. Coun. Tracey moved that this be ratified by the
