VICTORIA DAY

Next Tuesday will be celebrated the birthday of the late Queen Victoria. Of all the holidays of a purely national character which Canada celebrates none is so popular as the natal day of the great queen. Even the birthday of our present beloved ruler, King George V, takes a secondary place to it, as does the holiday peculiarly our own, Dominion Day.

It is right and fitting that this should be so. Queen Victoria combined the qualities of a wise and great sovereign with those of a wife and mother in such a manner that she left an impression both on the national and the personal life of her people which will far outlive her day and generation.

Throughout the Empire the holiday is universally observed. In our own province, and in this section of the province, the day is spent by a large proportion of the people in outings and picnics. This year there will be something lacking in the usual celebration. May 24 is the day which anglers regard as especially their own, the day when every stream and brook and lake is whipped by eager fishermen, many of whom do not seek the wily trout on any other day of the year.

This year, owing to the extent of the forest fire menace it has been necessary to prohibit forest travel, and to suspend all permits. This means that no fishing parties know of sports which can be reached without infringing on the regulations, but most of the projected fishing trips will have to be cancelled, unless, of course, heavy rains fall before the holiday.

In passing it is satisfactory to note that Woodstock is one of the few towns in the province which observes all holidays. Saint John and Sussex are the others. According to a newspaper report recently published all the other towns of any size keep open shop on one or more of the holidays.

THE LINDBERGH CASE

Public indignation throughout the United States and the rest of the civilized world is at a white heat because of the murder of the Lindbergh baby. Never, perhaps has a crime, unless it was the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, shocked the public mind more profoundly. The deliberate battering to death of a helpless baby followed by a heartless and completely successful attempt to extort money from the parents has aroused such a clamor for the apprehension and punishment of the criminals as this generation has not before known.

A large section of the country is demanding the solution of the crime and the punishment of its perpetrators as a deterrent to further crimes of a similar nature. Let us at least be honest. What 99 per cent of us want is to know that punishment has been administered, partially as a deterrent to others certainly, but primarily that those who committed the murder may be made to suffer for it. The murder is being hailed as the most brutal crime in centuries. Unfortunately nothing of the kind is true. The murder and the following extortion could hardly have been more brutal, but on the other hand there have been many crimes committed of late in the land of the free and the home of the brave which could not well have been more brutal. The public conscience in the United States has first been pricked, then been aroused, and now has been laid raw by a long succession of crimes of a most atrocious character, of which the Lindbergh murder is the climax. Naturally this could not have happened if the public had not remained apathetic while the underworld forces became solidly organized, corrupted law enforcement officials, formed alliances with political leaders and firmly entrenched themselves in a position from which they as yet are in no great danger of being dislodged. That there is a hope of better things is shown by the recent imprisonment for a long term of Al Capone, general

ally regarded as the leader of the criminal element and several of his lieutenants. In spite of this the United States remains today the most lawless of the civilized countries. Possibly the future of the nation will depend on whether the public will continue in its present state of indignation until the nation has had a thorough house cleaning.
