MOST OF MAIN ROADS IN THIS DISTRICT NOW PASSABLE FOR AUTOMOBILES

BLOCKADE AT DEEP CREEK CLEAR SOON

FROST DAMAGE IS NOT EXPECTED TO AMOUNT MUCH; CARE AT CULVERTS

The roads in this vicinity are in good shape for this stage of the spring season, and it is not expected that there will be much frost damage or that it will be necessary to close any of them to light traffic, F. W. C. Wetmore, district highways engineer, reported yesterday. A blockade occurred yesterday in the cutting at Deep Creek, on the main road between Woodstock and Hartland on the eastern side of the Saint John river. An earth and rockslide from the banks of the cutting fell onto the road which will be impassable for a day or two. A crew is now engaged in clearing the blockade.

While the roads are generally in good shape drivers should watch their way carefully, and should at all times and on all roads approach culverts cautiously as they are liable to meet with bumps. In this district it is now possible to drive without difficulty anywhere on the trunk roads between Fredericton and Grand Falls. It is also possible to drive to Houlton, Bridgewater and Fort Fairfield and fairly good time can be made on these roads if a careful lookout is kept. The Brighton road, however, is not in good shape.

The fill and the new bridge at Bull's Creek came through the winter well as did the one at Johnston's creek, and both these former danger spots are now in good condition. So far no damage by flooding has been reported, in spite of the heavy run off of water.

BAND TO GIVE BALL

INVITATIONS ARE ISSUED FOR DANCE AT ARMOY

Invitations have been issued for a ball to be given by the Carleton Light Infantry Band at the armories on April 20, under the auspices of the officer commanding and officers of the regiment. About 800 invitations have been issued and the function is expected to be a brilliant one. The band will attend in uniform and will play the music for the grand march. They will also play a short concert program and will furnish the music at the supper interval. The Red Jackets orchestra will play for the dancing.

TWO SEIZURES OF ALLEGED HOME BREW ARE MADE

Two homebrew seizures have been made by the R. C. M. P. in this district in the last few days. In both cases the seizure consisted of a barrel containing what is believed to be beer of considerable strength, the same recipes seeming to have been followed in both cases. The first seizure was made on the premises of Mrs. Etta Butler, Woodstock, on Saturday, and the second at a camp owned by Delbert Bragdon in the woods near the River road below Bull's creek. Samples were taken in each case and forwarded to the provincial analyst, the remainder of the preparation being destroyed. The seizures were made by Constable Jones and Campbell.

SAINT JOHN RIVER CONTINUES TO RISE RAPIDLY HERE

RAIN BRINGS WATER UP FOUR FEET WEDNESDAY AFTER-NOON AND NIGHT

The water in the Saint John river here last night was at the highest level so far reached this spring and was still rising steadily. The water came up sharply on Tuesday after falling off considerably when the ice ran out. Wednesday it was still rising steadily. By Wednesday noon the heavy rains which fell the previous day were beginning to take effect, and between sunset on Wednesday and noon on Thursday the river came up between four and five feet. This evening the water was in the lower part of the Smalley lath mill, and a rise of about two feet would inundate the upper end of the island park.

The Meduxnekeag was rising yesterday and was at its highest level in several years. The dam at the mouth of the creek presented a beautiful sight, as the big volume of water had converted it into a miniature Niagara. While the smaller stream was not expected to come up much higher it would only take a small rise to bring it out of its banks. Much of the intervalle land along the Connell road was under water yesterday, and lowlying parts of the upper end of Water street were submerged.

The ice in the Saint John river here ran out on Friday. It started to move shortly after noon and continued to run without intermission for several hours. The run was very heavy, with huge cakes from eighteen inches to three feet in thickness, smashing up against the highway bridge.

About ten minutes after the run began some of the supports to the approach to the Island Park were carried away, and the approach was immediately boarded off and closed to traffic. Repairs will be impossible until the water goes down.

The run of ice was accompanied by a five foot rise in the level of the river, which caused work to be suspended in the Smalley mill when the water reached the belts. The river fell as quickly as it rose, leaving small jams, and huge piles of ice along the banks. These ran out this week when the water came up again. Another heavy run occurred on Saturday, when the ice from jams farther up river came past. Smaller runs have been coming by ever since, but for the last day or two it is thought that these have come from the ice (continued in next column)

BY-ELECTION WILL BE HELD MONDAY, MAY 2

CANDIDATE IS WELL KNOWN AUTOMOBILE DEALER AND COMMERCIAL AVIATOR

J. C. Folkins prominent automobile dealer, garage proprietor and aviator, at the solicitation of a number of the representative citizens and ratepayers of the town, has decided to offer as a candidate for the place in the Woodstock council made vacant by the death of Councillor B. A. Johnston. The by-election to fill the vacancy will be held on Monday, May 2, it has been announced. The election was called under the authority of a section in the special act under which Woodstock is incorporated, giving the mayor power to call a by-election in the case of death removing one of the council members. Nomination day will be on the preceding Thursday.

Mr. Folkins has operated a garage and automobile agency in Woodstock for many years. For several years he has also been an airplane pilot, and is well known as a commercial and stunt flyer. He is a member of the Woodstock Rotary Club.

OPEN SEASON FOR PARTRIDGE IN OCT.

SHOOTING WILL BE ALLOWED FOR FIFTEEN DAYS AS IN 1931

Fredericton, N. B., April 12.—New Brunswick will have an open season for partridge shooting from October 1st to October 15th inclusive in 1932, according to announcement made today by Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines. Authorization of this open season was made by order-in-council of the New Brunswick government a few days ago and official announcement of the order is given in this week's issue of the Royal Gazette.

The decision to establish the same open season for partridge shooting in New Brunswick this year, as last, has been made earlier than usual in such matters, but the conditions governing the season in 1932 are identical with those in 1931. The short open season has not been authorized for the islands of Grand Manan, Campbell and Deer Island.

This year's regulations again make reference to that section of the Game Act which prohibits the retention of partridge for ten days after the close of the open season, and attention of bird shooters is drawn to the fact that the onus of proof that partridge, possessed under this regulation, were lawfully killed, shall be on the person having such birds in possession.

In view of the successful open season for partridge in New Brunswick last year there was, in some quarters, an agitation to have the 1932 season extended for an additional 15 days. However the Department of Lands and Mines has now decided on the same length of season as in effect last year, when 44,000 partridge were reported killed.

THEFT IS CHARGED

BOYS ARE ALLEGED TO HAVE STOLEN FROM CREAMERY

Five juveniles came before Magistrate Augherton in the police court here on Tuesday, charged with stealing from the premises of the Woodstock Creamery Co. It is alleged that the boys last Sunday entered the creamery through the window and took a knife, a pair of binoculars, some pencils and other articles. These were later recovered by the police. In their investigations the police also recovered a hide alleged to have been taken by the boys from a local dealer. They were rounded on Monday by Chief Kelly. The case was set over for one week.
