STRONG PLEA IS MADE FOR PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE IN WOODSTOCK

Town Council Hears Appeal For Specially Trained Community Nurse Here

DISTRICT MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER SAYS STEP WOULD BE VALUABLE FOR PREVENTION OF DISEASE; TOWN TO DO NO PERMANENT PAVING THIS YEAR

A strong plea for a public health nurse for Woodstock was made before the town council on Monday evening by Dr. Austin M. Clarke, district medical health officer. Dr. Clarke told the council that Canada was using appalling sums of money annually through preventable illnesses. A public health nurse here, he said, would be an invaluable asset to the community.

Such a nurse, he went on, could do a most valuable work among mothers, could look after follow up medical treatment with the school children, teach the proper preventive treatment for tuberculosis, give sex education to adolescent girls and aid in many other ways.

Dr. Clarke continued that public health conditions in Woodstock were very far from satisfactory. Many births within the town limits were taking place where little or no preparation for the care of the babies was made in advance. There was a considerable amount of impetigo, scabies and similar diseases among the school children, cases had been observed where children were verminous, and a considerable amount of venereal disease, which was still a about as prevalent as ever in the province, existed here.

Total cost of a public health nurse in other towns ranged from \$1,600 to \$1,900 a year. The government would grant \$500 toward the expenses, and he understood that when a move to secure a nurse had been made here some years ago several local organizations had offered to help.

Special training in public health work was essential, he said in conclusion, but if it was desired to have a graduate of the local hospital, he believed a scholarship could be arranged so that she could become qualified.

At the conclusion of Dr. Clarke's address there was considerable discussion. (Continued on page 4.)

SENT UP FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF THEFT

FRANK GREER ALLEGED TO HAVE STOLEN TWO PAIRS OF TROUSERS

Frank Greer, charged with the theft of two pairs of trousers from Alex. Munro, was sent up for trial in the Woodstock Police Court Tuesday afternoon. D. R. Bishop appeared for the Crown and Hon. F. C. Squires for the defence.

Mr. Munro told of attending a dance on the night of Coronation Day and leaving his car parked near the Woodstock armories. He had previously put on a new suit, leaving an extra pair of trousers as well as his old suit in the car. Returning to the car he found that both pairs of trousers were missing. FISHERIES OFFICIALS DISTRIBUTE THOUSAND OF YOUNG TROUT FRY

Many thousands of young trout have been placed by the Dominion fisheries officials in lakes and streams in this area during the last few days. Fry have been released at the head of the Pokiook stream, in Davidson Lake, draining into the same stream, Shogomoc river, Second Eel River Lake, Acker Creek, Hagerman's brook, and the Coack stream. The fry came from the Florenceville fish hatchery, and were distributed by the hatchery superintendent, George Sutherland, and C. E. Kilpatrick, fisheries inspector.

COURT HAS HEAVY WEEK-END DOCKET

THEFT, ASSAULT AND LIQUOR CASES ARE HEARD ON MONDAY

There was a heavy week-end docket in the Woodstock police court Monday. Frank Greer, charged with the theft of two pairs of trousers, elected to take a preliminary hearing, and his case was set over until Tuesday afternoon for hearing. D. R. Bishop represented the Crown and R. W. Seely the defence.

The alleged theft occurred on the night of May 12, when Alex. Munro, of Houlton, parked his car outside the Woodstock armories where a dance was in progress. Returning to the car he found that two pairs of trousers which he had just purchased were missing. On Saturday evening a local merchant, recognizing a pair of trousers allegedly worn by the accused as those he had sold the Houlton man, informed the police, and Chief B. L. Schriver took Greer into custody.

Boardman Vantassel, charged by his wife with assault, pleaded guilty. He was sentenced to seven days in jail, the court stating that in view of the fact that the assault consisted merely of a threatening gesture a light sentence would be given. Vantassel was also bound over to keep the peace for one year.

One drunk pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 and costs. Similar sentences were imposed on three men who pleaded guilty to consuming liquor in a public place.

