C. R. HAWKINS

Fredericton, June 4—Death came suddenly this morning at six o'clock to Charles Robert Hawkins after a few hours' illness at the age of 42 years.

Mr. Hawkins was in his usual good health on Saturday and was at Tracy Station, where he was one of the speakers at the Liberal rally. Yesterday he was taken suddenly ill and last evening early was taken to Victoria Public Hospital where his death occurred this morning coming as a distinct shock to his relatives and many friends throughout the province and elsewhere. He was born at Lunenburg, N. S., a son of the late G. N. C. Hawkins, for some time manager of the Bank of Montreal in this city and of Mrs. Rachel Hawkins. He enlisted for overseas service with the 28th Field Battery, Canadian Artillery, was selected for commission in France. He was a graduate of Dalhousie University with the degree of B. A., later receiving the LL. B. degree. In 1920 he took up law-practice in Fredericton being associated with the late Charles T. Harrison, who died some few years later. He was one of the prominent barristers, a past president of Fredericton Branch of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, a past president of the Provincial Council of the Canadian Legion and at the time of his death was a member of the executive of the Provincial Command; he was a past president of the Fredericton Gyo Club, a past secretary of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew, a member of the Fredericton Golf Club and of the Fredericton Curling Club. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the Federal House having been defeated by Hon. R. B. Hanson some years ago. He was a young man with a large circle of friends, a kind husband and father and one who will be missed in the various organizations to which he belonged and in his home and the city. He is survived by his widow, two daughters, Vivian and Peggy; his mother, Mrs. Rachel Hawkins, of Fredericton; two sisters, Mrs. E. B. Durham, of Windsor, Ont., and Miss Betty Hawkins, Fredericton, and four brothers, Rev. Raeburn Hawkins, Manchester, England; Horace H. Hawkins, Fredericton; Lionel G. A. Hawkins, Montreal, and Tait M. Hawkins, Saint John.

The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon from his late home 74 Shore street. There will be a private service for the family by

Rev. George Telford and the funeral will leave the house at 3.50 o'clock for Forest Hill Cemetery where interment will be made.
