The food is good and plentiful. For breakfast the prisoners have porridge, bread and tea; at noon a boiled dinner or meat and potatoes, with fish on Fridays. For supper they have baked potatoes, bread, butter and tea.

Visitors are admitted at any time if on business, and Tuesdays and Fridays are the regular visiting days. Religious services are held when possible, and the sheriff states that he would be glad to have regular services conducted by the clergy and Salvation Army officers. The Salvation Army, the sheriff says, have been very obliging in the matter of holding services for the prisoners.

Vermilion, the sheriff states, can be eliminated if proper precautions are taken. When protectionists or others arrive who are suspected of having company with them they are lodged in a separate cell kept for the purpose, and when they leave their bedding is boiled and cleaned. Citizens, familiar with Sheriff Foster's home in Hartland will have no difficulty in believing that the jail premises are kept clean and neat.

PINE STREET HOUSE DAMAGED BY FIRE

CIRCUMSTANCES VERY SIMILAR TO THOSE IN PREVIOUS OUTBREAKS

Serious damage was done by fire Thursday afternoon to a house on Pine street owned by Mrs. I. C. Churchill and occupied by K. E. MacLauchlan. It was the third fire within a fortnight and the second in two days where the circumstances were very similar. In all cases the fires broke out between 4 and 5 p. m. while the families were absent, and in each case the blaze originated in a clothes closet off a bedroom. In Thursday's outbreak the key to the front door of the house, which had been left under a mat on the veranda, was found in the door when the fire was discovered.

The blaze had eaten its way through the second floor ceiling into the attic when discovered. When the firemen arrived the adjoining bedroom was in flames as was the attic above. Only quick work on their part prevented the destruction of the house. The blaze was brought under control after an hour's hard work. The fire damage was pretty well confined to the upper floors but the remainder of the house was badly water soaked.

Neighbors removed most of the furniture without much damage.

PAVING APPROVED

TOWN'S SHARE OF PRICE ORDERED PAID

Formal approval of the construction of three miles of Woodstock streets, recently concluded, has been given by the Chief Highway engineer, A. Gordon Bailey, town manager, told the town council at a meeting on Friday evening. Payment of the town's share of the price of construction was directed as soon as a signed contract should be received from the contractors, the Raynor Construction Co., and when payment by the company for the use of a steam roller belonging to the town should be made.

Authority was given for the issue of \$2000 in ordinary bonds to bear date Dec. 1, and to mature Dec. 1, 1942.

Governor General Expert Guide

OLD AGE PENSIONS

Hon. A. A. Dysart, Premier of New Brunswick, speaking over a provincial hook-up Sunday night on the eve of Remembrance Day, spoke on general questions affecting the Province of New Brunswick.

Premier Dysart made appropriate reference to Remembrance Day and also stated that custom had decreed that public issues affecting the welfare of the Province be discussed in the Legislature. His government was a body of human beings and as such they were bound to make mistakes, but in language of baseball in spite of errors they were determined to give the people a good batting average. The government took office July 16th after being elected June 27th by an overwhelming majority. He wished to thank the people for the confidence expressed.

Speaking of the pre-election pledges made, the Premier said that the people should hear what was being done to honor those obligations. The government was moving fast as circumstances would permit. Old Age Pensions had been a weighty issue. The Old Age Pension Act was proclaimed September 20th and W. P. Jones, K. C., Woodstock was named

to administer the Act. Mr. Jones after securing information in other provinces was setting up organization in New Brunswick. Time and organization would be required for each claim would have to be investigated and authenticated. The government had been sincerely impressed with the social justice of the proposition. The government would not enter such a proposition before first exploring the financial aspect of the situation. A depleted treasury and staggering debts, to which he would refer again had been found by the new government upon assuming office. The Federal Government will provide seventy five per cent of the pensions and the Province twenty-five per cent. This means that the Province will provide administration charges with \$300,000 in addition and the Dominion \$1,200,000.

It was reasonable to assume that at the Federal-Provincial conference at Ottawa on the 27th this subject would be discussed. The New Brunswick government would press vigorously that all the burden should be lifted from the Province and the latter required to assume nothing but administration costs which in Nova Scotia, where pensions now are paid, amount to \$50,000 per year.

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
