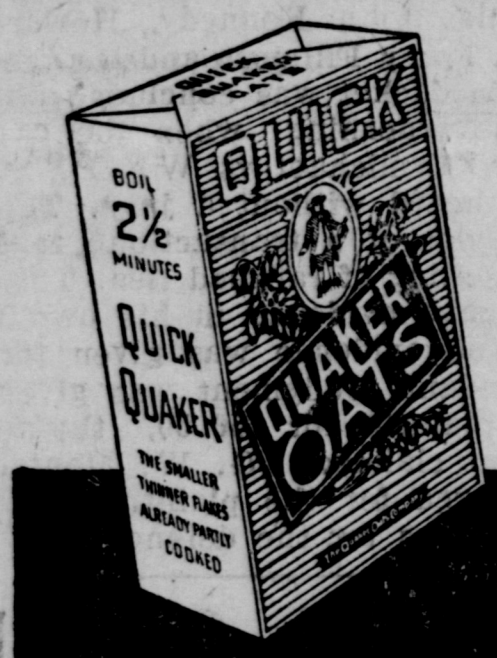

## FEDERAL AND PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS ARE VIGOROUSLY CONDEMNED BY SPEAKER AT HARTLAND MEETING

J. B. McNAIR CHARGES PREMIER BENNETT FAILED COMPLETELY TO CARRY OUT HIS PROMISES; DENOUNCES WASTE IN HANDLING OF NEW BRUNSWICK REVENUES

Emphatic condemnation of the administration both of the Federal and Provincial governments was voiced by J. B. McNair, of Fredericton, at an organization meeting and Liberal rally at Hartland on Friday evening. Mr. McNair charged that Premier Bennett had obtained office by making promises of all kinds, practically all of which he had failed to carry out. He also assailed the New Brunswick government for waste and extravagance.

The meeting was largely attended. Clarence Dunphy was in the chair. Others on the platform included F. O. Creighton, Dr. N. P. Grant, E. R. Jones, Woodstock, and Abner Belyea, Fredericton.

Mr. Creighton made a brief address in which he outlined the necessity for organization. This was followed by the election of officers and appointment of committees as follows:

Chairman, Clarence Dunphy, secretary, Ward Jensen; treasurer, William McLeod; list committee, Harry Barter, Hartland; Stephen Nixon, Lower Brighton; Joseph Pearson, Upper Brighton; transportation committee, Dr. L. DeC. McIntosh, Hartland; Fred K. Brown, Lower Brighton; William Bubar, Brighton; checkers committee, W. E. Thornton, Aven Nevers, Alan McIntosh, Murray Smith, Hoffer Birmingham; finance, A. R. Foster, F. W. Smith, Dr. L. DeC. McIntosh; executive committee, the chairman of each committee with the president, secretary and treasurer; delegates to provincial convention, Dr. L. DeC. McIntosh, Fred K. Brown, with A. R. Foster, who is ex-officio a delegate.

Mr. McNair then delivered the address of the evening. He first assailed Premier Bennett for non-fulfilment of his election pledges. Of particular interest to the people of Carleton county were certain definite pledges which had been made with regard to agriculture and which had not been carried out. On the contrary the government's policy had been ruinous to the basic industries of the country, agriculture, lumbering, mining and fishing. Opposed to this was the condition of the country during the eight years of Liberal administration which had preceded the Bennett regime. During these eight years Canada had had its period of greatest prosperity.

He disliked, Mr. McNair went on, assailing the record of an individual man, but Bennett had made himself an issue during the last election, with his lavish promises made on every platform from which he spoke. He had promised among other things that his government would take over the burden of old age pensions, but no old people in this province were in receipt of a single dollar of old age pensions.

In the face of his promise to blast a way to trade Canada's trade had steadily diminished. He had definitely promised to aid unemployment, but since he took office the unemployment figures had mounted from 117,000 to 700,000.

His tariff policy, Mr. McNair said, forced the farmers to buy at the highest price and sell at the lowest. The country was in the grip of a machine which was improving upon the example of Tammany.

Turning to provincial matters the speaker said that the years since 1925 had been the blackest in the history of the province. Grand Falls had been given away. Somebody got something out of it, but it was not the people. Rights of immense value had been given the International Pulp and Paper Co., for which the only return had been a mill at Dalhousie, for which no pulpwood had been cut last winter.

The provincial government and the International Co. loved the International Company.

Previous to the election of 1930, Mr. McNair said, \$5,500,000 had been spent on roads. The revenue from the gasoline tax this year would not be enough to pay a year's interest on this sum, he said.

The claim had been advanced that Federal and Provincial politics were entirely separate and independent of each other. If so, the speaker queried, why was the grand old road machine put to work in Royal a few days before the Federal by-election there, and taken off again the night before election?

In closing Mr. McNair said that the present battle was not between Liberals and Conservatives, but between the people and a Tory ring.

