CANADIAN FLYING CLUBS SQUADRON TO VISIT WOODSTOCK IN AUGUST

Overnight Monster Liberal Rallies Planned For Kings and Charlotte Stop Here Both Ways

FLIGHT OF SIX OR MORE
PLANES WILL MAKE TOUR
OF MARITIMES

Woodstock will be visited in August, according to present plans, by a squadron of aircraft on a goodwill tour sponsored by the Canadian Flying Clubs Association. The squadron, numbering at least six planes and probably more, will call here at the outset of their Maritime tour and will again stop off on their way back, remaining overnight each time. Word of the proposed visit was received on Wednesday by J. C. Folkins, local aviator, from George M. Ross, executive secretary of the Canadian Flying Clubs Association.

The tour is primarily intended to stimulate interest in travel by air, to stimulate development of ground facilities, and particularly to mark the opening of new airports in the Maritime Provinces. There will be at least six aircraft in the party, which will feature the popular Toronto Flying Club three machine formation. In addition to this there will be a Gipsy Moth machine flown by Mr. Ross, a Puss Moth flown by Stuart Graham, and a Puss Moth CF40L with Pat Reid at the controls. It is probable that at least one or two additional machines will also make the trip.

The party will leave the St. Hubert airport, Montreal, at 5 p. m. on Monday August 14 for Quebec where they will remain overnight. They will leave Quebec the following morning and are due to arrive in Woodstock at 12.30, on their first landing in the Maritime Provinces. They will remain in Woodstock until Wednesday at 9 a. m. when they will take off again for Moncton. From Moncton they will go to Saint John and thence to Amherst. The next eight days will be spent cruising about Nova Scotia (Please turn to page 8)

WOODSTOCK AVIATOR GETS NEW PLANE TO REPLACE ONE DESTROYED LAST YEAR

J. C. Folkins, Woodstock garage proprietor and aviator, has purchased a plane from the Canadian Airways, Ltd., of Moncton. Improvements have been made to the hanger and landing field at the Island Park to accommodate the new machine. There have been no planes permanently attached to the local airport since planes belonging to H. W. Oldham and to Mr. Folkins were destroyed by fire several months ago. The new plane is similar in type to Mr. Folkins' old machine, but much more powerful and faster. It is a Travelair biplane with a Wright-whirlwind motor and was formerly used in the Moncton-Charlottetown service. It made the trip here from Moncton in a few minutes over the hour, its cruising speed being slightly more than 100 miles per hour.

89TH BATTERY TO LEAVE FOR CAMP ON 22ND OF JUNE

UNIT IS NOW PREPARING FOR INSPECTION BY DISTRICT COMMANDANT

The 89th Battery C. F. A. will leave on June 22 for ten days training at the artillery camp at Petawawa. The battery is now at work and parades are being held two evenings a week in preparation for a general inspection by Brigadier J. L. R. Parsons, district commandant. At present about forty of all ranks are turning out, but the strength will have to be cut down a little before the unit entrains for Petawawa, as the number of men who may be taken to camp this year is limited to thirty-five, all ranks.

Major J. McL. Boyer will command the battery at camp with Capt. G. Y. Jones second in command. Other officers will be Lieuts. Ray J. Smith, Gerald Peabody and B. Colpitts will be battery sergeant-major. Herbert Bryant, who goes to the brigade headquarters staff as regimental sergeant-major with the rank of first class warrant officer.

No Outbreaks In Woodlands In This Area

Although several troublesome forest fires have broken out in New Brunswick within the last week, no outbreaks have been reported in this area during that time. Warden W. H. Bradbury reports. An alarm was received a few days ago from the observation tower at Plaster Rock, where the lookout had detected smoke rising back of Bristol. Investigation was immediately made and it was found that the smoke was coming from slash which was being burned under the supervision of wardens.

It is said that McKinley will meet one of the best men in his class here and that the winner will be in line for a chance at the Canadian title.

Political Picnics Are Set For July

SIMILAR GATHERING IN CARLETON COUNTY IS UNDER CONSIDERATION

With both provincial and federal elections again beginning to loom on the political horizon New Brunswick is being swept by a wave of Liberalism such has not been known in recent years. In various parts of the province organization has already been undertaken and great optimism exists both among the leaders and the rank and file of the party. The progress made by Liberalism in the last few years is shown by the number of voters not previously identified with the party who are now lining up with the opposition forces. In Kings and Charlotte counties the Liberal Associations are holding monster political picnics, which are scheduled for the early part of July.

At these picnics Hon. A. A. Dymally, leader of the opposition in the Legislature and head of the Liberal party in New Brunswick will be a speaker. Other speakers will include Liberal leaders in the Federal field. It is probable that Rt. Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, present leader of the Liberal party in Canada and former Prime Minister, will be present and will address both gatherings. The holding of a similar picnic in Carleton county is being discussed and it is quite possible that arrangements will be made to have one at some central location, although no definite plans have been made as yet, and no formal decision has been reached. NOTICED BY PASSENGER IN TRAIN, CAUGHT IN LEDGE OF ROCK

The body of Edison Woodland, young Perth man who was drowned on May 24 was found in the Saint John river at Upper Woodstock late yesterday afternoon. The body which was badly decomposed, was identified by the young man's father, and was taken to Perth last evening for interment.

The body was noticed first by Miss Flora Demerchant of Perth, who was a passenger on the down express. As the train was passing over the Upper Woodstock railway bridge Miss Demerchant noticed an object in the water, lodged on a ledge of rock about 100 feet from the western bank. BOY SCOUT CAMP

TROOPS TO GO UNDER CANVAS ON JULY 18

The Woodstock Troop of Boy Scouts will go into camp at Meductic on July 18. It has been announced. The camp will be held on the site it occupied two years ago, none having been held last year. Scoutmaster Rev. S. C. Gray will be in charge, and it is expected that about twenty boys will be present. They will remain under canvas for eight days, breaking camp on July 26. The location chosen is a historic one on the site of the old Indian village and stronghold a short distance north of the present village of Meductic. Water will be drawn from the famous Gies Spring, named for the first Englishman to visit the ground now occupied by Woodstock. The culinary part of the program will be well looked after, Jim Gough having been re-engaged to act as cook. Transportation will be looked after by members of the Woodstock Rotary Club who will visit the camp daily. An open air service will be held on Sunday, July 23.
