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to the Island Park, both for the benefit of the citizens and as a means of protecting the town's heavy investment there.

The early part of the meeting was taken up with the reading of the auditor's report by the town manager, A. Gordon Bailey. Short address was then followed from Mayor Everett, Councillors Hetherington, Craig, Hayden, Hall and Cox. Coun. Hay was not present, being out of town on business. Ex-mayor E. R. Jones also spoke briefly.

The financial report showed tax collections for the year as \$56,279, or 74 per cent of the warrant, compared with \$55,645, or 75.2 of the warrant the previous year. Collections from water and sewer rates were \$16,911 an increase of \$1,367 over the previous year. The report went on that during the year \$18,000 in bonds had been refunded at 3 1/2 per cent, and that during the coming year it was proposed to refund \$50,000 more which would mean a saving in interest charges of \$1,000 per annum. Bank overdraft was reduced \$7,239 to \$10,942.

After providing a \$5,000 reserve for uncollectable taxes and a \$1,000 reserve for uncollectable water rates a surplus for the year \$6,166 was shown. The funded debt was shown as \$178,000, \$6,000 less than at the beginning of the year.

In the various departments the report showed that \$4,133 was spent for administration or about \$230 less than the estimate; grants, \$7,687 or \$47 less than the estimate; finance, \$11,442 or \$127 less than the estimate; education, \$20,980 or about

JACKSONVILLE MAN IS

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les Gray, wellknown Carleton County residents, left by truck on Monday to do some cutting at his woodlot at Bull Lake, on a side road about thirteen miles from Woodstock.

He was felling a large tree when it toppled unexpectedly knocking him to the snow covered ground and pinning him beneath it. Gray lay on the ground unconscious for some time, he does not know how long, with the tree across his chest. Two men who were working with him were at some little distance and

did not see the accident. Regaining consciousness he shouted to his companions who came to his assistance and assisted him to the truck. Neither of the other two could drive the truck and the young man, showing amazing nerve and with one arm useless, drove the thirteen miles of rough slippery road into Woodstock and to the Fisher Memorial Hospital with one hand.

So extensive were his injuries that he was on the operating table at the hospital for almost four hours. Later he was taken to his home, where at last reports he was resting fairly comfortably, but still on the danger list.

The upper part of the young man's body was badly injured by the falling tree. His arm was forced beneath him as he fell, tearing it from its socket, and badly wrenching and tearing the muscles and nerves of his arm and shoulder and crushing the shoulder bones. In addition he suffered a nasty leg injury. His condition has been further complicated by the development of pneumonia from lying on the snowy ground.

POTATO MARKET IS FIRM

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orders coming from Quebec, principally from Montreal. Mild weather has prevailed with the exception of Monday and a fair amount of hauling has been going on, enough to fill orders.

Across the border the price dropped slightly yesterday, farmers receiving \$3.15 to \$3.25 a barrel, and it was expected that this would halt shipments from here to the United States temporarily at least. Dealers here consider the situation reasonably strong, and are looking for a further increase in prices before the end of February.

Supplies available for shipment in New Brunswick are estimated to be 2258 barrels, considerably less than the five year average at this time. Last year there were 1517 on hand, in 1935, the year of the disastrous marketing board experiment, 5106, and in 1934, 3278.

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time of year. Sunday night was an exception, the coldest weather of the present winter being experienced. Thermometers around town registered ten degrees below zero early Mon-

day morning, while from outlying points as low as sixteen below was reported unofficially. The weather moderated Tuesday evening, and has been mild and fine ever since.

AMBERGRIS

Amongst all the strange finds made by sea-faring people there are few that attract more interest than a lump of ambergris floating upon the water or tossed up on the beach. It is of a deep gray color, a waxy consistency, and a disagreeable odor, which gradually becomes sweet and earthy on exposure to the air. It melts into a fatty resinous liquid which is soluble in oils and readily dissolved in hot alcohol. When treated by the perfume-maker, ambergris becomes one of the most useful of his natural bases.

We are told by the Fisheries Department that not so long ago four out of every five whales taken off British Columbia were not sperms but now the very reverse is the case and nobody knows why. So we may be hearing something about ambergris on the Pacific Coast one of these fine mornings. It is worth \$120 or more a pound and occasionally a lump of 200 pounds has been found.

Not very much ambergris in its natural form is imported into Canada. It has been measured by ounces in the last year or two, but occasionally

it comes in.
It is imported into Canada in large quantities in the solid form, mainly from Germany. An average yearly import would be about four and a half million pounds.

Mr Farmer:

Do you know the difference in value between warm weight and chilled weight of your hogs?

At present under the roll grade system prices are quoted on warm weight, the natural shrink in the cooling process varies as an example; Say that the shrink is 8 per cent, and our quotation for hogs this week is \$11.25. This means on the chilled weight or shrink warm weight, as the packer terms it, the price being paid is over a lb.

You should always remember that you lose at present market values 35c to 50c per cwt. in cooling shrinks of hogs killed on the farm. In other words, our warm weight price of \$11.25 this week is equal to about \$11.60 shrunk or cooled weight.