The Woodstock Rotary Club dental clinic will end its work among the school children for the summer within the next few days, it was announced at the club luncheon held at the Carlisle hotel at noon Monday. The clinic has had a busy year, a large number of treatments being given. E. R. SEA SERPENT SAID SEEN IN NORTH LAKE

STRANGE MARINE MONSTER ALLEGED TO HAVE LONG SNAKELIKE BODY

Loch Ness may have its monster, British Columbia may have its ogopogo, but a Marine monster rivaling both for mystery and formidable appearance has been reported on the New Brunswick-Maine border. The strange beast is said to have its habitat in the chain of lakes which are drained by the St. Croix river. For some time past reports have been current that a terrible looking creature, half serpent and half fish, has been sighted in the Grand Lake. A body of water about 18 miles long and several miles in width.

During the last few days report of a similar, but somewhat more definite nature, have been received from North Lake, somewhat smaller than Grand Lake and connected with it by a thoroughfare. North Lake is less than an hour's drive from Canterbury, and is very popular as a summer resort with residents on both sides of the line.

Each evening for the last three or four days residents or visitors have reported seeing a monstrous form disporting itself in shallow water about a hundred yards from shore. Various reports estimate its length at from twenty to fifty feet. It is said to have a long serpentine body, and small snake-like head, with a red mouth and forked tongue. The neck is described as slate colored, and as much of the body as has been seen as a bright green.

Persons who claim to have seen the serpent state that it was swimming along in long undulations, with its head about six feet above the water.

Reports that a party of visitors from Woodstock had seen and attempted to photograph the monster could not be verified. One well-known Woodstock citizen, after extracting a promise that his name would not be divulged, admitted that he had seen "something very strange" moving through the water, but declined to make a guess at what it was.

ANNIVERSARY IS OBSERVED SUNDAY

REV. W. F. MUNRO PREACHES TO LARGE CONGREGATIONS IN UNITED CHURCH

The Woodstock United Church celebrated its 105th anniversary on Sunday. Rev. W. F. Munro, a former pastor, now of Yarmouth, N. S., was preacher both morning and evening, and congregations which taxed the capacity of the large auditorium were present at both services. Rev. Mr. Munro took as his subject in the morning "Christ in the Midst," and in the evening, "Victorious Faith." Special music was given by the choir in the morning, and in the evening the men's choir sang.

The occasion commemorated the 105th anniversary of the erection of the first Methodist Church in Woodstock, the thirtieth anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the present church building, and the twelfth anniversary of the entering of the congregation into the United Church of Canada.

LIGHTNING BOLT CAUSES BREAK IN LIGHT SERVICE

Woodstock was without electric current for about an hour and a half yesterday afternoon. During a short but heavy electrical storm, lightning struck a tree near Jacksonville, about three miles from the town limits, and a part of the trunk fell across the transmission line. Present Indications Point To One Hundred Per Cent More Seed Potato Acreage For This Year

DEALERS HERE ARE HOPEFUL NEW MARKETS WILL ABSORB EXTRA SUPPLY BUT ARE UN EASY AS TO EFFECT ON PRICE; MARKET IS DULL THIS WEEK

The potato market was dull here this week with poor demand and scattered wire inquiry both from Montreal and Quebec. Prices, which had improved late last week, when they climbed from 75 cents to \$1 a barrel to the farmers, were down slightly, the farmers today receiving \$5 to 90 cents a barrel. Hauling was light. Indications continue to point to a big increase in acreage both for seed and table stock, especially the latter. Judging by fertilizer sales the seed potato acreage in this area will be about double that of last year. Dealers here, while hopeful that opening markets will absorb the extra supply are uneasy that the greatly increased planting may result in poor prices next fall.

Personnel Is Greatly Increased

Lt. COL. W. B. MANZER IS ANNOUNCED AS COMMANDING OFFICER

The recently formed Carleton and York regiment will go into camp at Sussex on June 30 for ten days training with a greatly increased personnel over that allowed militia units in previous years, it has been announced. The regiment will train 250 all ranks, including a complete band and signal section. Announcement has been received here that Lt. Col. W. B. Manzer will command the unit, succeeding Lt. Col. P. Elmer McLaughlin, of St. Stephen, who has been commanding officer since the formation of the new regiment by the amalgamation of the Carleton Light Infantry and the York Regiment a few months ago. Lt. Col. Manzer's appointment has been dated back to February 14.

Lt. Col. Manzer, who has had a long military record both in peace and war time, commanded the Carleton Light Infantry for three years, during each of which it won the 16th Brigade Cup for general proficiency. As it had previously won the award twice successively under his predecessor, Lt. Col. H. G. Wood, M. C., the C. L. I., with five consecutive wins, established a record never before equaled in the annals of the Canadian militia.

