CARLETON COUNTY'S BUDGET IS INCREASED BY ONE THIRD FOR 1937

Big Jump Is Caused By Overexpenditure of Last Year's Estimated Needs

FIGURES FOR THIS YEAR ARE \$58,650, COMPARED WITH \$40,000 IN 1936; EXPENDITURE EXPECTED TO BE ABOUT SAME THIS YEAR AS LAST

Carleton County's budget for the current year was passed at \$58,650 by the County Council at the closing session of their January meeting here on Saturday morning. The total is roughly one third higher than last year. This huge increase was due to the overexpenditure of last year's estimates by about \$8,500, largely in departments over which the council exercises no control. Last year's budget was \$40,000.

Last year's deficit had to be budgeted for this year, and as expenditure is expected to be approximately the same, provision was made for the raising of as much more this year to prevent another deficit. The budget was introduced by Coun. F. O. Creighton, chairman of the finance committee.

The items are as follows: contingent, including councillors' salaries, \$2,585; administration of justice including jury fees, \$7,500; schools, \$12,500; public buildings, \$3,600; salaries, \$2,600; public health, \$1,400; vocational school, \$2,500; Evangelical Home, \$100; Institute for Blind, \$100; tuberculosis hospitals and industrial homes, \$12,000; registry office, \$375; municipal home, \$250; interest, \$2,500; 1936 deficit, \$8,615; municipal home deficit, \$1,775; assessment supervisor, \$250.

Coun. Page spoke on the making of motor fuel from potatoes, stating that the idea did not seem to be economically feasible as the commodity could be made cheaper in other ways. They were presented with a beautiful Sheffield silver service and tray and a purse of money. The presentation was made on behalf of the congregation by the warden H. F. Seely.

COUNTY COUNCIL IS TOLD OF INDUSTRIAL USE OF POTATOES

G. G. PORTER DISCUSSES TREATMENT OF POTATO ALCOHOL PROJECT IN EUROPE

The industrial use of agricultural products was the subject of a talk given by Guy G. Porter before the Carleton County Council on Friday, last.

Mr. Porter pointed out that the so-called potato alcohol project had been carried on very successfully for a good many years in some of the European countries and compared the agricultural policy of this Province with the policies operating in Holland, Germany, Czechoslovakia, France, Ireland and England. Mr. Porter made it very clear that the main object of this new industrial-agricultural policy is not to manufacture a cheaper motor fuel but to create a demand for agricultural products grown within the province (not only potatoes but cereal and other root crops) a demand that would call for increased production of farm products at a price that will show the grower a profit.

Mr. Porter pointed out the urgent necessity for diversification not only in the growing of farm products but in the utilization of farm products, and attached particular importance to the residue (Hot Slop) stock food which is considered the main product and the reason for the industry in 22 different countries throughout the world today. Hot Slop is the backbone of the livestock industry in Germany and other countries, furnishing a highly concentrated form of stock food which they could not otherwise obtain.

He compared our agricultural policy with that of England, showing where England last winter passed a bill to stabilize the sugar beet industry, guaranteeing the manufacture of refined white sugar at the rate of 500,000 tons annually from sugar beet grown in England, thereby keeping 400,000 acres of land under intensive

ONE GETS REFORM SCHOOL TERM, OTHER DISMISSED WITH WARNING

Two juveniles came before the police magistrate here Monday afternoon, charged with breaking and entering the residence of Archie Connolly and stealing a cigarette case and a small sum of money. Police charged that the boys went into the house while the family were absent and took the articles, which have since been recovered. Brought into court they admitted entering the house and taking the things. Both boys were already on probation as a result of a break committed earlier in the month.

The elder of the lads, who has already served a term in the Boys' Industrial Home at Saint John, was sentenced to the home for a definite term of two years, with a further indeterminate sentence of three years. The younger boy was again allowed to go with a warning that if he got into any further trouble he also would be sent to the home.

Farmers Are Receiving \$2.05 to \$2.10

COLD WEATHER YESTERDAY CAUSES FALLING OFF IN HAULING

Under the influence of brisk demand from Ontario the potato market edged higher here this week. Prices, which had remained stationary at the \$2 mark for several weeks rose slightly and farmers were being offered \$2.05 to \$2.10 a barrel. The situation reflects the attitude of Ontario farmers who are holding back their supplies in the belief the market will advance later on. Demand from Quebec province continues dull and only a few orders are being received from Montreal.

Hauling was fairly heavy during the early part of the week, mild weather and better roads causing the farmers to move their stuff in. It was lighter yesterday with cold weather keeping movement down to a minimum.
