BARN, GRANARY BURNED

Hartland, June 2—Fire last evening destroyed a barn and granary owned by W. Pennington McMullin. The buildings were beyond the fire protection area and could not be reached by water. Nothing could not be done to save the property. The loss was in the vicinity of \$2,000, with no insurance. Valuable farm machinery was consumed by the flames.

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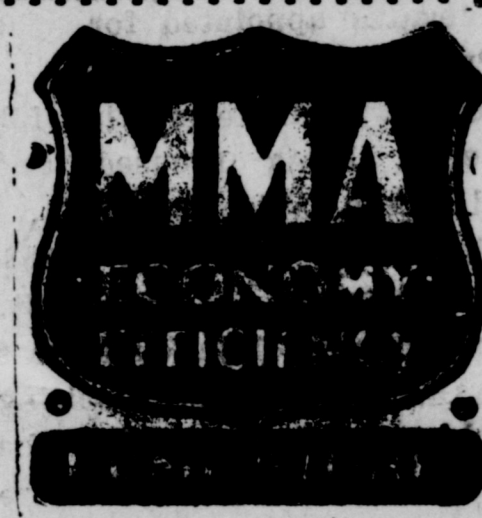
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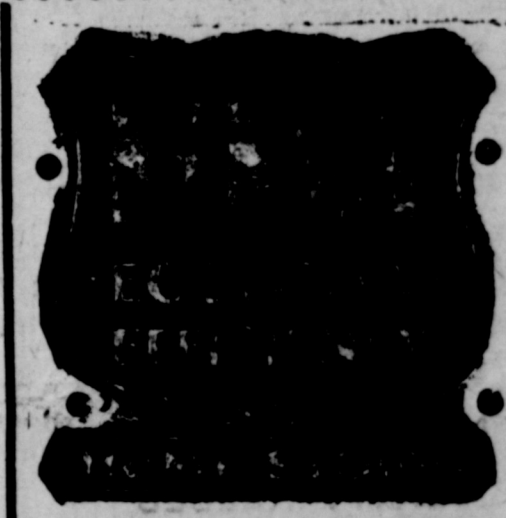
