WORD OF GOVERNMENT PLANS REGARDING POTATO SITUATION IS AWAITED

NO ADVICE YET
RECEIVED HERE
OF ANY ACTION

DELEGATION ABANDONED WHEN
TOLD OTTAWA MOVING IN
THE MATTER

Word of action by the Canadian Government in the matter of the embargo on Canadian potatoes in the British market is eagerly awaited here. A delegation from the potato growing counties of New Brunswick to Ottawa was planned for last week-end and about thirty delegates were ready to start for the capital, when advice was received that the government was prepared to take precisely the action which the delegation had intended to ask. The delegates decided that no further good could be done by their attendance, and the trip was called off.

Among the delegates who had intended to go to Ottawa were Mayor Page representing the town of Woodstock, and Councillor C. W. Clark, representing the Carleton County Council. W. F. Anderson, of Lakeville, also planned to make the trip. It is presumed that the Government is taking steps in the matter and that some form of reciprocity to British products has been offered, or will be in the immediate future. No definite word of any action had reached here up to last night, however.

POTATO MARKET HERE CONTINUES TO EXHIBIT A DOWNWARD TENDENCY

Since the announcement that the British government would not lift the embargo on Canadian potatoes the market in this area has been about at a standstill. A downward tendency was noted this week, Green Mountains selling at 20 cents a barrel. At some points they dropped as low as 15 cents, a new all time low mark. Hauling was light with farmers anxious to sell at any price, but shippers unwilling to buy. Track movement was light, the C. P. R. handling only one carload lot for Montreal here this week.

HARTLAND HOLDS SECOND ELECTION WITHIN A MONTH

Hartland, Feb. 15.—Interest was keener, voting was heavier, and one man—Herbert N. Dickinson—who was returned by acclamation in the first election on Jan. 11, was defeated today in the second election within a month for mayor and alderman. This election was the result of an oversight of the first newly elected officers of the council to take oath of office within 10 days after election, as required by law.

Four days over that time elapsed before the officers were sworn in. In the meantime P. F. Plummer, town clerk, had learned of the technical flaw through a deposed town marshal's complaints. A new election was called and two aldermanic contests appeared on the lists when nomination closed.

For the last week the four candidates and their friends had been busy canvassing, and today the biggest battle in civic politics ever in Hartland took place.

There was no election for mayor, as R. J. Potts, who won over Amasa Plummer in the first election, Jan. 11, was elected by acclamation, as was William D. McLeod, who had won over Bert Watters in Ward 3.

Herbert N. Dickinson, who was returned in the first election by acclamation in Ward 1, was defeated by Frank Hagerman.

H. J. Aiton, who won over G. Frank Seeley in Ward 2, again defeated his opponent. (Continued on page five.)

TRAIN SERVICE TO BE PROVIDED ON SATURDAY

PASSENGER COACH TO BE ADDED TO AFTERNOON FREIGHT FOR UPPIVER POINTS

With the annual dollar days only two weeks away local merchants are preparing for the big two days sale on Friday and Saturday, March 4 and 5. Train arrangements have been made for the benefit of upriver buyers, so that they can spend several hours in Woodstock and return home early on the final day of the sale, the committee in charge has announced. By special arrangement with the C. P. R. the upriver freight which leaves Woodstock at three o'clock on Saturday afternoon will have a passenger coach attached.

Values offered at the coming sale will be the biggest on record, members of the Woodstock Branch of the Retail Merchants Association, who are sponsoring the Dollar Days, state. It is believed by the merchants that there is plenty of business to be had, but that they must go after it. One of the association members voiced the opinion that people had money for their requirements, but that with business in its present condition they were not willing to part with it, unless exceptional values were offered. "It is up to us," he said, "to show them values so great this year that the public cannot afford not to buy. We are looking for two of the biggest days business of the year on March 4 and 5," he concluded.

British Experts Agree No Danger From Colorado Beetle in Cold Weather

GOVERNMENT ADVISER CONVINCED POTATO BUGS HIBERNATE IN WINTER, SAYS T. W. CALDWELL; THINKS LITTLE CHANCE THAT EMBARGO ON CANADIAN POTATOES WILL BE LIFTED

Canadian and British experts are both agreed that there is no danger of the Colorado beetle being transmitted from Canada in potato shipments between Oct. 15 and April 30. T. W. Caldwell, representative of the New Brunswick Potato Growers' Association, said on his return from England where he attempted to have the embargo on potatoes lifted, Mr. Frazer, British entomologist who is scientific adviser of the British government on matters of the kind was in agreement with Arthur Gibson, the Canadian entomologist, that from Sept. 30 to May 20 the beetle is in hibernation each year, and that there was no danger that it would be transmitted in shipments during that time.

Mr. Caldwell landed in Halifax last week and passed through Woodstock on Monday en route to Grand Falls where he spent a few days before returning to his home in Ottawa. He was of the opinion that there was little chance of the ban on Canadian potatoes being removed, but he said that the reason was political, rather than that given by Sir John Gilmour, British minister of agriculture, viz., that the potato bug was prevalent in Canada. "The Farmers' Union, Mr. Caldwell said, was very powerful, and the minister was evidently unwilling to go against their wishes.

Not only had the proposal to admit Canadian potatoes on the same status as those of European countries been refused but so had the request that they be admitted on the same basis as those of France, France, Mr. Caldwell said, had the Colorado beetle, and her potatoes would be excluded after a few weeks, but the British farmers had opposed admitting the Canadian product, and therefore Canadian potatoes would not be allowed to enter even during the remaining weeks that the market was open to French shipments.

Potatoes were being shipped into Great Britain from the Irish Free State, the Channel Islands, Malta and Gozo, within the Empire, and from many foreign countries including Estonia, Norway, Poland and Danzig, Germany, Netherlands, Belgium, France, Algeria, Spain, Canary Islands, Italy.

During the last three months of 1931 3,715,273 barrels were imported as compared with 2,983,896 barrels for the whole of 1930.

Mr. Caldwell said that he had not much hope that the British government would reconsider their decision.
