CAUSED SOME EXCITEMENT

Methods employed by the town to collect tax arrears from several C. P. R. employees created some excitement. The town employed a new method, in taking garnishee proceedings in the State of Maine against the men in question. This was objected to by some of them, and their legal representative delivered a vigorous verbal attack on the town's action at the last council meeting.

So far as we can learn no action has resulted, and legal proceedings, hinted at the meeting, had not been instituted up to last night.

We are not familiar with the ins and outs of the matter, but would consider the town must have taken precautions to see that they were within their rights before proceeding. Certainly the method employed seems to have been most unusual, but sometimes there are problems which call for unusual solutions.

Apart from any technicalities in connection with the case under discussion, there is no question that taxes have got to be paid better in the next few years than in the last few years if the rate is to be kept down, necessary services maintained, and the financial position of the town kept sound. Tax arrears have been a serious problem in the last few years.

Some of these tax arrears will never be collected. The stoniest hearted tax collector cannot get blood out of a turnip. Others can be collected, and where they can be collected they must be. We are convinced that the bulk of the citizens are solidly behind the authorities in their attempt to get the taxes in, an attempt which up to date has been only fairly successful.

Very many of the citizens whose taxes are paid in full have kept them paid only through hard effort, and through going without things they really needed.

As far as the "discrimination" charged by Mr. Atkinson goes, we do not think this is worthy of very serious consideration. Several methods are authorized by law for collecting delinquent taxes. If one method could be used in all cases to the best effect then, doubtless, only one method would be authorized. The men in question happen to have come under a method which, according to the claims of the town, is applicable to them and not to others.

The discrimination seems to have been, in our opinion, in the past at least, of forcing some citizens to pay taxes in full and letting others just as well able to pay get behind.

Times are now improving, and this is a year when the town fathers in giving their annual account of their stewardship should be able to report a distinct change for the better. It is up to all good citizens to co-operate with them. It is our town just as much as it is the council's.

KING CASE IS

King was committed for trial about four months ago after a lengthy hearing in the Woodstock police court. A special sitting of the Circuit Court was discussed to dispose of the case, but it was decided it would be tried at the regular fall term.

Manzer Mean, charged with a statutory offence, and sent up for trial in the Hartland police court, will also come before the Grand Jury. A juvenile now in jail here on charge of car theft and who elected trial jury will be given a preliminary hearing this week, so that if his case is sent up for trial it can be disposed of at the coming court.

There will be at least three civil matters. One of these, Russell Wallace vs. Dr. G. T. O'Donnell arose out of a car accident on Broadway several months ago when the plaintiff's wagon and the defendant's car were in collision, the plaintiff's wife being seriously injured. C. J. Jones, K. C., appears for the plaintiff, and C. F. Inches, K. C., of Saint John, for the defence.

Two other cases will be entered for trial, Pearl Wasson vs. Allen Cheney, administrator for William Cheney. D. R. Bishop represents the plaintiffs in both cases and C. J. Jones, K. C., the defence.

A case with Mrs. L. DeC. Macintosh and Alan Macintosh of Hartland plaintiffs and an insurance company as defendant has been settled out of court, C. J. Jones, K. C., plaintiffs' counsel has announced. Terms of the settlement were not disclosed.

The plaintiffs obtained a verdict for \$20,000 at the October sitting in 1935, and the case was ordered retried by the Appeal Court. The case of Lewis Giberson vs. James Giberson, another re-trial, has also been settled out of court and will not be entered on the docket.

without cause, but the shipper must be compelled to ship what he contracted to ship. In the case cited, he said, no complaint had been made to the board.

Mr. Hatfield said that when a car sent to the United States was wrongfully refused immediate action could be got by the shipper and the buyer forced to take delivery under penalty of cancellation of his license. Mr. Wheeler denied that this was correct.

W. F. Anderson cited a case where a car had been left for several days on track and had then been turned down. The broker wired that he would sell on the shippers account, and would pay the invoice price on what was good. He had then remitted a lower price. Mr. Wheeler explained that this was purely a matter between party and party.

