Holiday Will Be Quietly Celebrated

BASKETBALL GAME AND DANCE ARE AMONG THE ATTRACTIONS

New Year's will be celebrated quietly in Woodstock. The holiday's falling on a Sunday will mean a considerably less hillyous observance of New Year's Eve than is usual. The customary New Year's Eve dance will be missing, although this will be more than made up by a charity ball on Monday night, on which day the New Year will be officially celebrated.

On New Year's Eve several private parties are being held and many citizens are planning to pass the evening quietly at home tuning in by radio on the demonstrations in the larger American centres. The customary watch-night service will be held in the Salvation Army Hall to welcome the year in. Rev. H. E. Allaby will be the speaker.

On Sunday services appropriate to the day will be held in the various town churches. Special Christmas music will be repeated in some of the churches.

The official observance of the holiday will take place on Monday. Banks, stores and other places of business will be closed. In the afternoon there will be a basketball game at the armories between Orono, Me., Orioles and the Carleton Light Infantry Senators. In the evening a large attendance is expected at the annual Christmas party at the Carleton Light Infantry hall, which they will go direct to the Capitol Theatre will have a holiday program, and the are expected to attract large numbers of skaters.

POTATO MARKET VERY DULL HERE ALL THIS WEEK

PRICES REMAIN STEADY AT 80 CENTS A BARREL FOR MOUNTAINS

The potato market was very quiet here this week, lack of demand adding to the usual holiday dullness to keep movement of stock from this end almost at a standstill. A little strength was reported at Montreal late in the week, but this had not had any reaction at this end up to late last night. Prices remained fairly steady all week at 80 cents a barrel for Green Mountains with no call for Irish Cobblers. Hauling was light with farmers not interested at the present quotations, and with lack of snow making it difficult to bring stock in.

Dealers are expecting a revival of activity next month, and are of the opinion that a fair price can be maintained if the farmers will use proper judgment in selling their stock, so that there will be no flooding of the market.

Friends of Mr. Godfrey Newnam, seriously ill at his home here, will be glad to learn that his condition is showing steady improvement.

Events of Interest In Carleton Co. in 1932 Briefly Reviewed

During the year which is just about to close there were many events of local importance. Some of these were more than local in their character, affecting the province or even the country. Others were largely of a nature of interest to the people of the town and county. We print a brief summary of the principal news happenings of 1932.

As the year closed T. W. Caldwell was selected to represent the potato industry in an endeavor to have the British government remove the embargo on Canadian potatoes. This endeavor is still going on and ultimate success is hoped for.

During the closing days of December H. H. Smalley opened a lath mill here. Early in January this was going at full speed and employing about 20 men. The mill has since been purchased by C. W. Bowlin, and is being operated by him.

On Jan. 22 the Carleton County began a four day session. The budget was drastically reduced and instructions given to all collectors that taxes must be got in. The county budget was fixed at \$25,000 plus \$14,000 for schools.

At its January meeting the Woodstock School Board fixed its budget at \$27,000. This amount it was later able to reduce slightly.

On Feb. 1 the town council met and decided to reduce all salaries of town employees.

On Feb. 19 potatoes reached an alltime low rate of 15 cents a barrel. During this week work on the Woodstock armories, partially destroyed by fire a year before, was completed.

On March 2 Dunbar's foundry was badly damaged by fire.

On March 11 roads in this district were blocked by a heavy snowstorm which continued for three days.

At their March meeting the town council fixed their budget at \$30,000, \$2,000 less than the previous year.

On March 18 the Carleton Light Infantry and the 89th Battery concluded their winter training and were inspected by Brigadier J. L. R. Parsons, district commandant.

On March 25 the Masonic Club won the inter-club bridge trophy.

On April 3 the United Church here (continued in next column)

celebrated the centenary of its founding as the Methodist church.

On April 8 the ice ran out of the Saint John river badly damaging the approach to the Island Park.

On April 12 and 13 the New Waterford, N. S., Y. M. C. I. defeated Woodstock High School here for the juvenile basketball championship of the Maritime Provinces.

On April 21 the Imperial Products, Ltd., shipped out about 60 head of cattle, the largest shipment from Carleton County in some years.

On April 28 M. H. Craig was elected by acclamation to the town council to take the place of Councillor B. A. Johnson, who died while in office.

On May 12 the Olts homestead at Meductic was burned and the Woodstock (Continued on Page Five)

X., who is spending the holidays at his home here, and who has played two games with them to date. The home team has victories to its credit in its first two starts, both against Maine teams, and will be out to keep its record intact.

TOWN LOST WELL KNOWN BUSINESS FIGURE TUESDAY

W. DUPPA SMITH PASSES AWAY AT ROYAL VICTORIA HOSPITAL, MONTREAL

The funeral of W. Duppa Smith will be held this afternoon. Service will be conducted in St. Luke's church by the rector, Rev. S. C. Gray. Members of the staff of the Woodstock United Farmers store will act as pall bearers.

Mr. Smith's death occurred on Tuesday at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, where he had gone for surgical treatment. He was well known in business circles along the Saint John river valley having been in business here for himself for some years, following which he was prominently identified with the Farmers' Store, with which firm he was connected up to the time of his death. Plenty Of Poultry For New Year's

PRICE STILL UNCERTAIN AFTER MARKET COLLAPSE ON CHRISTMAS EVE

Poultry prices for New Year market are still uncertain. Indications point to a plentiful supply of all lines with the possible exception of turkeys, which were pretty well cleaned up by the Christmas trade. It is expected that ducks, geese and chickens will be plentiful, and that the price will be low.

The bottom dropped out of the poultry market here on Christmas Eve, local dealers being left in several instances with a considerable portion of their supply still on hand. Late Christmas Eve turkeys were selling as low as 20 and 22 cents a pound, with geese and chickens going at well under twenty cents. One instance was reported where a farmer sold several fine geese at \$1 each rather than take them home.

Some of the surplus stock was shipped after the holiday to other places, but prices realized were low and the same condition prevailed almost everywhere, with the supply more than equal to the demand.

INFLUENZA AND GRIPPE PREVALENT

DISEASE IS OF MILD TYPE BUT VERY DISAGREEABLE

Woodstock is at present undergoing an epidemic of grippé and influenza. The disease, while very disagreeable to its victims, seems to be of a mild type, and in most cases has proved more distressing than dangerous. Chicken pox is also quite prevalent among the children. The mild weather of the last few days has been favorable to the spread of the sickness, which is expected to abate when the more bracing cold of January sets in.

WEATHER IS MILD

LAST WEEK'S COLD SNAP SUCCEDED BY WARM SPELL

Carleton County has been having very mild weather for the last week. The severe cold spell of the early part of last week was followed by a couple of days of bright seasonable weather with a light snow on Friday night. This was in turn followed by a thaw. The weather this week has been unseasonably mild, but took a colder turn yesterday, with just enough frost in the air to make conditions healthful. The ground is practically bare of snow in most parts of the county, making conditions difficult for hauling.
