Rev. Father Moore, pastor of St. Gertrude's church, was speaker at a brief service which followed the observation of the two minutes of silence at 11 o'clock. The last post and reveille were sounded and wreaths were placed on the monument, after which the parade went to the cemeteries to decorate the graves of the soldier dead.

In the afternoon about 60 of the veterans went to Houlton where they joined in the parade there.

In the evening almost 200 returned men attended the annual banquet given by the Ladies' Auxiliary. There was no special speaker, but several interesting addresses were heard during the toast list. The work of the legion and its purpose were explained by W. J. McDougall, while J. D. Winslow gave some interesting information on the work of the local branch, appealing to those of his hearers who were not already members to join up.
