SIX CITIZENS ARE NOMINATED TODAY FOR PLACES ON TOWN COUNCIL

A. R. Turner Is Mayor By Acclamation

CIVIC ELECTION WILL BE HELD MONDAY; 536 ELIGIBLE TO VOTE

An election for vacancies on the Woodstock town council became assured today when six names were placed in nomination for the seats of the three retiring councillors whose terms have just expired. Mayor A. R. Turner, who has completed a year in office, was returned by acclamation.

The candidates for councillors are George W. Glew, one of the retiring councillors, L. E. Cox, who is offering again after an absence of a year from the council board, Hugh Gibson, retired C. P. R. employee, Harold DeLong, merchant, Edgar A. Neal, manager of the Capitol Theatre, and Herbert Brewer, retail clerk.

The election will be held on Monday, the polls opening at 10 a. m. and remaining open until 5 p. m. There are 536 citizens eligible to vote, out of a total list of 1,350.

Councillors A. H. Hetherington and W. E. Porter, whose terms have expired, are not running again. The (Continued on page five.)

FEWER ARRESTS

154, COMPARED WITH 163 PREVIOUS YEAR

154 arrests were made by Woodstock police in 1938, compared with 163 in 1937, it has been announced by Chief of Police B. L. Schriver. Drunkenness accounted for more than half the arrests with 78; theft was next with 27; there were 13 arrests or vagrancy, 8 for breaches of the peace, 6 for assault, 6 for unpaid fines, 5 for creating a disturbance, 5 for drunken driving, two for obstruction of the police and one for obtaining goods under false pretences.

TRACK HOLDINGS HEAVY, MARKET CONTINUES DULL

The potato market has been very quiet here for the last day or two. Mild weather during the last few days has caused heavy shipments to the consuming centres, which are well supplied and have large track holdings. Wire inquiry today is almost at a standstill and prices showed a slightly downward tendency at \$1.35 a barrel to the farmers. Hauling continues light, but with plenty of stock coming in to fill the orders.

NEW BRUNSWICK NOW HAS TRUNK ROAD SYSTEM EQUAL TO ANY ON CONTINENT; PIRIE, McNAIR, ANDERSON AND PATTERSON ALSO ARE HEARD

"We first learned our direction, then we proceeded," Hon. A. A. Dysart, K. C., told a meeting of the Carleton County Liberal Association at a banquet in the Carlisle hotel here Thursday evening. Premier Dysart told the meeting that business today moved on wheels and that the government had to proceed accordingly.

Other speakers were Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, Hon. J. B. McNair, attorney-general, Hon. W. S. Anderson, Minister of Public Works, and J. E. Jack Patterson, M. P. for Carleton-Victoria. Andrew D. McCain, re-elected today as county president, a post he has occupied continuously for more than twenty years, presided.

The premier said that whether schools of thought foreign to our hand but popular elsewhere would find a foothold here, the people themselves must determine. It was amazing, he said, the number of people who thought it was the duty of the government either to support them directly from the public revenue or to find them employment without any effort on their part. Such beliefs, he charged, were apt to lead to communism or fascism.

The last administration, he said, recognized this and had made a kind of start, "but, declared, "they put a Fifth Avenue top on a Butoche dirt base." When his government came into office, the premier went on, they had caused a furor by stopping the work. The government had brought in the best expert advice, and (See Also Page 2)

MORE MONEY FOR NURSING SERVICE URGED BY SPEAKER

DIFFICULTY MAY BE MET IN FINANCING WORK THIS YEAR

Financial support for the Victorian Order Nurse was asked by E. W. Mair at the annual meeting of the Woodstock Branch, V. O. N., held at the town hall here Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Mair pointed out that the grant from the Dominion organization this year would be only \$200, and that grants made by several local organizations to get the service established could not be relied on as a regular source of revenue. Unless some way was found to replace these amounts, he said, there might be difficulty in financing the project this year. He intimated that the town would be asked to increase their grant, which last year was \$150.

Dr. J. F. L. Brown said that the grant made by the town had actually cost them nothing. Before the Victorian Order was established here, he (Continued on Page 4)

FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR YEAR IS SUBMITTED AT MEETING OF CITIZENS BY TOWN MANAGER

TOTAL TAX COLLECTIONS, CURRENT AND ARREARS, AMOUNT TO 108.6 PER CENT OF WARRANT; COUN. GLEW VOICES CRITICISM OF TOWN ADMINISTRATION

Woodstock's cash receipts for 1938 exceeded expenditures by \$2,599, it was announced at the annual town meeting here Monday night. Total receipts from all sources were \$110,341, almost \$5,000 above the estimates, and total expenditures \$106,742, leaving a margin of \$3,599. A bond of Agricultural Society No. 41, guaranteed by the town, was paid out of revenue, reducing the surplus to \$2,599.

The town meeting is held annually on the Monday of the week preceding the civic election. Nomination day comes on Thursday of the same week, and the election is held on the following Monday.

The total tax warrant was \$78,250, of which \$59,116, or 75.5 per cent of the warrant, was collected, compared with 72.4 per cent the previous year. Tax arrears at the beginning of the year were \$44,783, of which \$25,268 or 56 per cent was collected, compared with 54.2 in 1937.

