CENTRAL TRUST MEETS

At the Annual General Meeting of
the shareholders of The Central
Trust Company of Canada, held in
Moncton on the 13th day of March,
a statement for the past year was pre-

The report of Dr. R. C. Tait, the
president, showed a balance being car-
ried forward in Profit and Loss Ac-

NOTICE

The dog by-law is published below,
and the cooperation of all dog owners
is asked.

The majority of our tax-payers do
not own dogs and rightly expect con-
sideration and protection.

If dog owners do not comply with
the law, it will be taken for granted
that they haven't any interest in the
matter and the dog will be destroyed.

A LAW RESPECTING DOGS

BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED
by the Town Council of the Town of
Woodstock on the sixth day of June
A. D. 1933 as a bylaw as follows:

1. (a) In this by-law the expres-
sion "dog" except where otherwise
expressed, includes "bitch".

(b) The expression "owner" in-
cludes every person on whose premis-
es a dog commonly lives whether the
property of such person or not.

2. The owner of every dog shall
cause such dog to wear a collar with
the name of such owner plainly stamp-
ed or inserted thereon.

3. Every dog which is found run-
ning at large within the town without
such collar shall be deemed to have
no owner and may be destroyed by
any member of the police force of
said town or by any other person who
may be designated by the Town Coun-
cil for such purpose.

4. No person shall permit or al-
low any dog, being his property, to
run or go at large in the town except
on leash, and the fact that any dog is
so found at large shall be prima facie
evidence that such running at large
was done by permission of the own-
er. Any person so permitting or al-
lowing such dog to run or go at large
except on leash shall be guilty of an
offence and liable on summary con-
viction to a fine not exceeding five
dollars, or in default of payment of
such fine to imprisonment in the com-
mon goal of the County of Carleton
for a period not exceeding five days.

5. (1) If any dog—

(a) With provocation or other
cause bites or attacks a person; or

(b) Persistently disturbs the quiet
of the neighborhood by barking,
howling or in any other manner; or
