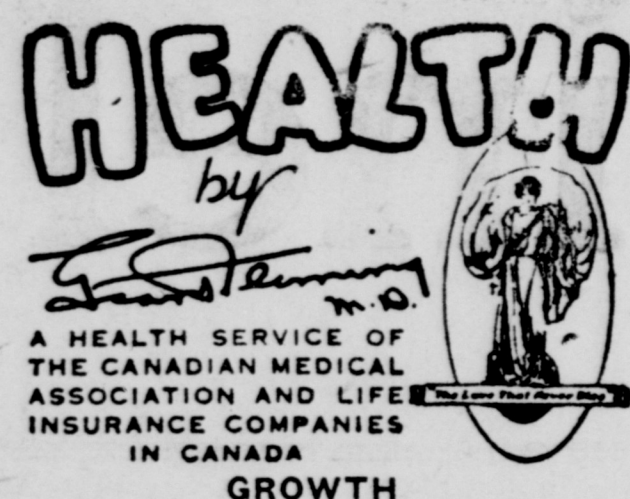
THE PROBLEM OF

INTERNATIONAL DEBT

(British Trade Review)

In his interesting contribution to this issue of "The British Trade Review," Dr. Hermann Schmitz discusses the salient features of the great economic crisis and, like all of us, looks to the World Economic Conference to find a solution of the difficult problems that beset the nations. What could be done to satisfy the principles of honor and justice has been done. The League of Nations lent its help and endeavored to reduce to concrete terms the vast mass of international liabilities that were left as an inheritance of the Great War. It was believed that pre-war conditions could be restored, and that the Gold Standard would provide the common denominator of values. That hope has been balked. The stability of the pre-war system lay in the reality of the obligations created. If a nation or an individual borrowed it was for reproductive expenditure, and the goods and services so created enriched both creditor and debtor. Each nation applied itself to the tasks that would most enhance the general well-being, and the agriculture of the East and West entered into free exchange with the products of European culture. Progress was general. That system was shattered by the war as a mirror is shattered when a stone is flung against it. The attempt to reduce the fictitious wealth of war debts and reparations into the reality of gold has proved a calamitous failure. There are times, indeed, when it is waste of effort to try to piece together the broken fragments of a great smash and wiser to begin to reconstruct everything again from the foundation. That is the situation with which the world is confronted to-day. That is why the President of the United States of America, now assuming the leadership of the most powerful nation on earth, demands powers as great as those he would claim if the country were imperilled by foreign invasion. We dare not look back. We must march forward into the sun.

Not the least interesting item concerning the present Mt. Everest expedition is the incidental revelation that there is such a thing as a "Sino-Tibetan war" now in progress.



"Great cake from little acorns grow". The human body develops from one minute cell. It seems almost incredible that our complex bodies with their highly specialized tissues and organs all have their beginning in the same single cell, the simplest form of life.

The one cell, which is the beginning of life, grows and multiplies until it has produced the millions of cells which make up the human body. We do not know what causes the cell to multiply, this factor is the spark of life itself.

As all parts of the body have their common origin in one cell, so do they remain interdependent through life. A healthy body is healthy in all its parts. Disease in any one part affects the whole structure.

Food and oxygen are required by all body cells. Without food and oxygen, the cells seen perish while a lack of these substances results in faulty growth.

The food we take into our mouths must be altered before it can be used. This change begins in the mouth where the food is mixed with saliva, and the process of digestion starts with certain changes in the starches, proteins, and fats. The presence of food in the mouth calls forth a flow of saliva. Because of gas associations, the sight or smell of food has the same effect and it is a fact that our mouths actually water at the sight or smell of food.

The saliva not only acts as a digestive fluid but it also dissolves the food and makes it easier to swallow. In addition, the saliva keeps the mouth clean and lubricates the parts. A dry mouth is uncomfortable and interferes with speech.

Passing down the gullet, the food reaches the stomach. The stomach also waters at the sight and smell of food, and as a result of the taste of food in the mouth, gastric juice is therefore ready in the stomach to continue the process of digestion. The gastric juice is the only body fluid which is acid. The cells lining the stomach are capable of resisting the effects of this acid fluid. The normal stomach is acid or sour.

The flow of gastric juice is interfered with by emotional upsets. This is one reason why unpleasant or irritating subjects should not be mentioned at meal-time. There is some truth in the saying — "Laugh and grow fat". Pleasant conditions at meal-time do promote good digestion.

From the stomach, the food passes to the intestines where digestion is completed, and the food absorbed and carried in the blood stream all over the body.

AT THE ADVENT CHRISTIAN CH.

Pastor M. C. Burtt spoke last Sunday evening on "The Rich Man and Lazarus," Luke 16th chapter.

It is impossible, he said, to explain this transaction literally. To do so would be to expand Abraham's bosom to admit all the saved. It would also necessitate the placing of the blessed and the damned eternally within sight of each other. Such monstrous conclusions would be worthy only of an insane mind. And there is not a word about soul or spirit in the whole affair.

The Rich man was a son of Abraham, and so were the Jews. He also belonged to a people that had Moses and the prophets and they were the Jews, Romans 3:1, Psalms 147:19-20.

The high estate of the Rich man was like the high estate of the Jewish nation described in Deuteronomy 32:8-14. The Rich man stands for those people. From their high estate the Jewish nation fell to the lowest depths of degradation and misery. "Thou didst despise thyself even unto hell" said Isaiah 57:9. "They shall be burnt with hunger and consumed with burning heat" said Moses Deut 32:24.

Dr. Nordeau, addressing the first Zionist convention in Basel, Switzerland, in 1897 said, "For hundreds of years we have been in a tomb, in a grave which lacked the peace of the grave."

Lazarus was a beggar full of sores, a miserable representative of the righteous either physically or morally. A beggar is destitute, and the Gentiles were destitute of every essential of their well-being. Ephesians 2:11-12

From their beggarly condition the Gentiles were elevated through Christ to sonship with Abraham, Galatians 3:29; Ephesians 2:13-19. The bosom of Abraham signifies parental relationship. Compare Numbers 11:12.

The Rich Man's brethren would not believe though one rose from the dead. Jesus Christ did rise from the dead and the Jews would not believe him.

THAMES WATERMEN AT WORK

In "The P. L. A. Monthly" for May, Mr. Frank Bowen, writes on Gravesend and refers to the work of Thames watermen:—

"Gravesend is also the headquarters of a very big division of London's watermen, and to describe a tenth of the innumerable jobs tackled by that ancient but little-known body would require a chapter in itself. To mention only a few which are undertaken every day at Gravesend, there is the assistance to pilots, either at the forecastle head or at the wheel; the handling of ships in dock once they are outside the jurisdiction of Trinity House; the transporting of passengers afloat on the river for business or pleasure; the supply of fresh victuals and a thousand and one jobs which make for the comfort of a ship's company strange to the port. To see a pair of watermen, in one of the stout wherries which have been locally built to the same excellent design for nearly a century, come alongside a steamer moving up the river at a fair speed and make fast with a large hook on the end of a line, knowing perfectly well that a single false move will put them both into the river, is to see a very smart piece of work calling for nerve and activity. Nowadays, in accordance with modern tradition, a large number of these pulling wherries are being replaced by motor boats of various types and sizes, but for a lot of the watermen's work the wherry is still the handiest when it is in the hands of masters of their job."
