UNITED BAPTISTS GATHERED AT

Pokioke, N. B., May 30.—The annual meeting of the United Baptist Churches of the third district, New Brunswick, was held at Pokioke, N. B., on Wednesday, May 28, and 29, in the United Baptist Church, Pokioke, N. B.

Tuesday evening session was opened by the Chairman of the District, Rev. W. Steadman Smith, after which the Young People's organization of the district took charge under the leadership of Lillian Harold Pond. Mr. Pond addressed the meeting on the "Renewal of Youth," and said that young people cannot say as older ones: "If I had my life to live over again I would live differently. They can only so plan and so live that they will not need to say any such thing. This can be accomplished by looking to Christ for assistance. Other young people took part; duet by Phyllis Tait and Olga Watts; solo by Robert VanDine; messages by Bert Leitchford, Sadie Miller; Mary Estabrooks, Anita Tait. This young people's service was well attended and was a credit to the spiritual vitality or the present day youth.

Wednesday, Mr. Smith took charge of all three sessions. Rev. J. A. Corey commenced each session with a devotional message on the "Renewal of Worship." He divided his theme into three sub-headings, Renewal of the Need of Worship, Renewal of the Purpose of Worship, and Renewal of Experience of Worship. Mr. Corey stated there was renewal of need of worship because so few engaged in real worship and the purpose of worship was to make God real in one's life and to vitalize a man's soul, thus making him of inestimable worth to the home and community.

Rev. Gerard Guion in his address on Renewal of Associational Life took as his topic Evangelism, the object of

which was a standard of life lived in active fellowship with Jesus Christ; the means, the Bible; the method, preaching, witnessing and personal work; the technique, through the agency of religious education. Mr. Guion also gave the closing address on Renewal of Christian Fellowship.

## RETURNING PROSPERITY

(The United Churchmen)

Two marked indications of returning prosperity are seen in the United States. One is the announcement that the Ford Motor Company will immediately return to the \$6 a day minimum rate. This means an addition to the payrolls of \$2,000,000. The average wage will be considerably above the minimum. The company expects to produce 1,000,000 cars this year. The other indication of prosperity is the "building upsurge." In 1934 residential construction fell to the ridiculously low figure of \$100,000,000. Each month of 1935 has seen the record of last year's similar month doubled. The probable 1935 total appears as not under \$250,000,000; 1936 may prove a "billion dollar year." Washington is assisting and working for home construction for a definite reason. Every dollar put into home building, besides adding to happiness, spreads far through many allied industries. Business analysts are predicting that an era of industrial spending unequalled since the depression set in six years ago will put billions of dollars into circulation in the next year.

Two comparatively uncommon species, of cockroaches in Canada namely the English black beetle and the American cockroach, were reported for the first time in Quebec and Ontario, respectively, during 1934.

POTATO SITUATION IN  
EASTERN CANADA

A Department of Agriculture bulletin, from Ottawa, says: Owing to the large potato crop in 1934 in the United States, and the resulting low prices obtaining there, the tariff of 75 cents per hundredweight against Canadian potatoes has shut off this market to a very large extent. The Cuban market for seed has been well maintained, but for Canadian table stock it has dwindled, leaving only the comparatively small market available in the West Indies, and the strongly competitive markets of Quebec and Ontario. These, says "The Potato Situation in Eastern Canada" bulletin, just issued as a supplement to the "Agricultural Situation and Outlook" jointly by the Dominion Departments of Agriculture and of Trade and Commerce, markets have proved to be incapable of absorbing the quantity available which was expected to be largely exported.

The statement has been made that if the Maritimes would reduce their acreage, it would automatically reduce the Canadian surplus in future, but this is not necessarily the case, for a small percentage increase on the part of potato growers in Quebec and Ontario might easily result in just as large a crop and just as low prices as at present. It must be borne in mind that the Maritime growers are large purchasers of supplies, such as bags, machinery, fertilizers, and spray materials from the areas in Central Canada to which they ship their products, and also their high quality products are in definite demand by consumers. Under these circumstances it is impossible to deal with the Maritime Provinces alone or to suggest that they accept full responsibility for any necessary re-adjustment in the industry. Under normal conditions, and with reasonable adjustment of production to demand, seasonal changes in acreage have had significant effects on prices. Even under present conditions, favorable or unfavorable weather may be an important factor in determining prices that will prevail for the next crop.

