## SHIKTEHAWK BRIDGE ARBITRATION PROCEEDINGS ARE OPENED HERE

### Two Cases Potato Market Here Continues To Show Considerable Strength

#### Were Started Yesterday

HOWARD PARKER AND GUY WELCH LANDS ARE SUBJECT OF HEARING

Arbitration proceedings regarding properties expropriated for the work around the Shiktehawk bridge on the trans-Canada highway were begun at the courthouse here yesterday before Anson Margison. The proceedings concerned land owned by Howard Parker and Guy Welch at Bristol around the mouth of the Shiktehawk river. The local members recommended an award of \$1000 in the Parker case and of \$200 in the Welch case. The government regarded the figure set on the Parker property as too high, and Mr. Welch considered the offer for his land too low, the present proceedings resulting. Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., is representing both the Parker and the Welch claims, and J. C. Hartley, K. C., the Public Works Department. Several witnesses were examined yesterday, after which an adjournment was taken.

Several maps and blue prints were placed in evidence when the hearing opened. C. A. McVey, of Fredericton, chief bridge engineer, was then called to the stand. Mr. Jones asked him approximately how much gravel was taken from the properties in question and also the Emery Hotham land for the bridge fill. Mr. McVey replied that no record of this had been kept, but that it would be possible to get a rough idea by working out from the cross-sections of the land. This he promised to do, but said that the figure could not be obtained for at least two days. He was then stood aside.

Hon. F. C. Squires, speaker of the legislature and one of Carleton County's representatives there, was then called. In reply to questions by Mr. Jones he said that the recommendation that \$1000 be paid for the Parker property had been made either by himself or with his concurrence.

#### MINISTERS CALL ATTENTION TO NOTICE CLAUSE IN MARRIAGE LAW

At its meeting on November 7th the Ministerial Association of Woodstock discussed at some length the five days notice clause in the marriage law. Two conclusions grew out of the discussion:

First, that the public should be reminded that the law requires that five days notice of intended marriage be given the person authorized to solemnize marriage, and that the exceptions permitted are intended to cover only "exceptional and urgent circumstances."

Second, that it is the duty of the members of the Ministerial Association and all persons authorized to solemnize marriage to see that the law is conscientiously observed.

#### 5 CLUBS ENTERED IN CARD TOURNAMENT

ROTARIANS TO HAVE TEAM ENTERED WHEN PLAY STARTS ON TUESDAY

The Inter-club Bridge Tournament, according to present plans, will begin next Tuesday evening. It was formerly intended to start this week with four clubs competing, but the inclusion of another club caused a week's delay. The Rotary Club this week decided to enter a team, bringing the number of entries up to five, the same number as last year.

It was originally supposed that the competing teams would be the Masonic Club, winners of the trophy last season, the Knights of Pythias, the Knights of Columbus, the I. O. O. F. Club and the Canadian Legion. The Garrison Club, who participated last year, were ineligible through having finished in last place, and it was expected that the Legion would take their place.

Complications were caused, however, by the withdrawal of two of the clubs. The I. O. O. F. found themselves unable to rely on having enough players regularly available and decided not to enter, while the Knights of Pythias were not in agreement with the method of playing off for the shield introduced last year, and also decided not to enter.

#### Rotary Club Will Enter Card Tournney

The Woodstock Rotary Club held their weekly Luncheon at the Carleton Hotel at Noon Wednesday. There was no special speaker. The Club accepted a request from The Associated Charities to co-operate with that body in an entertainment to be held shortly for the purpose of raising funds for relief of the needy. It was decided to enter a team in the inter-club Bridge Tournament which will begin next week. This being the first time the Rotarians have entered the competition.

#### NEW BEDFORD MEN HAVE GOOD SUCCESS

HUNTING TRIP TO EEL RIVER LAKE YIELDS FINE RESULTS

Well satisfied with their trip and expressing their intention of returning to New Brunswick again next year, two New Bedford, Mass., sportsmen, George Emin and F. W. Fontaine, have returned home after a successful stay at the camp of C. A. McArthur at Eel River Lake. Mr. Emin, who was on his third visit here in as many years, bagged a large moose with sixteen points and a 49 inch spread, while Mr. Fontaine shot two fine buck deer, of eight and ten points respectively.

#### EXPERT THANKS LOCAL FIRM FOR ITS VALUABLE AID

H. G. CRAWFORD EXPRESSES APPRECIATION FOR ASSISTANCE IN INVESTIGATION

Potato growers and shippers are hopefully awaiting word from the United Kingdom regarding the removal of the embargo on Canadian potatoes. It is now several weeks since British and Canadian agricultural and entomological experts visited the Saint John river valley and conducted extensive tests, which it is believed will convince the British Ministry of Agriculture that there is no danger of the transmission of Colorado beetle, or potato bug from this country to the British Isles in the shipment of potatoes.

While in this part of the province the experts conducted several experiments with a combinations grader and brushing and cleaning machine. That co-operation of local people with the Federal authorities in the endeavor to have the embargo removed was appreciated is shown by a letter recently received by F. O. Creighton of Creighton & Carter, Ltd., from H. G. Crawford, of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. The letter was as follows:

#### REMEMBRANCE DAY IS CELEBRATED HERE WITH PARADE AND SERVICE AT MEMORIAL AND BANQUET IN EVENING

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIAL AT SOLDIERS' MONUMENT LARGELY ATTENDED BY VETERANS AND OTHER CITIZENS; APPEAL MADE FOR ALL RETURNED MEN TO JOIN LEGION

Remembrance Day was observed here by possibly the largest turnout of citizens since the signing of the Armistice on Nov. 11, 1918. A parade of returned men to the Soldiers' Memorial for service was held in the morning, and in the evening the veterans were entertained by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion at a banquet in the Knights of Columbus rooms.

The morning parade was assembled at the Legion rooms and moved off at 10.30 with the Carleton Light Infantry Band at its head. Behind the band marched the returned men, under command of Major J. D. Winslow, M. C., president of the Woodstock Branch of the Legion. When came the drum and bugle band of the Chester L. Briggs Post, American Legion, Houlton, presenting an attractive appearance in their uniforms of navy and horizon blue with polished metal helmets. After them marched the Woodstock Girl Guides. The parade went out Connell street, up to Albert street, and thence to Main street where a
