POTATO MARKET LOCALLY SHOWS DECIDED IMPROVEMENT DURING THIS WEEK

Price Jumps From 55 Cts. To 80 Cents

DEALERS HERE EXPECT SMALL
DROP OVER WEEK-END
HOWEVER

The potato market here improved materially during the week. Small track storage in the Upper Canadian consuming centres and light supplies en route there caused a market freshening of demand and a corresponding increase in prices. Quotations on table stock advanced steadily all week here, five or ten cents at a time, the figure going up from 50 to 55 cents last Thursday to 70 cents a barrel for Irish Cobbler and 80 cents for Green Mountains yesterday. This figure was thought by shippers here to be a little higher than the price on the receiving end warranted, and they were of the opinion that there would be a slight drop over the week-end.

Handling during the earlier part of the week continued very light, with farmers holding off for better prices. Offerings were insufficient to fill the orders received. Considerably more stock was coming in yesterday however, with a fair wire inquiry and demand reported.

Track movement during the first few days of the week was slow, but briskened up considerably yesterday the C. P. R. billing out five cars from Woodstock area, two for Saint John for delivery, two for West Saint John for export to Cuba and one for Montreal.

Potatoes at this time last year were selling at 25 to 30 cents here.

MARKET PRICES NOT MUCH CHANGED

FRESH EGGS CONTINUE TO ADVANCE
SLIGHTLY; CHICKEN
VERY PLENTIFUL

Market prices showed little change this week. Fresh eggs continued to advance slightly, retailing yesterday at 38 cents a dozen. Dairy butter was unchanged at 22 cents a pound. Some vegetables were slightly higher. Chickens were very plentiful and low in price at 20 to 22 cents with fowl retailing at 17 to 20 cents. Other prices: potatoes, 15 cents a peck; \$1 a barrel; carrots, 25 cents a peck; parsnips, 25 cents a peck; onions, 10 lbs. for 19 to 25 cents; cranberries, 12 cents a lb.; apples 25 to 50 cents a peck; lettuce, 20 cents; turnips, 2 for 5 cents; squash, 4 cents a lb.; ham 22 cents; bacon, 20 cents; beef 6 to 14 cents; according to cut, steak 20 to 30 cents; lamb, 15 to 25 cents; pork, 10 to 16 cents; veal 7 to 16 cents.

CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP OF WELLKNOWN BUSINESS HOUSE HERE ANNOUNCED

One of Woodstock's oldest business houses changed hands this week when the John McLaughlin Co., Ltd., was taken over by Dalvin Bros., of Grand Falls, who will operate the store as a branch business. The business was founded in Oct. 1877 by the late John McLaughlin, and was later incorporated, still bearing his name. Mr. McLaughlin carried on business until his death last spring.

The new firm has taken over the stock and goodwill of the old company and has leased their main street premises, ownership of which, however, is still retained by the John McLaughlin Co., Ltd.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR COMMEMORATION OF REMEMBRANCE DAY ARE COMPLETED

PARADE AND SERVICE AT SOLDIERS' MEMORIAL IN MORNING
AND BANQUET IN EVENING; TWO CHURCH PARADES
SCHEDULED FOR SUNDAY

Arrangements for the celebration of Remembrance Day here today have now been completed. The day being a public holiday most of the stores and other places of business will be closed. A parade will be held in the morning from the Canadian Legion rooms via Connell, Green and Albert streets to the Soldiers' Memorial, where two minutes silence will be observed at eleven o'clock, the hour of the cessation of the world war, and where a service will be held at which Rev. Father Moore, pastor of St. Gertrude's church, will be the speaker.

The parade will assemble at the Legion rooms at 10.15 and will move off at 10.30 with the Carleton Light Infantry band at their head. The dress to be worn is mufti and medals, and all returned men, whether legion members or not are invited to participate. After the service the parade will return to the Legion rooms.

In the afternoon a large number of the Legion members are going to Houlton to assist the Chester L. Briggs Post of the American Legion in their commemoration of the day.

