TOWN COUNCIL DEFERS ACTION ON UNIFORM CLOSING HOURS FOR STORES

Merchants Woodstock Area School Festival Will Be Held On Friday To Be Asked To Attend

THOSE OPPOSED TO PLAN TO BE GIVEN OPPORTUNITY TO GIVE VIEWS

Discussion of uniform closing hours for stores and the adoption of a weekly half holiday during the summer months was discussed at a meeting of the Woodstock town council last evening. The matter was finally set over until a later meeting to give persons opposed to the proposal a chance to present their views.

The matter was introduced by a delegation from the Retail Clerks Association. A list was read showing that out of 16 grocery stores in town twelve had agreed to the proposals; drygoods, nine stores, eight agreed; meat stores, four stores, two agreed; two agreed with minor changes; hardware, two stores, two agreed; jewelry, three stores, two agreed; drug stores, four stores, two agreed; barbers, seven shops, all agreed; harness and leather, three stores, two agreed; boots and shoes, two stores, both agreed; furniture, three stores, two agreed.

Coun. Payson said he understood the merchants were not unanimous and with that in view he proposed that the merchants be given an opportunity to come before the council, especially those who were opposed. He considered the matter was too important to be rushed through on the first discussion. He moved, with Coun. Glew as seconder, that the matter be left over until the next meeting, and that a delegation of merchants be asked to attend and express their opinions.

Coun. Brewer said that most of the merchants had already attended a meeting with the clerk, and several of those who were absent had sent word that they would approve what ever action was taken. He did not consider any more representative meetings could be obtained than had

Programs All Day At 2 Schools

FORMAL OPENINGS AT HIGH AND VOCATIONAL SCHOOL AT 9 A. M.

The Woodstock area school festival of music, speech, drama and art will be held at the Fisher Memorial and Carleton Vocational Schools here on Friday, May 5. The formal openings in both schools will take place at 9 o'clock, followed by all day programs in which the various classes of the town and county will participate.

At the Fisher School the morning will be devoted to reading, with Grades 1 to 4 from 9.15 to 10.30, and Grades 5 to 8, from 10.30 to 12. There are 20 entries from the lower grades, seven solo and thirteen choral, and fifteen in the higher ones, eight solo and seven choral. In the afternoon there will be dramatics with four entries.

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DEFENDANT WINS IN TRES ASS SUIT

VERDICT IN FAVOR OF JOHN FORDHAM GIVEN IN CIRCUIT COURT

A verdict for the defendant was given in the case of Miles Bragdon vs John Fordham, which was concluded in the Circuit Court here Friday before Mr. Justice LeBlanc. The case was the last on the docket. Evidence for the plaintiff was concluded on Thursday, the plaintiff claiming damages for alleged trespass. Friday morning the court viewed the scene of the alleged trespass at Grafton, and evidence was given by the defendant, Harley Olmstead, Frank Briggs, and Frank Olmstead. The judge ruled the damages as too remote from the event to give rise to a claim and dismissed the case. Hon. F. C. Squires appeared for the plaintiff and D. R. Bishop for the defence.

It bore a metal band around one leg, stamped AU 37 N6574, which contained a slip of paper reading "4.1 miles 20 out of 10." On the other leg was an identification tag numbered 44, and stamped "Bourne Mfg. Co., Melrose, Mass."

SECONDARY ROADS STILL IN BAD SHAPE

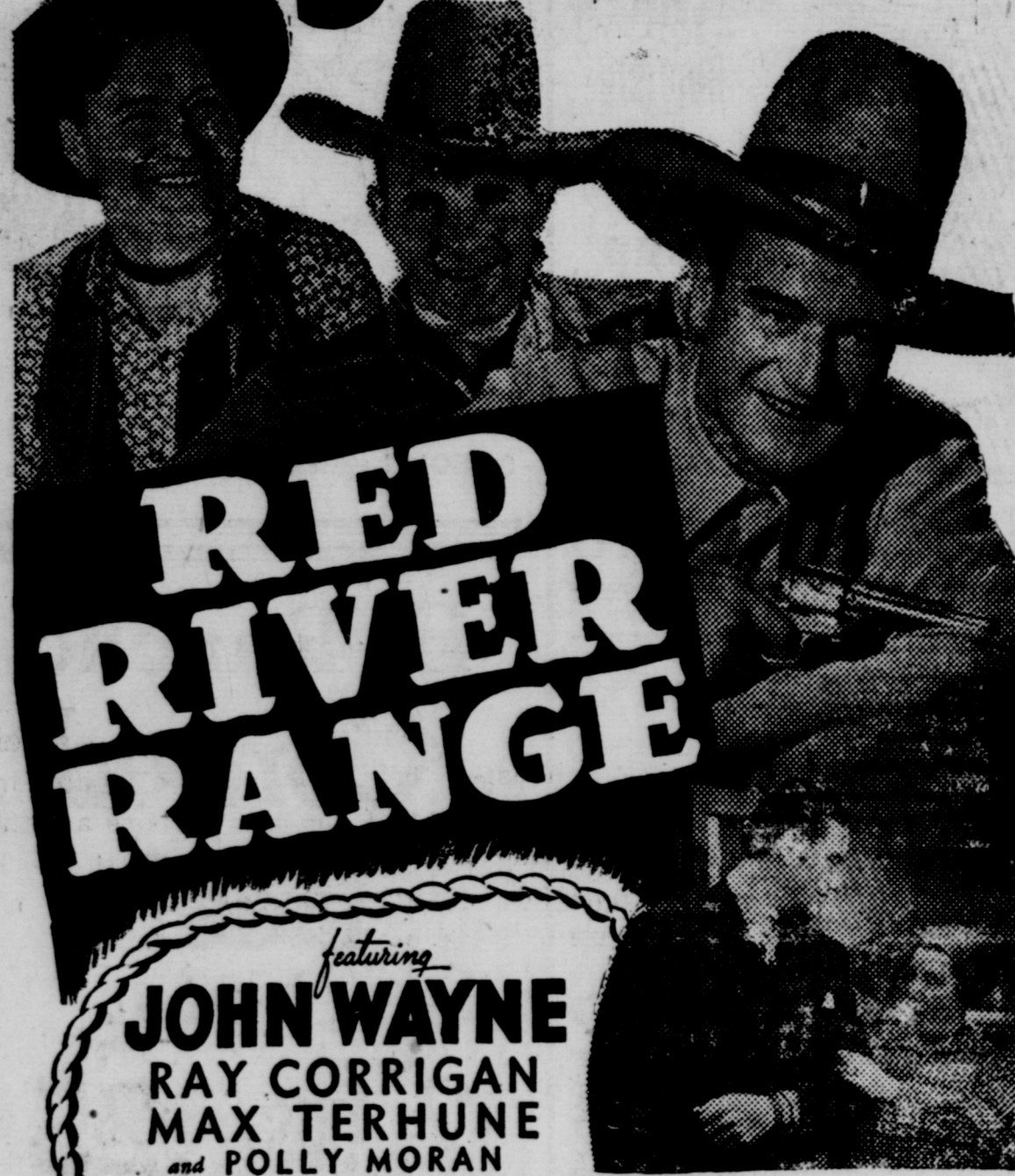
