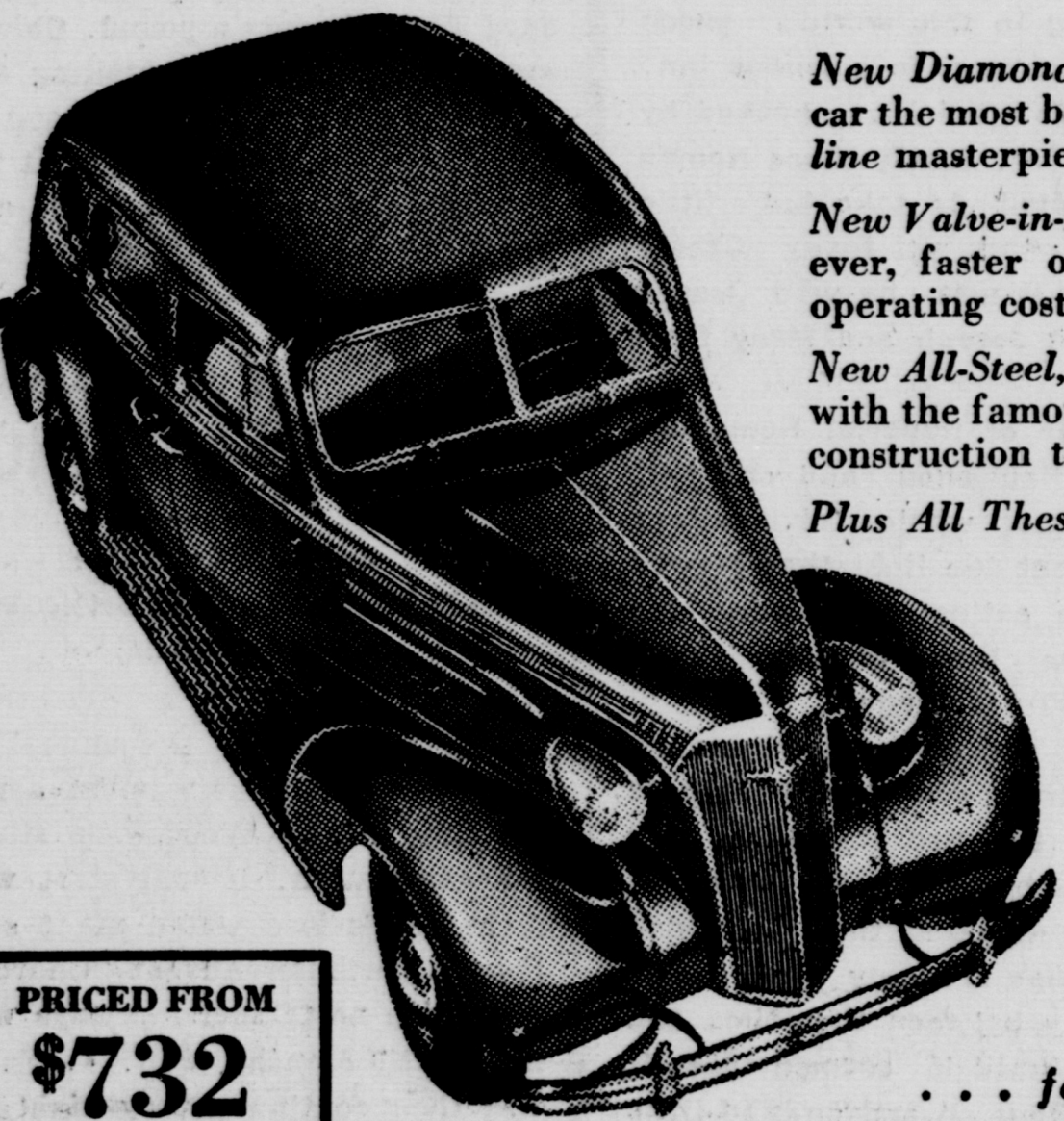

IN THE MAIL

Dear Mr. Editor:

There has been a considerable amount of discussion, in the newspapers and elsewhere, in regard to the effect of the Alberta Government's legislation against the Big Interests in the East. Of course most people realize that you can't hurt the Big Interests without also hurting a lot of little interests as well, for it is generally true that the strongest corporations are the ones with the greatest number of small investors.

Yet what many people may not realize is that the Alberta legislation is not only hurting citizens of small means all over Canada, but that it is hurting countless numbers of citizens of small means right in Alberta.

For instance, an acquaintance of mine out there has been put in a desperate position because of the Alberta government's Reduction and Settlement of Debts Act. My acquaintance is a man with a farm of 240 acres. His 1936 crop was hailed, and there were only 200 bushels of wheat, 230 of oats and 718 of wild oats. It was necessary for him to sell five hogs to pay his threshing account. He has no source of income for the winter except from the sale of a few hogs.

Now, this man holds an Agreement Receivable over 202 acres on which there is a balance due of \$1,500, which in the opinion of his solicitor is an old debt under the Act. The purchasers of the land have intimated their intention to take advantage of the Act. It would appear that the agreement under his Reduction and Settlement of Debts Act would be reduced to at most \$1,215.72 without interest for the next ten years. As you can see, that leaves my acquaintance in an unfortunate circumstance that is caused directly by the unjust and unsound economics of the Alberta Government. Unfortunately, this is probably only one out of many similar instances. I have heard of one or two others in Alberta, where comparatively poor people have been put in an extra bad plight by the recent legislation.

MORE PEOPLE WORKING AND WAGE BILL SOARING

On November 1st, 1,052,985 persons in Canada were working for 10,000 Canadian employers and that number was larger than in any month since November, 1930. The index of employment, based on 1926 as a normal year of 100 points, now stands at 111, which is 35 points above the depression low.

In surveying these figures, a statement from The Canadian Chamber of

Commerce points out that more employment has been created through efforts of Canadian industry, which, in reality, private business in the hands of private individuals, and freed from governmental interference. Private enterprise is taking up the slack caused by the depression. New jobs are being created by increased business which is being done by manufacturers, retailers and the other direct.