C. W. Clark said that the buyer's standpoint must be considered. Some times cars were bought for resale at a distant point and the buyer held them up for fear blight would develop after he reshipped.

Walter Shore said that in the case quoted by Mr. Demmings inspection fourteen days late was no protection so far as his department was concerned. Mr. Demmings should not have released his draft, he said.

Mr. Shore continued that he had seen potatoes turned down as under

grade and rejected as culls, and sold for ten cents a bag for hog feed. One of these sales he had traced personally and found about to be offered for sale as table stock. He further had personal knowledge that New Brunswick tags were being put on Quebec potatoes and that these were then sold as New Brunswick stock. In this statement he was confirmed by the chairman.

Mr. Wheeler said his branch could not check every sale of culls. There was a heavy penalty for offering these as table stock, also for selling one class of potatoes as being of another class.

Mr. Gallagher then asked if a buyer could reject a car without re-inspection. Mr. Wheeler said that this could be done if the buyer could prove it was not up to grade, but for his own protection an inspection would be advisable. He considered that an inspection should be compulsory and would be glad to have a recommendation from the meeting to this effect. Mr. Porter reminded him that such a recommendation had been made last year. Mr. Wheeler expressed approval of this, but said it could not be made to apply to points where inspection was not available.

Mr. Hatfield said it was no use making regulations if they were not to be enforced. Half those in Montreal receiving potatoes had no licenses.

Mr. Wheeler: "That is not a statement of fact. That is far from being a fact."

Mr. Rutland said that so far as New Brunswick was concerned every shipment recorded in Saint John this year had been from a licensed shipper.

Mr. Wheeler went on to say that anyone could buy a car of potatoes and his branch could not know them all.

This was followed by a lengthy discussion of particular cases.

On motion of Mr. Demmings, seconded by Mr. Hatfield, the meeting then went on record as asking the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture to enforce the present regulations, which they believed to be beneficial to the trade; or failing that to eliminate the present licensing system, and that if the enforcement was not undertaken the shippers decline to renew their licenses.

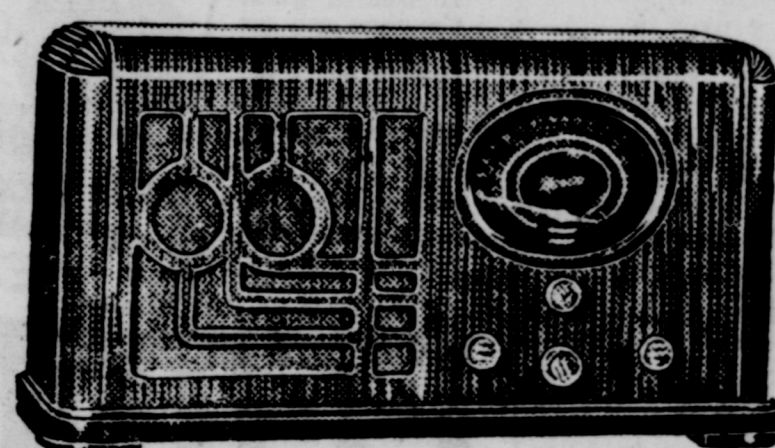

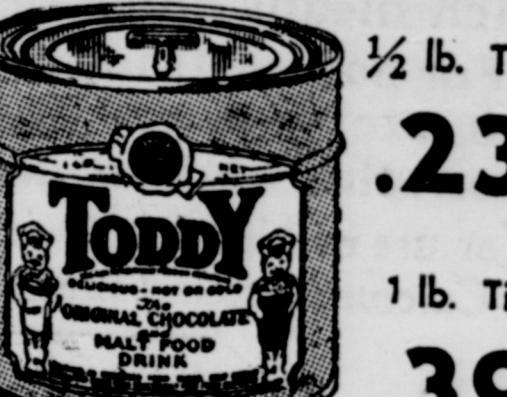
