ATTENDANCE INCREASES

After an average attendance of
350-35 for the month of January the
United Baptist Sunday School last
Sunday reached the new high mark
in attendance of 380, with one pos-
sible exception, when a very special
effort was made to get 400 out, this
is the largest attendance in the his-
tory of the school. The present large
attendance, however, is simply ex-
pressive of the response of the people
to the faithful work of Supt. B. A.
Johnson and his loyal and efficient
staff of teachers. The graded lessons
that are being used for the children
and youths are undoubtedly a factor
in promoting more regular attend-
ance. The adult attendance, also, is
very gratifying. In two adult classes
alone there were 102 present last
Sunday. The most largely attended
class is the men's class with 56 out
last Sunday. But then, the men's
class has the largest group to draw
from. The Superintendent is looking
for an attendance of 400 or over by
Easter Sunday, if not before.

Notice to All Delinquent Ratepayers of the Several Parishes of the County of Carleton

The failure of a greatly increased
number of the ratepayers in the Par-
ishes to pay the taxes assessed a-
gainst them, finds the County with
an overdraft at the Bank up to the
extreme limit of the amount the law
authorizes. This prevents the County
from obtaining money from the
Bank with which to pay the bills and
expenses for the present year.

The Finance Committee were in-
structed to look in to the matter,
see the Bank Manager and report to
Council, and the Council after con-
sidering the report of the Committee
ordered that the Collectors proceed
to collect the delinquent lists using
every means provided by law for the
purpose unless same are paid forth-
with. If at the first of March next
the collectors fail to make a good
showing in collections the Finance
Committee are instructed to pro-
cure one or two collectors for the
whole County who will collect the
taxes now overdue.

Of all of which the delinquent
ratepayers will take due notice and
govern themselves accordingly.
