WORKMEN GET COLD PLUNGE IN RIVER

BOAT UPSETS IN CROSSING SUBMERGED ROAD TO ISLAND PARK

Rufus Holt and Manzer Atherton, two workmen employed on the repair job at the Woodstock Exhibition building, had a narrow escape on Saturday morning. They were using a light flat-bottomed boat to cross from the approach to the Island Park to the exhibition grounds, the roadway being several feet under water with a strong cross-current sweeping the road. Their little craft was caught broadside on by the current and capsized. While the water was not beyond their depth they had considerable difficulty in getting a footing owing to the swiftness of the water and for a few minutes it was feared they would be swept out into the stream. Holt came up under the upturned boat but was soon able to get his feet on the bottom and to scramble to safety. His companion was washed into a grove of partially submerged trees and was taken from there to safety after some difficulty. Both men were none the worse for their icy plunge later in the day.