But with the 1934 acreage and average yields coupled with restricted outlets in export channels, the prospects for profitable prices do not appear to be very bright. It would appear, therefore, that the indicated re-

duction in acreage is justified, particularly in view of the probability of more satisfactory moisture conditions and the possibility of better than average seed being planted on a large percentage of the potato acreage of 1935.

## FARM BRIEFS

Three different reports of carpenter bees boring holes in veranda timbers in Southwestern Ontario during 1934 were received by the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

For the first two months of 1935, the export of Canadian tobacco to Great Britain amounted to 3,351,939 pounds, as against 4,939,549 pounds from all the other Empire countries.

Canadian wooden hogsheds are now being used most successfully by some Rhodesian tobacco packers to ship tobacco to the British Isles. Ordinarily, Southern Rhodesian tobacco is packed in burlap bales and although handier to handle are being replaced by the Canadian containers.

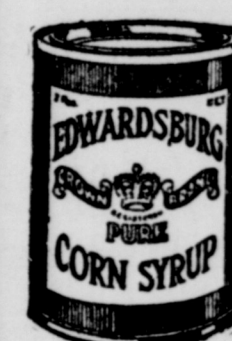

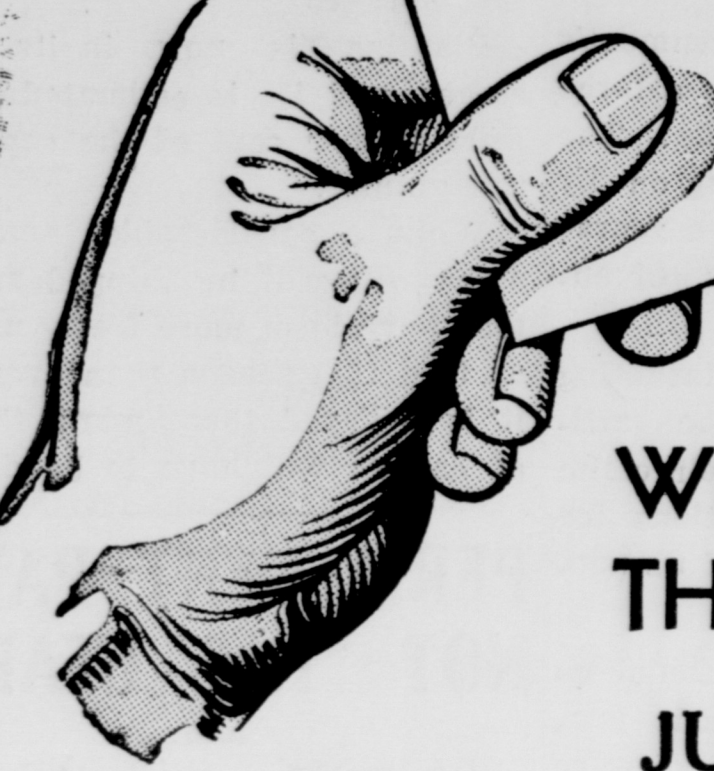

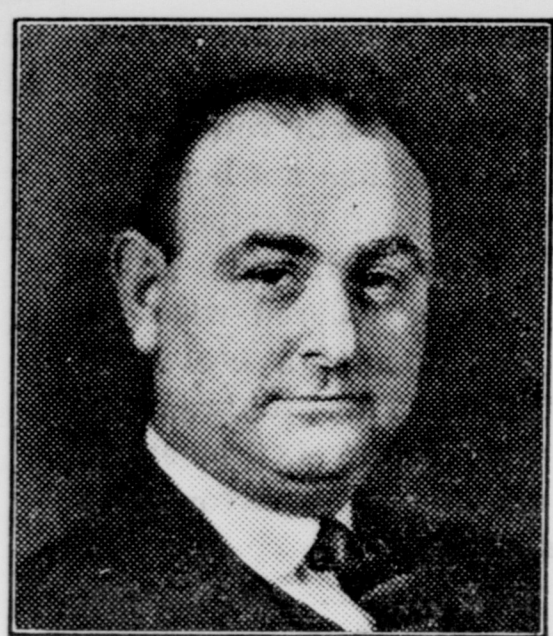
