MAYOR AND 3 COUNCILLORS ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION

Everett, Porter, Glew And Hetherington Get Office Without Election

TWO OF MEMBERS ELECT BELONGED TO LAST YEAR'S COUNCIL, TWO ARE NEWCOMERS; INFORMAL MEETINGS TO LINE UP WORK LIKELY TO BE HELD AT ONCE

K. L. Everett, automobile and produce dealer, Aubrey Hetherington, C. N. R. station agent, W. E. Porter, insurance agent, and George Glew, retired accountant, were elected by acclamation to the Woodstock Town Council today. Mr. Everett was re-elected mayor, and Mr. Hetherington, who was chairman of the finance committee last year, was re-elected as councillor. The other two are newcomers to the council.

With Councillors Ray O. Hall, Ralph Hayden and L. E. Cox, whose terms of office have still a year to run, they will constitute the new town council. Hetherington was the first to be sworn in, taking the oath of office immediately after receiving his acclamation. The others are expected to be sworn in in the next few days. The new council will probably not meet formally until February 1, but several informal meetings to line up work and discuss budget problems are expected to be held at once.

Considerable interest was taken in today's nomination proceedings as the personnel of the incoming council caused much speculation. Mayor Everett and Coun. Hetherington announced several days ago that they would run again, but no other citizens had intimated that they would be candidates. C. J. Jones, K. 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New Industry Gives Work To 15 Men

Woodstock got a new industry employing about fifteen men this week. The mill at the mouth of the Meduxnekeag river, formerly operated by R. H. Smalley and later by C. W. Bowlin, and idle last year, has been taken over by Edward McDade, who has already started operations with a full crew. The mill is manufacturing laths, for which a good demand exists at present. It is probable that operations will be continued throughout the winter months. Orders are already being received and it is expected that shipments will start within a few days.

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73 ALARMS ARE ANSWERED BY DEPARTMENT

GREAT MAJORITY OF ALARMS ARE FOR CHIMNEY OUTBREAKS

Woodstock's Insurance loss for 1936 was more than 35 per cent less than for 1935, according to the figures submitted to the town council by W. B. Manser, secretary of the fire department. The 1936 loss was \$20,453, \$7,722 less than the previous year.

In all 73 alarms were answered, one less than in 1935. Forty-two of these were for chimney fires. Of the actual fires fifteen were extinguished with chemicals or the small booster hose, demonstrating the value of the motorized apparatus, enabling arrival to be made at fires much quicker than the old horse drawn equipment. Most of the insurance loss was caused at seven fires, at which a total of 7,450 feet of hose were laid.

Only two big fires occurred during the year. The first of these was in May when a large part of the Woodstock Woodworking Company plant at the corner of Green and Elm streets was destroyed, and the other in December when the McPhail home, second largest residential property in Woodstock, was burned.

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Police Assistance Necessary Before a Large Enough Audience To Start Meeting Is Obtained

GOOD REPORTS ARE SUBMITTED BUT FEW ARE THERE TO HEAR THEM; MAYOR EVERETT RECOMMENDS MORE STREET PAVING BE DONE IN 1937

The annual town meeting was held on Monday evening with only a handful of citizens present to hear reports of a somewhat better year financially than the previous one. At eight o'clock the mayor and council were in their places flanked by town officials and several newspapermen, but only four citizens were in the audience. By 8.15 the number had been augmented to six. The ringing of the fire alarm or the despatching of the police in a general round up of an audience was then suggested.

While ways and means of securing an attendance were discussed the hands of the clock slipped around to 8.30, when it was discovered that two of the half dozen attendants had made their escape. The situation was slightly relieved when Chief of Police Barry Schriver went to the street and succeeded in coaxing a few citizens into the council chamber.

High lights of the evening included a report from H. G. Hoben, of Fredericton, official auditor, that the town's surplus for the year was about \$6,000, and a recommendation from the mayor for more street paving during the coming year. Mayor Everett pointed out that King street had been paved this year, and that another innovation had been made in the turning on of the street lights in the early hours of the morning. 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COUNTY COUNCIL TO MEET NEXT WEEK

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE IS AWAITED WITH INTEREST

The January session of the Carleton County Council will open here on Tuesday of next week, with Warden Vernet Tracey presiding. While several matters of importance are expected to come up for discussion, interest chiefly centres in the financial report.

A considerable change was made in the tax collection system during this year. Previously, rapidly mounting lists of tax arrears had led the council to employ special collectors. Last January there was a protracted debate on the desirability of retaining the special collectors, some of the councillors maintaining that better results could be obtained through the parish officials. After much discussion it was decided that the special collectors would be retained.

The council, however, decided that the special collectors would have to get along without some of the expenses previously allowed them. This the collectors refused to do and resigned. The county then returned to the system of parish collections.

Early last fall a banquet was held attended by most of the parish collectors and confidence was expressed that good results could be obtained and that a material reduction in the county overdraft could be effected. The announcement as to just what has been done is awaited with much interest.
