## MARKETING BOARD MEETS AT CAPITAL

WATER COMPETITIVE FREIGHT ON POTATOES DESIRED—SEVERAL SESSIONS LIKELY

Fredericton, April 26—Realizing the importance of the potato industry the newly appointed New Brunswick Marketing Board at its first meeting here Thursday requested B. E. Cliff, Centreville, member of the Board, to make a survey of the potato situation in New Brunswick and report to the board as soon as possible. Requests for immediate action prompted the decision on the part of the Board according to chairman J. K. King, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick. Feeling it advisable to look into the matter carefully the Board if necessary will hold hearings in various parts of the Province.

To deal with most urgent matters first is the intention of the Board, and to take up submissions from other interests at an early date is possible. Anticipation is that the Board will have to meet shortly at the call of the chairman for other considerations. Yesterday the Board sat all day rising in the afternoon.

Among other important matters submitted to the Board was that the Board endeavor to have restored and made permanent a water competitive freight-rate on potatoes such as was effective last fall, and which permitted rail-hauled shipments from Maritime points to Montreal and Toronto to compete with shipments by water. Since this submission, the chairman pointed out yesterday afternoon the railways have advised that the rate would go into effect on April 25 and would expire on June 30 for this spring. The Board is looking into the matter with the view of having the rate made permanent.

Matters for consideration on the part of the Board will be submitted by way of a memorandum following the interested parties being called in if necessary, according to a rule drawn up by the Board.

No delegations were heard at yesterday's session which was more or less an organization conference. A number of requests for the Board's consideration were submitted among which were a number from the Associated Shippers of New Brunswick. Bonding of all dealers in the fruit and vegetable trade in Canada was included in the submissions of the Association and the Board pointed out that this was already enacted upon by the Federal government in an act respecting fruit and honey passed last March. The board felt that this covered the Associated Shippers' requests.

## BEST GRASSES FOR HOME LAWNS

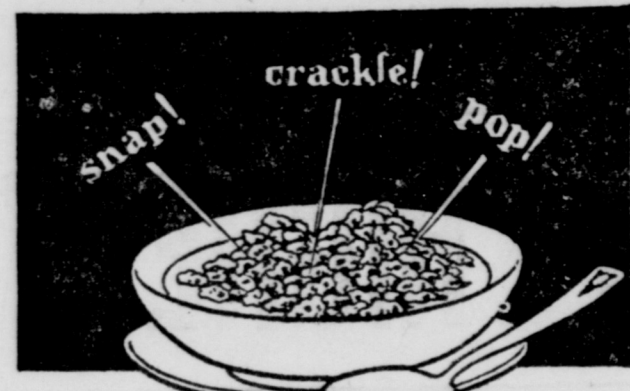
The Experimental Farm at Fredericton, N. B., of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, is famous among other things as an authority on the growing of pasture and other grasses, and on that account Mr. L. C. Young of that Farm was asked to deliver an address at the University of Maine, Orono, on grasses for the home lawn. After having described the characteristics of an ideal lawn and having dealt in detail with the various grasses suitable for lawns, Mr. Young recommended for the average lawn a mixture of 4 parts Kentucky Blue grass and one part Red Top at the rate of 3 to 4 pounds per 1,000 square feet of lawn. If it was desired to include white clover, one-eighth part should be added to the above mixture. Where this mixture does not give satisfactory results owing to local conditions, Rhode Island bent grass should be used at the rate of 2 to 3 pounds per 1,000 square feet. For shady areas, one-third the quantity of Rough-stalked Meadow grass should be added. As Mr. Young points out, failure to grow in shady places is due more often to conditions of low fertility and lack of moisture than to the shade itself. It has been the experience at Fredericton that, if these conditions are remedied, the standard mixture of Kentucky Blue grass and Red Top will prove quite satisfactory in most situations.

Lawn grasses may be grouped broadly under two general headings—A, the bent grasses, and B, the blue grasses and others. The more familiar bent grasses are Red Top, Rhode Island Bent, Velvet Bent, and Creeping Bent. Red Top produces a fine quality of turf generally speaking, though not as fine as some of the other bents. It is aggressive but lacks durability and permanency, and for those and other reasons Red Top is commonly sown in a mixture of Kentucky Blue grass. Rhode Island Bent is smaller and much finer in texture than Red Top, but does not form as compact a sod as Creeping Bent. Rhode Island Bent makes a very fine turf and is recommended on general lawns where Kentucky Blue grass will not thrive. Velvet Bent is undoubtedly the finest of all bent grasses grown from seed for lawns and greens but requires special care and is recommended only under special conditions. It is practically impossible at Fredericton to secure a pure strain of Velvet Bent. With regard to Creeping Bent, the many different strains vary greatly in the type of turf they produce, but if a really good strain, such as Metropolitan or Washington is secured, and proper care taken of the green, the result will be the finest turf in the world. However, from their nature of growth, the bent grasses are very aggressive, and for some reason must be closely cut or a tangled mass of runners will be the result. They require abundant moisture and special care in the way of top-dressing and fertilizing. They are also costly in establishment, and for these reasons bent grasses are not recommended for general lawn purposes.

