MEETING CALLED TO CONSIDER APPOINTMENT OF VICTORIAN ORDER NURSE

Rotary Seeks Expression Of Opinion

NET COST WOULD BE ABOUT \$1500 A YEAR; V. O. N. OFFICIAL TO SPEAK

Plans for the establishment of a Victorian Order Nurse in Woodstock neared a head today at the noon luncheon of the Woodstock Rotary Club at the Carleton hotel. It was announced that the net cost of maintaining a nurse here would be about \$1,500 annually, of which the Rotarians would be prepared to furnish a substantial amount. It was decided to call a general meeting in the town hall on Thursday evening of next week to which all clergymen of the town have been invited and all town organizations have been asked to send representatives. Miss Winnifred Dawson, eastern supervisor of the V. O. N., will be a speaker.

The Rotary Club has been working on the plan for several months. It was originally intended to confine their activities to follow up work in the schools, but it was found that the larger work could be done at only slightly more cost.

W. P. Jones, K. C., gave an interesting address on boundary matters between Maine and New Brunswick. Mr. Jones was not inclined to share the popular belief that Lord Ashburton had made a bad bargain for New Brunswick in the old international treaty, but said that the treaty had not always been strictly adhered to. The speaker, who was solicitor on a commission to investigate alleged infractions, said that for many years a huge volume of water had been diverted from Chamberlain Lake, near the border. This water, which should be coming down the Allegash to the Saint John river was going through the St. Croix instead.

Mr. Jones went on to say that the diversion had been made long ago by private parties, although the Maine Legislature had refused its sanction, and that in the meantime water power (Please turn to page 8)

Remembrance Day Will Be Observed With Service at Memorial

FROST AND SNOW GIVE CARLETON CO. ITS FIRST TOUCH OF WINTER WEATHER

Carleton county got a decided touch of winter this week. Cold weather set in over the week-end and continued during the first three days of this week, temperatures well below the freezing point being registered each night. Ponds in the vicinity froze up and some of the more venturesome of the younger spirits did a little skating, but found the ice too thin for comfort. Ice formed in the Meduxnakeag and along the shores of the Saint John river, but most of this ran out again.

On Tuesday afternoon and evening about two inches of snow fell. As the ground was frozen solidly most of this remained on Wednesday and traces of it were still to be seen yesterday, although it was melting rapidly. Yesterday was fine and quite mild after a cold night.

WOODSTOCK LUMBER COMPANIES WILL OPERATE ON LARGER SCALE THIS YEAR

J. H. HAY & SON WILL MORE THAN DOUBLE CUT OF LAST SEASON; IMPERIAL PRODUCTS, LTD., WILL SEND CREWS INTO WOODS AFTER YEAR'S LAY-OFF

Woodstock lumber companies are operating on a much larger scale this year than in past seasons. J. H. Hay & Son will cut more than 2,000,000 feet, it has been announced, more than double their cut of last year. The cut will be mostly hardwood, and will be exported to the British market. It will be made in the Milville district, where the firm has operated for several years past. Two mills will be used to saw the lumber, instead of one as in past seasons. The company's mill at Indian Brook will again be in operation, in addition to which a new mill will be opened at County Line. Crews are now at work constructing the new unit.

A start of the season's cut has already been made and about forty men are in the woods. The Imperial Products, Ltd., are also preparing for their winter cut. This company, which did not send out a crew at all last year, will cut about a million feet, both hard and softwood.

New Saw Mill May be Located In Woodstock This Winter Town Council Is Informed

IMPERIAL PRODUCTS, LTD., ARE CONSIDERING BUILDING IMMEDIATELY ON SITE OF OLD SMITH MILL; FIRE CHIEF DRAWS ATTENTION TO HAZARDOUS CONDITION OF BUILDINGS

There is a strong possibility that the Imperial Products, Ltd., will build a sawmill in Woodstock in the immediate future, it was learned at a meeting of the town council on Monday evening. Alfred Page, manager of the company, told the council that the company's present mill would be moved and that several sites for the new location were under consideration. These included the site of the old Smith mill on the south bank of the Meduxnakeag a few hundred yards above the Main street bridge. Mr. Page emphasized that if the mill was brought here the company would have to know where it stood regarding taxes.

Mr. Page said that the present assessment laws were not conducive to bringing industries into the town. His company was not asking immunity from taxation, but were insisting that on a reasonable assessment, say \$5000 for a term of ten years. As he understood the law the present council might not have the power to bind future councils by giving a fixed assessment, but he thought that special legislation or some other method might be used.

Mr. Page went on to say that the town would have to complete the dam at the mouth of the Meduxnakeag. He said that during his term of office as mayor this had been proposed, but had been held up while arrangements were being completed for a lease with the Power Company. This arrangement had now been completed and there was nothing to prevent the dam's being finished. This, he said, would cost about \$1000 and ought to be done whether the mill came in or not, if only from a health standpoint.

Coun. Hay said that a tax on the proposed mill at \$5000 assessment would soon pay for completing the dam. Several of the council expressed the opinion that every effort should be made to secure the mill.

In conclusion Mr. Page said that work on the mill, if it came here, would start right after the freeze-up. The intention at present was that the sawing would be a summer operation.