The new regiment has companies at various points in the recruiting area formerly served by the two merged units. Headquarters Company is at Woodstock, and is commanded by Major W. C. Lawson, M. C., M. (Continued on page 8.)

SEVERAL CASES ARE HEARD BY TRIBUNAL AT SETTING HERE

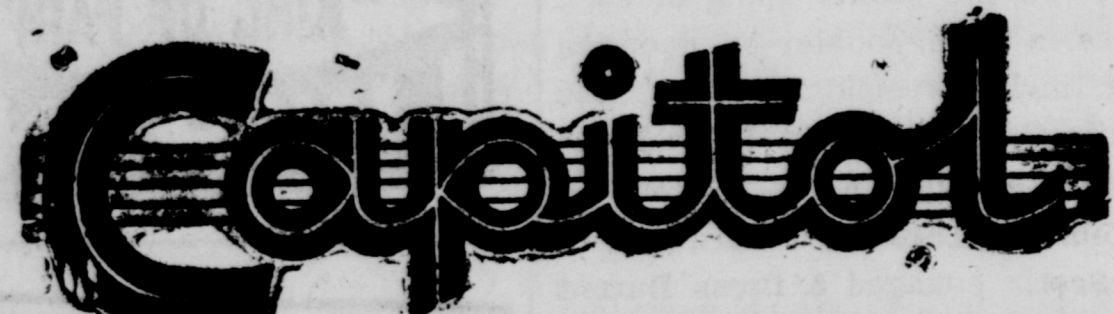

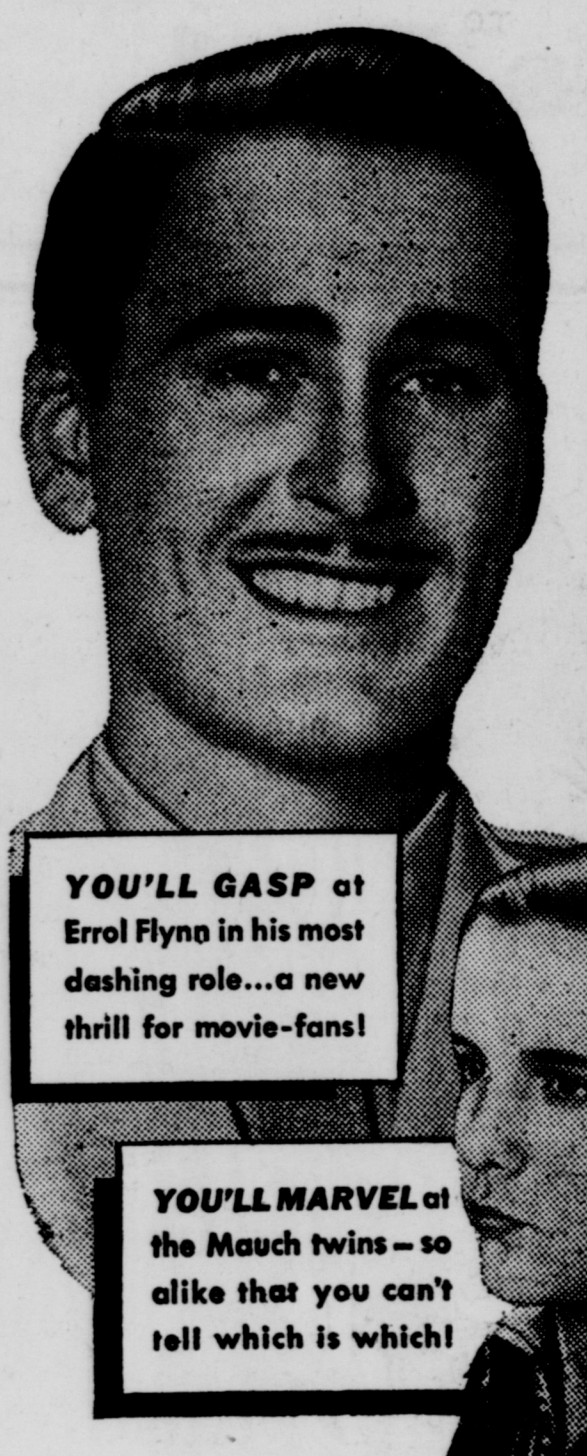
