WOODSTOCK TO BE CANADIAN STARTING POINT FOR WORLD PEACE PLAN

Outline Is Two Day Harness Racing Program Gets Away To Good Start Sketched By Rev. H. Camp

MOVE ON FOOT TO GET PEOPLE
TO GO ON RECORD AGAINST
WAR

Woodstock will be the starting point in Canada of a world wide peace movement, originated by Francis Lederer, famous American radio broadcaster. The spokesman for the movement in this province will be Rev. Dr. Harold Camp, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Oakland, Calif. Dr. Camp, a former Woodstock man, is spending his holidays in Woodstock and at Skiff Lake. He will preach at the morning and evening services in the United Baptist Church here on Sunday.

Dr. Camp has been in frequent consultation with Mr. Lederer concerning the peace movement, and while at first skeptical as to the possibility of preventing war has been won over to the plan, which he considers practical and logical. He has been asked by Mr. Lederer to go to Berlin to present it to the World Baptist Alliance, which will be in session there next month. NEW PRODUCE IN

PEAS PLENTIFUL AT 35 CENTS
A PECK

New summer produce was on the local market in fairly large quantities this week. New potatoes made their first appearance and were plentiful at 4 cents a pound. There was a good supply of green peas at 35 cents a peck, and string beans were scarce at 60 cents. New beets were selling at 10 cents a bunch, carrots and onions at the same price and cabbage at ten cents a head. Strawberries are about done, a few boxes selling at 15 cents, with gooseberries at 10 cent. Native blueberries are not yet on sale. Eggs were unchanged at 20 cents a dozen and butter at 20 cents a pound.

FORMER WOODSTOCK BOY CHOSEN ON WRESTLING SQUAD FOR EMPIRE GAMES

Teddy McKinley, a Woodstock boy now resident in Toronto, will be a member of the Canadian wrestling team for the British Empire games, according to present plans. McKinley is one of a squad of seven who has been picked to make the trip, although advices from Montreal are to the effect that scarcity of funds may force a curtailment of the number. McKinley, who recently won the 123 pound championship of Canada, cleaned up his class in the trial events at Montreal, beating Roger Desrosiers, Montreal in the semi-final, and George Murray, of Montreal, in the final by a fall in four minutes and one second.

McKinley was home for several weeks last summer and gave several wrestling exhibitions here.

CENTENNIAL OF CHURCH WILL BE OBSERVED IN AUG.

FREE BAPTIST CHURCH WAS
ESTABLISHED HERE IN
AUGUST 1934

The centennial of the organization of the Free Baptist Church in Woodstock will be celebrated next month. The first Baptist church was established on Aug. 22, 1834. The observance of the centennial week will begin on Sunday and will continue until the following Sunday, during which time special services will be held with several outside speakers in attendance.

On the opening Sunday the special preacher will be Rev. Dr. G. B. McDonald, of Saint John, son of a former pastor here. Other speakers will include Rev. W. F. Parker, of Sussex, a former pastor of the Albert street church, and Mrs. J. E. Wilson, of Plaster Rock.

On Wednesday, the actual anniversary date, the speaker will be Rev. Dr. W. C. Kierstead, of the University of New Brunswick. On Friday evening a special program might will be held, and on the concluding Sunday the preacher will be Rev. L. E. Ackland, of Bridgetown, representing the pastors of the church since union.

Pilgrimage Is Set For Sunday, August 12

Sunday Aug. 12, has been announced as the date of the annual pilgrimage to the Skiff Lake Shrine, by Very Rev. Dean C. J. McLaughlin, the priest in charge. There will be a pilgrims' walk at 10 o'clock, followed at 10.30 by services at the shrine. The pilgrimage is annually attended by many hundreds of visitors.

BOAT STEALING CHARGE DISMISSED

MAGISTRATE WARNS BOYS TO
KEEP OUT OF
TROUBLE

Cases against Frank Hemphill, charged with stealing a boat from Robert Edgett, and Gustave McNutt and James Dickinson, charged with being in possession of the boat, knowing it to be stolen, were dismissed by Magistrate Augherton in the police court here Tuesday afternoon. The magistrate said that there was no doubt that the boys were in possession of the boat and that they knew it belonged to the complainant, but that there was little or no evidence to connect them with taking it. He therefore dismissed them with a warning to keep out of further trouble.

Tenders For Surfacing Woodstock - Hartland Road Scheduled to Close Friday

PAVEMENT WILL BE TWENTY FEET WIDE WITH THREE INCH
ASPHALT BASE AND ONE INCH SURFACING; SUBSTANTIAL DE-
POSIT CALLED FOR FROM TENDERS

Tenders for about 70 miles of hard surfaced road in New Brunswick will close on Friday. The work will be done in several sections of from eight to thirteen miles each. These include one from the northern town limits of Woodstock along No. 2 highway through Victoria Corner to the Hartland bridge, a distance of eleven miles. Widening, grading and conditioning the road in preparation for the hard surfacing have been going on for several weeks.

The conditions call for the depositing of a certified cheque for \$28,000 with tenders for this contract.

The pavement is to be twenty feet wide with four feet of gravelled roadway on each side. A three inch base of asphalt will be laid and this will be covered with a one inch surfacing of asphalt. The impression which many people have got that this surfacing will be similar to the strips laid on the Woodstock-Grafton highway bridge is incorrect, as it will be mixed and rolled.

Several contractors were in town this week looking over the scene of the operations.

The annual boy scouts' camp for this district opened at Meductic Tuesday. 22 scouts from Woodstock are under canvas and about 16 from Centerville. Rev. S. C. Gray is in charge of the camp with Rev. D. M. Pugh, of the University of New Brunswick, district scout commissioner, is expected in camp on Saturday and will remain until it breaks up.

Arrangements are being made to have several talks given to the boys in the evenings. A. L. Slipp will speak to them on nature study, Edgar Neal on the British Navy, and Dr. G. F. Clarke on Indian lore. Dr. J. F. L. Brown will give instruction in first aid.

The well from which the camp gets its water is the same one he mentions so frequently in the story of his experiences.

FORMER MANAGER SPEAKS TO ROTARY

R. F. ARMSTRONG COMMENDS
TOWN POLICY OF DEBT
REDUCTION

R. Fraser Armstrong, formerly Woodstock town manager, now superintendent of the Kingston, Ont., general hospital, addressed the Woodstock Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon at the Carlisle hotel at noon Monday. Mr. Armstrong complimented the town on its financial policy, pointing out that the bonded indebtedness had been reduced by about \$80,000 in the last ten years, a period during which many Canadian towns had been increasing their debt. He was not so complimentary regarding New Brunswick's highways, where, he said, he had found the dust nuisance a great drawback to comfortable travel.

JOB TO START SOON

CREEK DAM WORK WAITS
PROVINCIAL SANCTION

The work of completing the dam across the mouth of the Meduxnekeag river is expected to be begun in the near future. Instructions have been received from the Federal authorities as to how the fishway is to be built, and plans have been filed with the provincial government and notice of the work given in the Royal Gazette. As soon as permission is received from the province the job will start, unless a rise of water in the meantime causes delay.