Kentucky Blue grass is the most generally recommended of all lawn grasses. It thrives under a great range of soil and climatic conditions, and is resistant to drought but naturally reaches its best development in a rich moist soil. It produces a firm, even sod of fairly fine texture, and though, of course, not as fine as the bents, is durable, permanent and aggressive. It has the disadvantage of being slow in germination and for that reason Red Top should be added to the mixture. Kentucky Blue grass is reported in various quarters as not thriving in acid soils but such has not been the experience at Fredericton. Fertility and not acidity is the limiting factor. Canada Blue grass will grow on poorer soils than Kentucky Blue but does not produce a desirable turf and should not be used for lawn purposes. Chevrin's or European Red Fescue and Rough-stalked grass may be recommended for shady situations. White Dutch Clover may be included in the mixture if desired. It will not grow on an acid soil, but under satisfactory conditions it will prove permanent and has an added advantage in that it is always green—even immediately after cutting and during

dry weather.

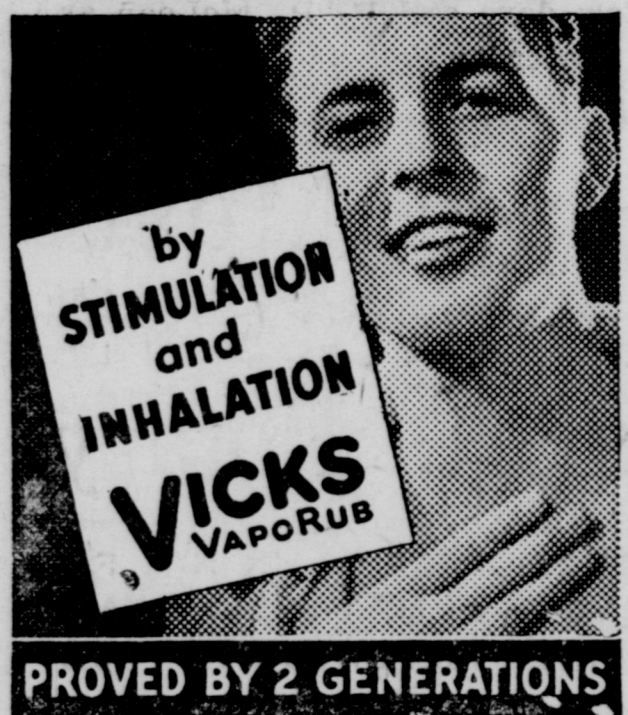

## THE NEW AMERICAN DOLLAR

So far as can be told, the relation of British prices to French and American prices is such that the pound sterling ought to be quoted against the dollar at a little below the old parity of \$4.86, while it ought to stand at a little over Frs. 90 against the franc. These equilibrium rates of to-day, however, are of comparatively little importance, for prices in all three countries are likely to vary considerably during our period of patience. All we can do at the moment is to envisage our ultimate goal in very general terms. We must avoid any temptations to engage in competitive currency depreciation, or to use our Exchange Equalisation Fund in competition with the new American Stabilisation Fund. We must make it clear that our own fund is used solely to smooth out temporary and speculative fluctuations, and not to give sterling an artificial value. We should welcome a further rise in American prices, for it will reduce and not aggravate existing disparities. Finally we must envisage such an ultimate devaluation of sterling against gold as will assist in establishing a world price-level of a kind which will least disturb an already difficult situation. Our objective is the restoration of equilibrium between the internal and external values and purchasing powers of the pound, dollar and franc, in such a way as will cause a minimum of disturbance to France, the United States and ourselves. This requires patience, rather than precipitate action.—Lloyds Bank Monthly Review.

## NEEDLES AND PINS

"The known is not always pleasing, but is less terrifying than the unknown". A needle broken off in the body causes fear that is almost terror in some cases because of the remarkable stories concerning the supposed wanderings of broken needles in the body.

The needle will move a little because it is usually partially or wholly embedded in muscle, and when the muscle contracts, the needle will move. There are only a very few authentic cases in which the broken needle has wandered for any considerable distance in the body. Most of the stories that are told about broken needles belong to the fairy tale book.

This type of accident results, usually, from the carelessness of the injured person, but sometimes it is another person who is careless. Needles should not be left lying around; there should be a definite place for them, and they should all be in that place excepting the needle that is in use. The needle which is out of its case should be kept threaded, as this makes it less likely to be lost.

It is surprising what parts of the body may receive the jab from a lost or misplaced needle, and the needle sometimes breaks off. The person who walks barefooted or in his stocking feet around the house displays a confidence in the needle-using members of the family, which will be dispelled when his foot comes down on what was a lost needle, but which he has found.

The needle which is stuck in the arm of a chair or in the wall-paper, or which is left in the mending, does not always stay where it is put until it is wanted again. Hunting for the lost needle seems to be a favorite pastime with some women and an occasional diversion for most. This could be avoided if needles were always placed where they belong.

