POTATO PRICES HERE REACH \$2 MARK FOR FIRST TIME IN SIX YEARS

Stock Now Board Of Trade Continues To Press For Action Re Valley Line Is Moving Very Freely

IMMEDIATE PROSPECTS UNCERTAIN AS AMERICAN MARKET WEAKENS

The potato market was humming here yesterday with rising prices bringing out large quantities of stock. A strong market carried the price to the two dollar mark for the first time since the spring of 1930. This appeared to be the price the farmers were waiting for and large quantities of potatoes were coming in to the warehouses yesterday afternoon. This was a marked contrast to previous days, as up to yesterday the offerings had been very light, and most of the orders were being filled from dealers' storage. Demand from Montreal was fairly good, although track storage there was quite heavy with about fifty cars in the yards. Brisk wire inquiry was being received from Ontario, but sales to that province were scattered as dealers there were reluctant to pay the price asked.

In spite of the present good market the immediate outlook is rather uncertain. The sudden strength this week, which brought the price up more than 50 cents a barrel within a few days, was caused largely by Prince Edward Island dropping out of the Canadian picture, and transferring their shipments to the United States by water. Should P. E. I. remain out of the Canadian market, prospects will continue good, but should they return the scope for New Brunswick potatoes will become more restricted.

The American market, which has been very strong, with Aroostook county farmers receiving \$3 a barrel, was much weaker yesterday, and the price dropped fifty cents. Should this continue dealers here are afraid Island tubers will soon be back on the Canadian market.

CATTLE ARE SENT FROM WOODSTOCK TO OLD COUNTRY

91 head of cattle were shipped from the farm of Imperial Products, Ltd., Wednesday morning for Saint John, where they will be loaded on the steamer Al'thria for Glasgow. The cattle are Herefords, Shorthorns and Polled Angus, and were purchased last fall by Alfred Page, manager of the company, and wintered at the company's farm at Jacksonville, where they took on weight nicely. The company has for several years wintered a herd of western cattle each year. The project has proven profitable, both from a beef standpoint, and from the amount of fertilizer produced by the cattle.

POLICE RECOVER PART OF LOOT FROM FARMERS' STORE

SEVERAL HUNDRED DOLLARS' WORTH OF GOODS TAKEN IN WEEK-END BREAK

Following some quick work by the local police, it is believed a solution is near in the break on Sunday night into the premises of the Woodstock United Farmers Co-Operative, Ltd. Chief Schriver went to Fredericton on Tuesday, obtained a search warrant, and with the assistance of members of the Fredericton force searched a dwelling there. A portion of the alleged stolen goods was recovered, packed in a suitcase and hidden under a bed. No arrests, however, had been made up to last night.

Goods valued at several hundred dollars were stolen from the store in addition to which some cash was taken. The loot included four dozen pairs of men's silk socks, several dozen neckties, a quality of men's shirts and several sweaters. It is thought that the cash taken amounted to between \$15 and \$20. Resolution Now Being Circulated

SHORTER ROUTE IS URGED FROM CENTRAL CANADA TO SEA

The Woodstock Board of Trade is this week following up its action urging the extension of the Saint John Valley Railway, or some other move to secure a shorter route for freight and passengers between Central Canada and the sea. A resolution has been prepared and forwarded the Minister of Railways, to Hon. J. E. Michaud, J. E. J. Patterson, M. P., the provincial government, the Victoria, Fredericton and Saint John Boards of Trade, several town and municipal councils, and other interested bodies.

Much stress is being laid on the fact that the original intention was that the Valley line should be extended, and that the principal reason it is unprofitable is that at present it comes to a dead end at Centreville.

The resolution is as follows: WHEREAS over a long period of years the people of this section of New Brunswick have been denied a railroad service definitely promised, and for which the money was appropriated;

AND WHEREAS the Saint John Valley Railway at present has its northern terminus at Centreville, N. B. where it comes to a dead end, and the missing link, if built, would traverse a thickly settled and highly productive territory in the Counties of Carleton and Victoria;

AND WHEREAS the potential available business that originates in New Brunswick and adjacent territory in the State of Maine, all of which is tributary to the proposed unfinished section, would be a very material factor toward placing the said railway on a self-sustaining basis, which of necessity must remain and impossibility so long as it terminates at Centreville;

AND WHEREAS a connection with the Transcontinental line at a point in Victoria County would, through the creation of a short route to Central Canada, open a profitable passenger service;

AND WHEREAS the necessity for the removal of duplication of services is appreciated, such, for instance, (Please Turn to Page Four)

Town Council Decides That King Street Will Be Paved

TWENTY FOOT STRIP OF COLAS WILL BE LAID FROM MAIN STREET TO BRIDGE; TENDERS ARE CALLED FOR \$18,000 BOND ISSUE, TO CLOSE APRIL 24

The paving of King street was decided on at a meeting of the Woodstock town council on Thursday evening. The question was introduced by Coun. Hetherington, who pointed out that the street was one of the main entrances to the town, and that it was muddy in wet weather and dusty in dry. After considerable discussion it was decided, on motion of Coun. Hay, seconded by Coun. Hetherington, that a twenty foot strip of colas paving be laid on the whole length of the street with good gravel on either side.

The issue of \$18,000 in 3 1/2 per cent bonds last year was authorized, the bonds to be dated May 1, 1936, and to mature serially, \$2,000 each year, starting with 1944. It was decided to call for sealed tenders for the issue, the tenders to close on April 24, and to be opened at a special council meeting that evening.

The town manager reported on the conditioning of River street, that a

fill to an average depth of one foot on an eighteen foot width would take about 270 yards of gravel and would cost about \$200. It was decided to go ahead with the work on a scale slightly smaller than suggested. The matter of extending the sidewalk on Queen street was left over until the May meeting. Permission was given the Oddfellows to hold a carnival without obtaining an amusement license from the town. Present at the meeting were Mayor Everett, Councillors Hay, Hayden, Hetherington, Cox and Craig, C. J. Jones, K. C. town clerk, and A. Gordon Bailey, town manager. The exact time at which the paving on King street will be begun is still uncertain, but it will not be until weather conditions are more suitable. It will likely be June before the work starts as the laying of colas requires warm weather, and it is necessary to get the gravel required from the beaches, which are now under water.