## RIVER VALLEY IS SWEEP BY STORM

CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE DONE BY HEAVY GALES AND RAIN

Considerable damage was done along the Saint John River valley Friday night and Saturday morning by the storm which swept the Atlantic seaboard. Torrential rains accompanied by heavy gales prevailed here, and many fruit trees were blown down. Roads were partially blocked in some places but no reports of serious interruption to traffic had reached the public works office here Saturday.

In Woodstock the Electric service was completely demoralized by branches falling across the wires in several parts of the town. The lights went off shortly after midnight, and service was not restored until about 6.45. Many trees were blown down, one of them narrowly escaping striking the residence of J. C. Folkins in lower Main street. George Allott, local merchant, had a close call while walking along Broadway when he was grazed by a falling tree, but escaped without injury. A boom, which had been stretched earlier in the day from the Hayden mill to the Upper end of the Island Park to keep the drive of pulpwood for the pulp mill in Saint John in the River channel, was blown ashore.

The noon express from McAdam was delayed more than an hour on Saturday while waiting for the Montreal train which was held up by washouts and trees across the railway.

Considerable damage was done to New Brunswick Telephone Co. lines, especially between Woodstock and Fredericton, and Hartland, Lakeville and Centreville were without lights Friday night.

A heavy thunderstorm accompanied by vivid lightning, rain and severe hail, passed over Woodstock on Sunday afternoon, lasting for about an hour. The storm did not appear to be general, places a few miles to the westward escaping it.

The heavy rains brought the water in the Saint John river and its tributary streams up to freshest height.

## BIRTH RATE INCREASES—DEATH RATE DECLINES

Fredericton, N. B., September 15.—New Brunswick's birth rate in 1931 was the highest recorded in this province in the last six years, while the death rate in 1931 was the lowest ever recorded in this province, being very considerably lower than in 1930. The 1931 Tuberculosis death rate in New Brunswick was also the lowest ever recorded in this province.

These figures, announced today by Dr. William Warwick, Chief Medical Officer of the Department of Health in New Brunswick, are contained in the preliminary report of the Vital Statistics for Canada, for the year 1931.

There were 10,800 births recorded in New Brunswick, in 1931, or 266 more than in 1930, thus giving New Brunswick a birth rate of 26.5 per thousand of population. There is only one province in Canada, Quebec, which showed a higher birth rate and while New Brunswick has been showing a slight increase for the last four years, Quebec has been showing a slight decline during that period.

There were 4644 deaths recorded, (347 less than in 1930), which is 11.4 per thousand population. This is the lowest death rate ever recorded for the province and is very considerably lower than that for 1930.

Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick show the highest general mortality rate in the order given.

## MORTALITY RATE DECLINES

It is interesting to note that during the past three years every province in Canada has shown a slight but consistent decline in mortality rate. It has been rather a startling fact that in spite of the economic depression the general mortality rate has continued to decline.

Infant Mortality, (deaths of infants under 1 year of age), totalled 944 in New Brunswick in 1931 (104 fewer than in 1930), giving a rate per thousand live births of 87.4. This is a new low rate for New Brunswick, being a decline of 12 per

cent over 1930—and a decline of 8.5 per cent over the previous lowest year (1928).

This decline in the infant mortality rate for the past few years is a great encouragement to those engaged in public health work in the province as, with the exception of Quebec, New Brunswick has in the past had the unenviable distinction of having the highest infant mortality rate in Canada.

Sixty mothers died in New Brunswick in childbirth in 1931, placing this province as the third highest in that respect with a rate per thousand live births of 5.6. While this rate is not as high as in some previous years there is not in this or in any of the provinces that steady and consistent decline that one would wish to see.

## FEWER MARRIAGES

A total of 2,544 marriages were reported in New Brunswick (217 fewer than in 1930), giving a rate of 6.2 per thousand population. But four other provinces show a higher rate while one equals New Brunswick.

All the provinces show a steady decline in their marriage rate during the past three years with the exception of Prince Edward Island which shows a slight increase.

The death rates from Typhoid, Measles and Scarlet Fever were lower in New Brunswick than for Canada as a whole while the death rate for

Diphtheria was slightly higher.

The Tuberculosis death rate 83 per hundred thousand population was the lowest ever recorded in New Brunswick. There were 339 deaths from Tuberculosis or 53 fewer than in 1930.

New Brunswick ranked as the fourth highest in Tuberculosis Death Rate; Quebec, Nova Scotia and British Columbia all having higher tuberculosis death rates than this province.

While the figures given in this pre-

liminary report of the Bureau of Statistics show that the present state of economic depression has so far had no adverse effect upon our Vital Statistics, it is possible that in the succeeding few years, there may be seen effects which are not now apparent, and therefore there is all the more reason for the carrying on of all public health measures which will, if possible, ensure a continuance of improvement in the health of the people of this province and of Canada.