CATTLE TESTS ARE BEING MADE IN EAST OF COUNTY

Tests are being carried out at the present time on the eastern side of the Saint John river on all cattle, with a view of making the district a restricted tuberculosis area. Negotiations with the Federal government had been going on for some time with regard to the matter and a few days ago authorization arrived for the work to go on. Veterinaries have now been on the job for several days. While no announcement has been made it is understood that only a very small percentage of infected cattle is being found. A re-testing of the area on the western bank is also taking place. When the survey has been completed the whole of Carleton county will be a restricted district.

Veterans To Have Parade In Morning

STORES WILL BE CLOSED FOR THREE HOURS; BATTERY TO FIRE TWO ROUNDS

Woodstock's places of business will be closed tomorrow morning from 10 o'clock until 1 p. m. in observance of Remembrance Day. In the morning a veteran's parade will be held to the Soldiers' Memorial in front of the Court House for service. The parade will form in the drill hall of the armories at 10.15, and all veterans from this vicinity are being urged to attend. The dress will be muffs and medals. The parade will be headed by the Carleton Light Infantry band in scarlet dress uniforms. The 89th Field Battery will parade in uniform. The other active militia unit of the district will not parade as a body, as most of the officers and a large proportion of the other ranks are desirous of turning out with the veterans. The Woodstock Girl Guided will also march.

The parade will move off from the rear of the armories at 10.45 and will go by way of Connell, Green, Maple and Main streets to the monument. At eleven o'clock, the hour the armistice went into effect, a detachment of the 89th battery will fire one round. Two minutes of silence will then be observed, after which the battery will fire another round.

This will be followed by a short service with Rev. S. C. Gray, rector of St. Luke's church as speaker. After service the parade will go to the cemeteries where the soldiers' graves will be decorated. In the afternoon many of the veterans will attend the unveiling of the Soldiers' Memorial at Hartland.

On Monday evening the Ladies' Auxiliary of the local legion will hold a banquet at the armories to which all returned soldiers are invited.

TOMMY CANDIDATE FOR TROPHY AWARD

FORMER WOODSTOCK PLAYER ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE VALUED FOOTBALL AWARD

Toronto, Nov. 8.—Governors of the Interprovincial Rugby Union will vote in a few days to decide who is to succeed the veteran Alex Denman of Hamilton Tigers as holder of the Jeff Russell Memorial Trophy, awarded annually to the player most gentlemanly on the field and most useful to his team.

Denman, veteran of a dozen seasons with the Bengals, climaxed his career with the Tiger Tanks by gaining the award in 1932. But youth predominates in the list of candidates for the honor this year. Each team names two of its players for consideration.

Andy Tommy, sensational half-back, and Bud Andrews, flying wing, have been named by Ottawa Roughriders. Both are playing in their first Big Four campaign.

Argonauts have nominated Jim Palmer, captain and inside stalwart, and Teddy Morris, line-smashing backfielder who also is a neat secondary defenceman.

The veteran Brian Timmins, nearing the end of a career with Hamilton Tigers during which he was recognized as the outstanding middle wing in the country for years, and Seymour Wilson, outside, are Tigers' nominees.

CARLETON CO. COW HAS FINE RECORD

A. E. RAYMOND'S MARJORIE ONE OF OUTSTANDING PRODUCERS IN EASTERN CANADA

The Jersey cow Rosebush Sultan's Marjorie, owned by A. E. Raymond, Woodstock, N. B., recently completed a splendid record at 5 years of age.

Marjorie has produced 10,063 lbs of milk, 570 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 5.66%. She is a daughter of the great sire Imported Rower's Sultan, used for several years at Mr. Raymond's farm, where he sired many outstanding individuals, and himself was several times a grand champion in the show ring. Marjorie has two other records and at 2 years of age, produced 9,261 lbs. of milk and 528 lbs. of fat, and at 4 years 8,216 lbs. of milk and 497 lbs. of fat in 305 days. Her three records therefore average 561 lbs. of fat. She is fresh again and is going stronger than ever is expected to go over 700 lbs. of fat this period and win a gold medal certificate. Marjorie has also been a winner in the show ring and is certainly one of the great cows of Eastern Canada.

Large Stone Grotto at Skiff Lake Shrine Has Been Completed

NEW STRUCTURE IS BUILT OF NEW BRUNSWICK FIELD STONE AND TOWERS TWENTY FEET IN AIR; WILL BE ILLUMINATED IN PILGRIMAGE SEASON

For the last few weeks a crew of men with stone masons have been engaged at the Skiff Lake Shrine, where a large stone grotto has been erected. The grotto has been built of large New Brunswick field stone and towers some twenty feet in the air. The base forms a solid mass of stone fifteen feet square, while the cavity measures ten feet high, four feet wide and five feet deep. The walls and arched roof enclosing the grotto measure two feet in thickness. The whole structure presents a huge massive appearance with a rugged endurance as challenging as the surrounding hills.

A new life sized figure of St. Francis of Assisi is to be placed in the grotto which is so constructed as to admit of illumination. During the pilgrimage season the interior and front of the grotto will be lighted with myriads of varied colored lights.

Situated to the southeast of the Shrine the grotto presents a most commanding appearance and when lighted at night will be visible for miles around. Pilgrims visiting the Shrine next year in addition to the beautiful grotto will note many improvements in the grounds and approaches to the Shrine.

The work was supervised by Very Rev. C. J. McLaughlin, of Debec, in whose parish the Shrine is situated.
