THE NEW GOVERNMENT

The new government is one which we believe will be approved by both political parties, by all sections of the province and all classes and creeds. The northern section of the province is represented by Messrs. Richard as secretary-treasurer, Dyas as premier and attorney-general and Anderson, as Minister without portfolio and chairman of the Hydro Commission. In addition it is expected that Mr. Bridges, from Restigouche, will be speaker. Westmorland has Mr. Taylor, minister of agriculture, Saint John, Messrs. Roberts and Paterson, the former returning to the department which he founded as minister of health, and the latter as president of the council. The Saint John valley country, wholly without representation in the last cabinet, has Messrs. McNair and Pirie, in the important posts of attorney-general and minister of lands and mines. The Acadians are represented by Mr. Richard, while the English speaking Catholics have most stalwart representation in the person of the premier himself.

The task confronting the new government is not an easy one. Certain clear cut promises were made during the election campaign and the public now expects a strong effort to be made toward putting these into effect, not today, or tomorrow, but within a reasonable time. They further expect that a strong effort will be made to balance the budget. This will not be easy to do, although it should not be difficult to make a big improvement over the showing of the outgoing government.

From conversation which we have been privileged to have with some of the incoming ministers, we believe there will be no tendency to shirk their responsibility, or to shrink from the carrying out of their promises. All good citizens of the province, Liberal and Conservative alike, will wish the new cabinet Goodspeed as they set about their arduous task.

ORGANIZATION PLANNED

Considerable interest is being attracted by the proposal of the Victoria Board of Trade for the organization of potato growers, to look after their own interests. The organization will be carried out, if the plan is approved, at the annual meeting and dinner of the board at Andover on the evening of July 24. The problems

in connection with the potato industry are numerous, and events of the last year show the necessity of some body through which the growers can speak.

Last fall when the potato marketing scheme was discussed there were many growers who felt that the proposal to peg prices would not work out, a conviction which was later borne out by the facts. They remained silent, however, and the scheme went through to the detriment of the potato industry. It is true that some of the leading men in the industry raised their voices strongly against the plan, but little was heard from the growers and the smaller men in the potato trade.

With a growers organization there should be no trouble in finding the consensus of opinion held by the industry on any given problem, and it may well be that such a body would play a most important part in getting the potato business back on a healthy basis, regulating shipments and securing again our lost markets.

In the meantime potato growers with two or more acres this year or last year are reminded that a vote will be taken in the near future on the marketing scheme. The vote will be by secret ballot, and to secure the right to vote growers must register. To do this they should submit their names to the Eastern Canada Potato Marketing Board, Fredericton, and the names must be in not later than July 27.

FOR UNIFORM ELECTIONS

On of the matters, which will receive the attention of the Dysart government will be the question of voting in provincial elections. It seems desirable that the method of voting should be made uniform in the interests of simplicity and secrecy. In a federal election there is an official ballot on which the names of all the candidates are printed. In the provincial election there is no official ballot, but an official envelope is supplied to the voter by the deputy returning officer. In consequence of the two methods confusion arises and spoiled ballots are altogether too numerous. In a provincial election far too many people mark an X opposite the name of the candidates, for whom they wish to vote, thus spoiling their ballots. The only objection to applying the federal system to the provincial sphere is the size of the ballot, when eight or more candidates are in the field. However, the names might be printed in comparatively small type so that the ballot would not prove cumbersome or unwieldy.

The Dysart ministry is pledged to reform the voting system and before the next general election is held will no doubt pass necessary legislation to render the provincial ballot as nearly secret as it is humanly possible to make.

Then the same voter's list should be used in the federal and provincial elections. At the present time there are two separate lists, differing rather widely. Each list requires considerable time and money to prepare. It would be simpler and better if there was one voters' list, which would likely be much nearer correct than either list is at the present time. The simpler the machinery, the better it works.

LADY BESSBOROUGH FUND

Mrs. E. Raymond Jones has been appointed treasurer of the fund being raised by the ladies of Woodstock as a contribution to the gift which is to be presented by the women of Canada to Lady Bessborough. Mrs. Jones will be at the Jones' Music Co. store every afternoon from 2.30 to 5 for the remainder of July, where she will accept contributions to the fund. The matter was discussed at a tea recently held by Mrs. Jones, at which most of the women's organizations in town were represented.

At a meeting of representative women held recently in Ottawa, over which Lady Perley, wife of Sir George Perley presided, it was announced that Lady Bessborough had consented to accept from the women of Canada a memento of the years which she has spent in this country. It was agreed that such a gift would be most appropriate to one like her Excellency who has so greatly endeared herself to all by her sweetness of disposition and graciousness of manner. It is felt the presentation of such a remembrance will find favor with everyone.
The national committee includes wives of the Lieutenant-Governors of the Province, wives of Federal Cabinet Ministers, wives of Privy Counsellors and Presidents of Women's nationally organized societies. As wife of the Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick I have been

asked by the national committee to arrange for the collection of funds for this object and am therefore requesting the wives of the Mayors of the different towns of this Province kindly to organize committees for the purpose of collecting funds. Will you therefore be good enough to call together heads of the different social organizations and representative women of your neighborhood and appoint an honorary secretary-treasurer and arrange for the collection of subscriptions which may be for 25 cents or more. The fund will close August 1st.

I hope we may be successful in our efforts. I shall be pleased to hear from you when you have started your campaign and will gladly give any required information.