In the evening the Ladies' Auxiliary will serve dinner to the returned men in the Knights of Columbus rooms at 6.30. The dinner will end the observance of the day, but on Sunday church parades will assemble at the Legion rooms at 10.15 and will attend service at St. Luke's, while in the evening the parade will assemble at 6.15 and will go to the United Baptist Church.

IS IMPROVING

JAS McDONALD OUT OF HOSPITAL
SOON

Bangor Firm May Build Branch Here

50 HANDS WOULD BE REGULARLY
EMPLOYED; TAX EXEMPT-
ION ALLOWED

Woodstock may have a large new industry in the near future according to an announcement made at a meeting of the town council on Monday evening. Mayor Page said that he had a communication from the Columbia Pants Co., of Bangor, Me., saying that they wished to establish a plant in New Brunswick and regarded Woodstock favorably. The company sold its output to T. Eaton Co. and similar large concerns. About fifty hands would be employed. Under the existing by-law the council had power to exempt the company from taxes for ten year period.

On motion of Coun. Reed seconded by Coun. Reed it was decided to advise the company that the council would give every possible inducement under the by-law.

Mr. Powers was heard in connection with the purchase of the John McLaughlin Co. business. He understood that the town expected a license fee of \$100. He had leased the premises for two years and would comply with all regulations. In view of the fact that the 1932 taxes were paid he would appreciate any concession that could be made. It was decided that Mr. Powers would be compelled to pay the \$100 license fee, but that a proportionate rebate would be made on his 1933 taxes.

The report of the police magistrate was received and on motion held over for further information. The town manager reported that insurance on the fire truck would cost \$132, \$100 more than he had been authorized to expend for the purpose. It was decided to take out insurance against collision.

Coun. Reed withdrew a notice of motion calling for the amendment of the assessment regulations to compel all citizens to fill in forms, saying that he had found many taxpayers strongly opposed to such a move at the present time.

Town housing board matters were discussed. It was announced that some of the householders were trying to keep up their payments but that others were hopelessly in arrears, and that it looked as if they would eventually have to be sold out. Coun. Reed advocated giving those in arrears another chance, but insisted that their monthly instalments should be met regularly hereafter.

The town manager said that a request had been received for the loan of the town rock crusher for use in the new customs building at the boundary line. He advocated allowing the loan if local men were employed on the job, as there was no chance of injury to the crusher.

The town manager said that the budget called for the laying off of one of the town employees during the winter, three only being allowed instead of four as at present. Coun. Reed suggested that a compromise be (Continued on page four.)

MONDAY BAD DAY FOR CRABBE FAMILY

FAHER AND SON SENTENCED
TO JAIL FOR SELLING
LIQUOR

Monday was a bad day for the Crabbe family. Clay Crabbe, case before Magistrate Angerton in the police court here in the afternoon, charged with selling liquor unlawfully. Evidence was given by officers of the R. C. M. P. that Crabbe had sold them alcohol and the defendant was adjudged guilty. A certificate of previous conviction was introduced and Crabbe was sentenced to serve six months in jail and to pay a fine of \$500 with an additional six months if the fine is not paid.

Richard Crabbe, father of the previous defendant, pleaded guilty to a similar charge and being a first offender got off with a sentence of two months and a fine of \$200 or two more months.

The case of Patrick Cavanaugh, also charged with selling liquor, was begun and evidence was given by police officers. Adjudgment was made for one week for a decision as to the admissibility of a certificate of analysis.

GARAGE BURNED

BUILDING NEAR END OF BRIDGE
DESTROYED

A garage owned by Mrs. Henry Post, Grafton, was destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. The origin is unknown as everything was all right about the building, which stood a few yards from the end of the Grafton bridge, late Saturday night. During the early hours of the morning, however, nearby residents were awakened to find the place in flames. They were unable to do anything toward saving the garage but were able to extricate a car which was kept there.