The total revenue from taxes, current and arrears, was 108.6 per cent of the tax warrant.

Collection of water and sewer rates also showed a small increase at \$17,665, compared with \$17,065. Outstanding water rates were only very slightly decreased, \$5,735 being collected against \$5,728 in 1937.

FIRE LOSSES MUCH HEAVIER IN 1938

INSURANCE LOSS LAST YEAR \$37,343 AGAINST \$9,999 IN 1937

Insurance losses in Woodstock during 1938 totalled \$37,343, a very large increase over 1937 when the figures were \$9,999.78, it has been announced by W. B. Manzer, secretary of the Woodstock Fire Department. Most of the loss was incurred in two serious outbreaks, the Creighton building in Connell street in January and the Peerless Laundry in November.

ONLY ONE MATTER FOR GRAND JURY

NO BILL RETURNED IN CASE OF KING VS GLENDENNING

Only one criminal matter was presented to the grand jury when the Carleton Court opened here Tuesday morning, with Judge M. L. Hayward presiding. This was the King vs John Glendenning, charged with a statutory offence against Mrs. George Sargefield. The grand jury returned no bill against the accused, in spite of which they recommended that he be reprimanded by the judge, and further recommended that a child in the Sargefield home be taken in charge by the Overseers of the poor for the Parish of Brighton.

Only one civil matter was entered, the non jury case of the Jack Crystal Clothing Company vs Joseph Kilmer, which will be tried in chambers at a later date. Jones & Jones represent the plaintiff, and Limerick & Limerick, of Fredericton the defendant.

King Pin in the win of the hairy lads was their manager, Pete Mooney, most of whose hair is on his chin, in the shape of a bushy red beard plentifully sprinkled with gray. The Chubby Pete, quickly christened "Grandpa" by the local fans, was a stonewall on defence and pivot of many scoring plays, in addition to which he grabbed himself a couple of quick baskets in the second half which about put the game on ice.

Their high scorer was Ray Murphy, their six feet ten centre. Murphy, while not so good a shot as his team mates, frequently grabbed heavens which looked as if they were going over the backboard and tipped them into the basket.

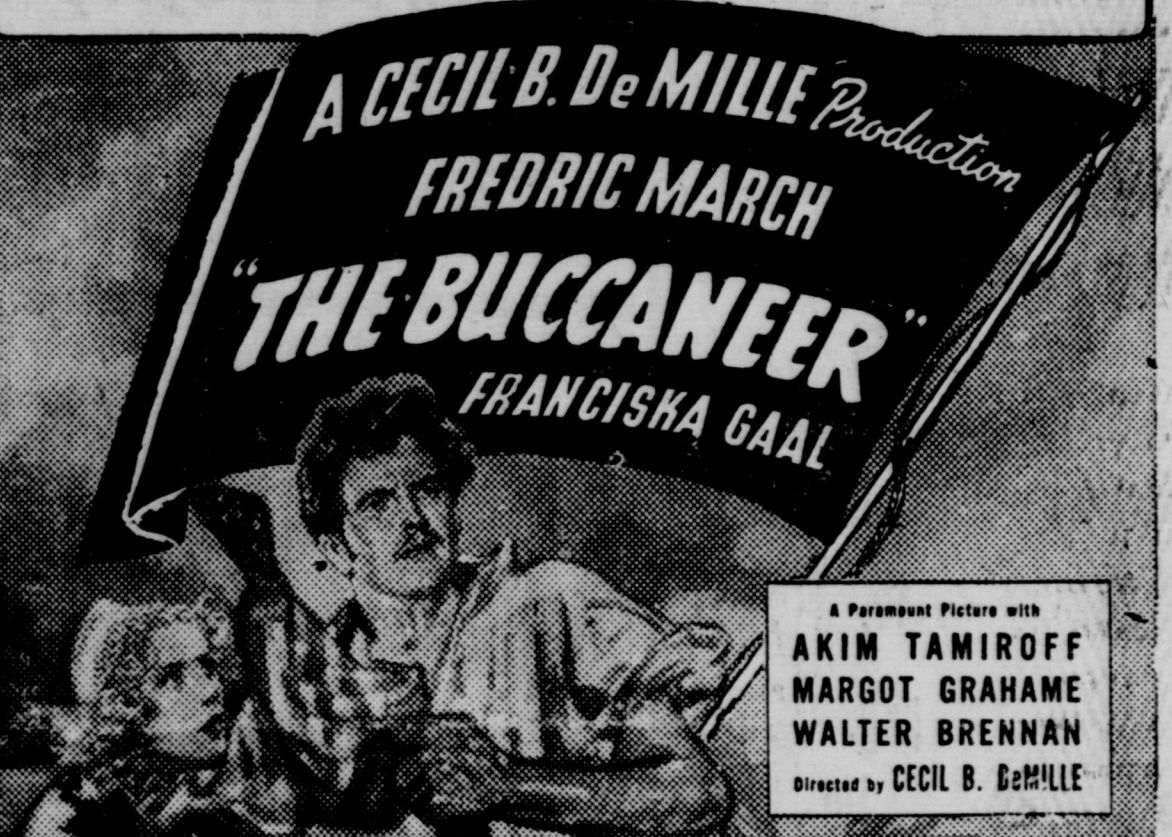
