HOW LONG WILL WE STAND IT?

The routing of Canadian grain is occupying the attention of the House of Commons. According to the spirit of the trade agreement entered into at the recent Ottawa Conference, Canadian wheat to get a preference in the British market must be routed through Canadian ports. The debates in the British house have made it abundantly clear that this was the intention and the expectation.

Premier Bennett, seems determined that grain routed through American ports shall get the preference. So long as he can please the west the premier appears to be well satisfied. He appears to be convinced that the Maritime Tories are sufficiently hide-bound to vote for himself and his colleagues whatever he does, and however detrimental such a vote would be to their own interests. Past elections in this section of Canada seem to indicate that the premier's expectations are not without a basis of fact. Possibly the next election will tell a different story.

In the meantime, however, the premier continues to cater to the west to the exclusion of all interests east of Montreal, and it may well be that the Maritimes will lose a part of even what small benefit may have been secured from the conference. Too many people are inclined to think that this is a matter for Saint John and Halifax to fight out for themselves.

It is nothing of the kind. Apart from the fact that these ports are a part of the Maritimes, any diversion of traffic from them to American ports will have a detrimental effect on other parts of these provinces. A movement of a huge volume of grain for instance, through the Maritimes, means greatly increased rail activity, more employees on the railroads, more activity in the carshops, larger payrolls in the railway centres, which include Woodstock and other towns along the valley, and men taken on instead of men being laid off.

Possibly it is too much to hope that the members from the Maritime Provinces will for the time being forget their differences and stand up, even in the face of the oracle, in defence of the interests of the people who elected them. When the time comes that the Maritime members in the House of Commons develop sufficient backbone to unite against any injustice to these provinces, then, and not till then, will we have some chance of having the terms of the British North America Act carried out.

NOT SETTLED YET

The troubled affairs of the provincial government are still in a state of turmoil. According to a recent article in the Fredericton Gleaner Premier Richards is not to receive his judgeship until after the coming session of the legislature. This is a disappointment that would worry any man. For a time it looked as if the premier had reached the highest political reward, and that his meanderings in the turmoil of provincial affairs were at an end. If the Gleaner story is true, however, he must worry through another session at the head of a faltering party, and must explain to the people why the province has run behind so badly financially during the last year.

In the meantime it is beginning to be whispered about that it is possible that the premier may not get the vacant judgeship at all. It is said that the name of C. F. Inches, K. C., Saint John barrister, is being mentioned prominently in connection with the vacant office.

Mr. Hartley interjected that Mr. Jones could hardly expect to prove the value of the land by a recommendation of politicians to the government. Mr. Squires went on that in arriving at this valuation the local members had considered among other things that Mr. Parker was cut off from the main road by the new routing of the highway. He was also severed from the use of a flat which would make good pasture land, deprived of part of a millsite and lost a quantity of gravel which was scarce in that part of the country and was valued at ten cents a cubic yard.

At this point the noon recess was taken.

At the afternoon hearing evidence of a similar nature was given by G. W. Perry, another Carleton County member of the Legislature.

Mr. Parker took the stand and placed his own valuation at \$1100. His evidence was marked by several clashes with the Department counsel, who claimed that the witness' answers to questions were too long and contained matter that was not evidence.

Mr. Welch was the last witness examined. He said that he and Mr. McVey had talked over the matter of a price but could not reach an agreement. At the rate paid for other properties taken for the road he should be paid about \$1000 per acre. He was more than willing, he said, to settle on the same basis as other owners. Witness estimated that a gravel pit on the property taken contained about 12000 cubic yards of gravel, worth about \$1200.

Mr. Jones suggested that a slight change in the position of the road had been made solely for the purpose of making it necessary to expropriate the land containing the gravel, which previous witness had testified was scarce in that locality.

Adjournment was then made for one week.
