Her husband was just ahead of her and it is thought she was hurrying to overtake him. A flagman was on duty at the time.

Her husband was unable to warn her. She was killed instantly. Mrs. Brown was well and popularly known in Mars Hill where she had made her home for many years. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Stephen S. Brown of Portland and Mrs. Thomas York of Mars Hill. Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at the home.
