HOW THE DOCKS DEAL WITH A FRUIT CARGO

The arrival in London of a record cargo of deciduous fruit from South Africa is described in the May number of "The P. L. A. Monthlio." Just what happens after the ship with such a cargo comes alongside is like this:—

"As soon as hatches are removed, the cranes get to work, cases being lifted in sets on to electric and hand quay trucks which bear the cases to the adjacent transit sheds. Here the scene is one of intensive activity, the stream of packages having to be sorted strictly to the numerous marks. This sorting, as well as the other operations until delivery is effected, is undertaken by the Port Authority. Merchants lodge delivery orders, and after checking and tallying, the cases are passed to the waiting road lorries or rail trucks standing ready to leave for London or provincial markets."

"Fruit importations to London have trebled in the last decade. Intensive advertising of the health-giving qualities of fruit is now 'bearing fruit' amongst the steadily increasing resident population of the Metropolis, and the high standard of working in the Port has also been a material factor in assuring the markets of adequate supplies in first-class condition."