A needle will sometimes be left in a garment which is undergoing repairs, and in that event it may be broken off in the body of the person who puts on the garment. No matter how it happens, there is no cause for alarm, because there is little or no danger associated with the accident.

There are a few things not to do, and these include all sorts of squeezing and such procedures with the vain hope of getting the piece of needle out. This only makes matters worse. It is well to keep the finger or whatever part is injured at rest; the less movement the better because all movement means muscular action which will, more than likely, drive the broken needle or pin deeper into the tissues, making it more difficult to reach later.

There are several ingenious ways of removing such fragments from the body, but none of them is as satisfactory as keeping the fragments out in the first place through reasonable care.

## PURITY OF IMPORTED SEEDS

Over 1200 tests of imported seeds of mangels, swedes, garden peas, garden corn and tomatoes were made last year by the Dominion Seed Branch. The seed was representative of freight and express shipments of field root and garden vegetable seeds imported into Canada during 1933. The tests which were conducted in co-operation with the Forage Crops and Horticultural Divisions of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, were made for the purpose of determining to what degree the seed was true to type, variety and name represented.

There were 292 tests of mangels, representing globe, tankard, oval, long, half long and intermediate types. Among these there was an average trueness to type of 70 per cent. Only

one lot was considered as 100 per cent true to type, and one lot was only 2 per cent true. Twenty-one lots were under 50 per cent true to type, averaging 37 per cent true. One hundred and eighty-one lots were more than 50 per cent true to type, averaging 73.8 per cent true. One lot, not included in this summary, and which was represented as half sugar mangel, proved to be a mixture of garden beet varieties. Colors for the most part were represented, excepting for an

odd lot which showed a mixing of red and yellow, and a relatively few lots in which a small percentage of the roots were red or orange instead of yellow, or rose and yellow instead of white.

Samples of swede seed were tested to the number of 195. These showed an average trueness to type of 86 per cent and an average trueness to color of 95.9 per cent. The range in off types was from 0 to 35 per cent, and in off color from 0 to 27.5 per cent. Only one lot was considered as 100 per cent true to both type and color.

Trials with vegetable seeds included 366 with garden peas, 211 with garden corn and 230 with tomatoes. Of the peas, approximately 81 per cent were acceptable from the standpoint of purity to type and variety and trueness to name; of the corn, 82 per cent, and of the tomatoes, 78 per cent.

The tests with peas were conducted at the trial grounds of the Dominion Seed Branch, Sackville, N. B. Tests with beets were also tried at Sackville in 1933 but were unsuccessful

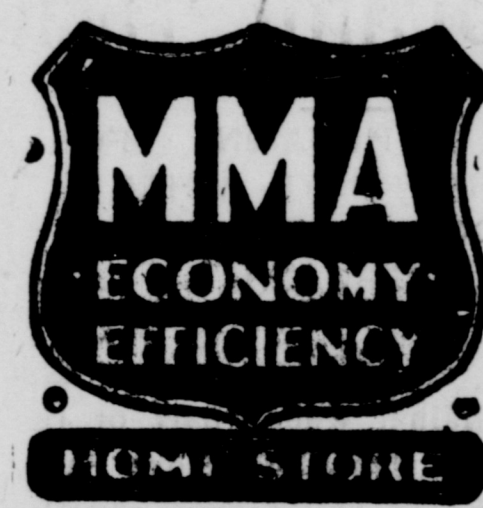

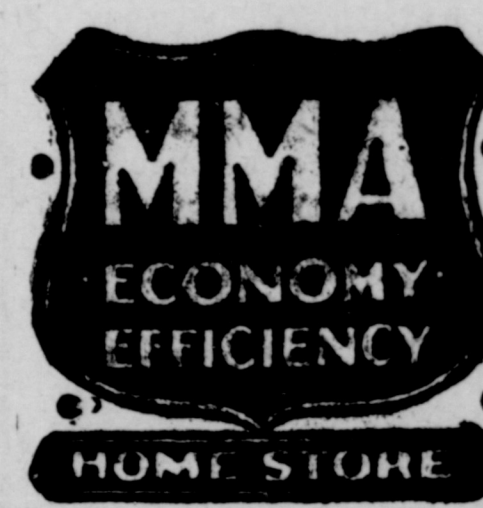

owing to the exceptionally dry summer. All the other 1933 tests were performed at the Central Experimental Farm.

Copies of the complete results of these trueness to variety tests have been sent to the outside shippers and to the importers concerned. Reports of these tests for the past five years are being summarized and will be made available to the public in the near future.

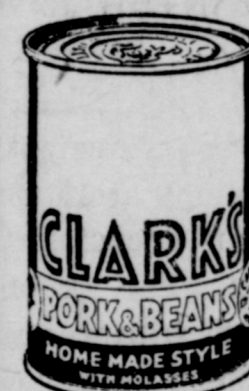
