PRICE OF POTATOES AGAIN REACHES THE DOLLAR MARK IN CARLETON CO.

Market Now Expected To Keep Steady

FARMERS WARNED TO BRING IN STOCK GRADUALLY AND PREVENT GLUT

The potato market was strong here this week with the price crossing the dollar mark for the first time since before Christmas. Demand from Montreal was steady and shipments from the local market were being readily absorbed. Green Mountains reached \$1 a barrel on Monday and the price has held steady ever since, with Irish Cobblers bringing 85 to 90 cents a barrel. Hauling was light as the farmers are busy on the land. At Belleville \$1.05 was being paid yesterday.

Local shippers are of the opinion that a steady market will exist for the balance of the stocks held in Carleton county if the sale is carried on in an orderly manner, and that the price will hold firm at a dollar and possibly go a little higher.

They point out that the market reached a dollar earlier in the season, but that heavy hauling forced the price down. Growers then became panicky and started to unload their stocks with the result that the price was depressed to 50 cents. They warn the farmers that a glut of the market at present would probably disorganize it for the next thirty days.

It is believed that the local shipping season will be considerably longer than usual as reports from the southern states indicate that the planting has been held back for several weeks by high water, many of the fields in Virginia being still submerged.

It is expected that the early crop may be delayed as much as thirty days and that the local market will be benefited accordingly.

NEW SPECIES OF GAME BIRDS SEEN NEAR NEWBURGH

Several Hungarian pheasants have been seen in Carleton County recently. Game Warden W. H. Bradbury reports. The first one of the species was seen several weeks ago by a survey party, and others have been noticed more recently. One hen partridge comes out of the woods regularly at a farm near Newburgh and mingles with the hens, returning to the woods at night. The pheasants are believed to be from a flock released several months ago at the mouth of the Keswick, and their presence here is taken to indicate that they are spreading out and that they passed their first New Brunswick winter successfully. It is hoped that the species will take kindly to the New Brunswick climate, as they are excellent game birds of fine appearance.

THREE INJURED AND ONE JAILED AFTER CAR CRASH

THIRSTY AMERICANS FIND THAT CANADIAN CONCRETE IS HARD STUFF

The first serious automobile accident of the season occurred here on Friday night when an Illinois car ran into a silent policeman at the corner of Broadway and the Houlton Road. Following the crash Harry H. DeFer, the driver, was taken to jail and his three companions to the hospital suffering from more or less serious injuries.

According to police reports the four, who are engaged in railway work in Maine, came to Woodstock Friday afternoon and did some celebrating. They started on their return trip on Friday evening with DeFer at the wheel, but had only got to the end of Broadway when DeFer's attention was distracted by one of the others, and the car swerved and crashed into the silent policeman, a heavy affair of steel and concrete with a five foot underground base.

The shock wrecked the car, canting the policeman considerably, and catapulted R. E. Payton, owner of the machine, through the windshield, breaking his jaw and giving him some nasty minor cuts and bruises. James Duggan and Brice Nae also suffered cuts and bruises, DeFer escaping with a shaking-up. Chief Harry Schriver sent the three injured men to the Fisher Memorial Hospital and took DeFer into custody.

He came before Magistrate Fowler in the police court here on Saturday morning and paid a \$10 fine on a drunkenness charge. A charge of drunken driving was allowed to stand. Duggan and Nae were able to leave the hospital on Monday, and also paid \$10 fines before leaving for home.

COW MOOSE TAKE A LITTLE STROLL AT JACKSONVILLE

A cow moose caused some excitement at Jacksonville Monday when it left the woods and invaded the farm of Basil Harper. From there it wandered past the school where it took fright when the scholars tried to approach it. It was then chased by a dog and became tangled in a wire fence but extricated itself and disappeared in the woods back of George Gray's farm. The animal was in good condition and appeared to have passed the winter well. It is several years since moose have been seen in the Jacksonville district.

SEEDING HAS NOW BECOME GENERAL

FARMERS WERE HELD UP BY COLD AND WIND

Farmers are busy on the land this week, taking advantage of the favorable weather to get their crops in after having been held up for about a fortnight by cold weather and wind.

Planting in some districts was fairly general by the first of the week, but many farmers were hindered by the high winds which prevented the proper spreading of fertilizer. Yesterday was a good day, however, and most of them took advantage of the fact to get a good start. A considerable portion both of the grain and potato crops is now in the ground.

Planting so far confirms earlier indications that the potato crop would be a very light one this year. It is now thought that the original estimates, which were of course little more than intelligent guesses, that the acreage would only be fifty per cent of that of last year, or 25 per cent of normal, may be slightly surpassed.

NEW CREAMERY TO BE IN OPERATION IN NEAR FUTURE

RAPID PROGRESS BEING MADE WITH INSTALLATION OF MACHINERY

Rapid progress is being made with the preparation of the new creamery plant of General Dairies, Ltd., here. The large churn arrived about a fortnight ago and has been assembled. The other machinery has also arrived and is now being put in place. It is expected that the plant will be ready for operation in about a week's time, which will be well within the estimate formerly set by company officials as the probable opening date.

Asked as to when the collection of cream would be started Vernon W. Simms, local manager of the company, said that no date had yet been set but that arrangements were being worked out, and intimated that the trucks would be in operation well before the end of the month.

All Greens To be Ready By May 24th

WINTER WAS HARDEST ON GRASS YET EXPERIENCED BY CLUB

The local golf course is rapidly getting into conditions for the summer play. While the season is backward and the growth of grass much slower than usual the course is dry and four of the greens were in use yesterday. The rest of them will be open in time for the formal opening of the season on May 24.

Many of the members have been playing regularly for several days, but winter rules are still in force. The course came through the winter in fairly good shape with the exception of the first green, where the grass was winterkilled, and water in the subsoil caused some unevenness. The green is being rebuilt, and will be out of use for the present season. A temporary green, slightly to the left of the present one between it and the tee will be used.

So far as is known this will be the only major work necessitated, although it is proposed to build at least one more permanent green before the season ends.

While the course is now in fair shape the winter was the hardest on grass that has been experienced since the club was formed, and much grass was winterkilled.

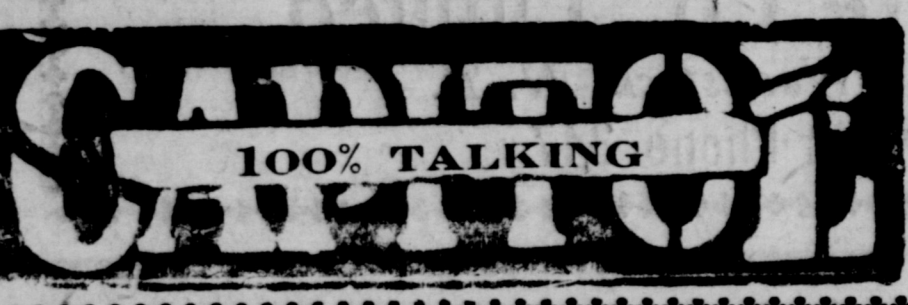
POWER OFF
