BOARD OF TRADE SUGGESTS ACTION FROM VICTORIA AND CARLETON CO.

Circular Letter Is Sent To Interested Parties Throughout Both Counties

ACTION TAKEN, IF ANY, WILL DEPEND ON CONSENSUS OF OPINION OF LUMBER AND POTATO DEALERS, BOARDS OF TRADE, AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES, ETC.

With the Imperial Conference at Ottawa already in session a move was made this week by the Woodstock Board of Trade with a view to ensuring that if the claims of this section of the country are neglected it will not be through any fault of our residents. The Board of Trade sent out a circular letter a few days ago to prominent lumbermen, potato dealers, Boards of Trade in Carleton and Victoria counties, the agricultural societies in the two counties, and other interested parties, asking if they thought any action necessary, and if so, along what lines.

The letter pointed out that in the past people in this part of the country had suffered through not having their claims advanced promptly at the proper time. It invited the parties addressed to state their views on the matter, and suggested that a central meeting be called if necessary, at which a full discussion could be held.

F. O. Creighton, president of the board, asked if the Woodstock Board contemplated any action, said that it was probable that such a body would not in itself be weighty enough to have much influence, and that if any recommendations were to be made, they should be made as result of concerted action. What action would be taken, if any, he said, depended on the consensus of opinion throughout this section of the province.

20 NORTHAMPTON FARMERS ORGANIZE NEW CLOVER CLUB

PURCHASE MACHINE TO PRODUCE CLOVER AND TIMOTHY SEED

A group of farmers in Northampton Parish made what looks like a very economical move last week when they formed the Northampton Clover Club. The club members, twenty in number, have ordered through K. E. MacLean a machine for threshing clover and timothy. The machine takes either hay or clover which has been properly seasoned and turns out well cleaned seed ready for sowing.

The club members purchased the machine primarily for their own use, but it is said that non members will be allowed to use it at a cost of approximately one third what it would cost them to buy seed. As several thousand dollars a year is expended by the farmers of Carleton county for this class of seed it can be seen that an opportunity exists for a big saving, while the nucleus of a new industry may also be formed by the owners. The machine is expected to be delivered about the end of July.

Bristol Man Acquitted On Arson Charge But Sent Up For Trial On Theft Count

MAGISTRATE RULES EVIDENCE NOT SUFFICIENT TO CONVICT BENNIE BRIGGS WITH BURNING OF CAMP BUT COMMITS HIM ON SECOND CHARGE

Bennie Briggs was sent up for trial on a charge of theft Tuesday by Magistrate L. A. Noble in the Bristol Police Court. A further charge of arson against him was dismissed. Briggs was charged with having burned a camp near Bristol belonging to Guy Welch and evidence was given that a short time before the fire he had uttered threats against the owner. The magistrate ruled the evidence insufficient to justify the defendant's being placed on trial.

Briggs was also charged with stealing a hand rake, some dynamite and two bushels of grass seed from Mr. Welch. Evidence was given by the complainant and George Giggery. Briggs refused to consent to the justification of the magistrate and was sent up for trial at the next sitting of the Carleton County court, G. W. Montgomery appeared for the Crown and J. Frank Frauley for the defence.

Local police are working on a daring break into the Woodstock United Farmers' store on Sunday night. The break is the fourth made in the same premises within a period of a few months, and all doors and windows on the ground floor were secured by barrel before the staff left the place. The thieves were evidently aware of the precautions taken and secured a ladder from outside the Woodstock Electric Co. premises.

They climbed the ladder to a second storey window, through which they entered, pulling the ladder in after them to escape observation. Later they took a rope from the store, tied it to a table and slid down it to the ground, leaving their ladder behind them. So far as could be determined from a check-up on the stock the only merchandise taken was a trench coat.

The potato crop is coming along excellently and is well up to the average for this time of year. The continued spell of wet weather has done no harm to the crop and there is no sign of blight in this district.

Growers state that there is no danger of blight as yet as the rows are not yet fully filled out. If the present weather continues however it is thought that the disease may make its appearance.

Grain is coming along well. Oats are now from two to three feet high according to the soil and well headed out.

FARMER CUTTING DOWN TREE LEAVES PART OF CAR. CO. WITHOUT POWER
