MEMORY OF OVERSEAS NURSE IS HONORED

A marker was placed in the cemetery of the Parish Church at Lower Woodstock on Saturday evening in memory of Miss Eva McBride, who died in Boston several weeks ago and was brought to Woodstock, her birthplace, for interment. The ceremony was conducted by Miss Mary A. Cutler, of Boston, former president of the New England Unit of the Women's Overseas Service League, with the assistance of a delegation from the Woodstock Branch of the Canadian Legion and Ladies' Auxiliary, headed by Capt. Harold Leeming, M. C., secretary of the Legion.

Miss McBride, who graduated from the Somerville hospital in 1901, joined the British forces on the outbreak of the World War, and was attached to the 22nd General Hospital. On the entry of the United States into the war in 1917 she was transferred to the Harvard Hospital Unit.
