Mrs. B. B. Manzer

The death occurred Thursday morning at her home in King street of Mrs. Sarah Louise Manzer, after a short illness of pleuro-pneumonia in the 74th year of her age.

Deceased who was twice married first to J. E. Colter and later to B. B. Manzer, was born at Lincoln, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Reid. Early in life she came to Fredericton where she resided all her life. Of a strong Christian character, she took an active part in the affairs of the Methodist Church and before and since Church Union and her advice and services were often sought when matters of great importance came up. As a member of the Ladies Aid of the Church and various other organizations, she did her best to further the cause of religion both here and elsewhere and in her passing the church has lost one of its best workers. In her home life she was quiet and reserved, with a sympathetic feeling for all in trouble and sorrow, and many will miss her kindly ministrations. She was possessed of keen intellect and talked fluently on happenings in the city and elsewhere and friends will learn with deep regret of her death. She is survived by an only child, Fred P. Colter, collector of inland revenue—Fredericton Gleaner.

Charles W. Manzer

Charles W. Manzer, aged 70, passed away at his home here on Saturday. Mr. Manzer had been the oldest agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in the New Brunswick Division. He started with the old New Brunswick Railway and served for about 45 years, until his retirement more than two years ago.

Mr. Manzer was a deacon of the United Baptist Church at Woodstock. After his retirement from the railway he was granted a license to preach in the Woodstock church and conducted services in several of the pastorless churches in Carleton county.

He was born at Aroostook Junction of United Empire Loyalist stock, a son of the late James Manzer and Mrs. Manzer, formerly Phoebe N. Estabrook. He was twice married, his first wife being Jessie G. Clayton, sister of James Clayton, of Nashua, Waak Village. She died in 1909. His widow was formerly Flora M. Rideout of Peel.

He is survived also by three sons, Donald R., of Saint John, C. Bernard, of Havana, Cuba, and Murray H., at home; two brothers, J. C. of Havana, and Herbert, of Aroostook Junction, and three sisters, the Misses Alice A. of Aroostook Junction, and Miss Gertrude of Brooklyn, N. Y. J. S. Clayton, C. P. R. terminal agent, West Saint John, is a nephew. Mr. Clayton first entered the service of the C. P. R. under the late Mr. Manzer.

Mr. Manzer was a man of very high character and a splendid employee of the Canadian Pacific Railway. J. M. Woodman, superintendent for the C. P. R. when informed of Mr. Manzer's death said, "His long service with our company was marked with hard work, efficiency and courtesy. I deeply regret his passing and my sympathy is extended to the bereaved family," Mr. Woodman continued.

The funeral was held Monday after-

noon from his residence, Broadway.

Service was conducted by Rev. H. E. Allaby, pastor of the United Baptist church, assisted by Rev. E. W. Lester, Rev. C. S. Young, Jacksonville, and Rev. Clayton Gray, Meductic.

The pall-bearers were Deacon Frank Olmstead, Deacon G. F. Sanborn, Charles McKenzie, F. L. Atherton, Robert Potter, and Theodore McKinney. The flower bearers were Deacon Percy Fillmore, Deacon H. G. Noble, Albert Babbirk and Douglas Faulkner. Interment was made in the Methodist cemetery. TOWN COUNCIL

Town Council met in regular session Friday evening Mayor Page and all Councillors present except Coun. Noden.

The matter of the pole line built to the island by the Woodstock Light and Power Co. was discussed at some length. In answer to a question, Mr. Hartley said there was no trade made with the Company, but he thought the Town might be under obligation to pay for a portion of the work. The street and light committee were appointed to meet Mr. Lindsay to see if a settlement cannot be arranged.

Coun. Turner, seconded by Coun. Everette, moved that a resolution of condolence be sent to the widow and family of the late Coun. B. A. Johnston, Carleton Place.

The Town Manager said he had called on thirteen merchants who were willing to subscribe \$5.00 each towards the publication of a tourist pamphlet and he thought he could get seven more, with the understanding that the Town and the Carleton Hotel subscribe \$100.00 each.

A motion was put through requesting the Town to go ahead with the issuing of the pamphlet as set forth by the Town Manager, and appoint a committee to assist that gentleman with the work.

An invitation was extended by Capt. T. W. Ritchie of the Salvation Army, asking the Councillors to attend in a body a lecture on "The Activities of the Salvation Army" in the United Baptist Church on May 6th. The Council accepted the invitation.

A petition from several citizens was received asking the Council to put a light at the top of Houlton Hill. Referred to light committee to report at next meeting.

The damage to the approach to Island Park was discussed by the Council, and it was decided that nothing could be done until the water recedes. In the meantime the Council will take any steps necessary to get ready to make the repairs.

The Town Manager explained that the break in the 10 inch water main leading to the Hospital might possibly have been caused by a defective pipe or from other causes which could not be determined. It was impossible to make repairs at present owing to the wet condition of the ground.
